Martin Luther King, Jr. once said, "All labor that uplifts humanity has dignity and importance." We hope that your participation in this Challenge helps shape the way you understand poverty while empowering you to do something about it on a local and global scale.

Empowering dreams

What did you dream of doing when you were young?
Becoming an astronaut and exploring uncharted space or a dancer performing on the world's largest stage? Perhaps you wanted to be a teacher who changed the lives of students or a scientist that cures a disease. Those dreams, whether or not they came true, were filled with hope and possibility.

Now imagine that your dreams are overshadowed by the reality of poverty. Before you reach your teens, instead of continuing your education and following your passion, you must find a way to earn money to help provide for your family's most basic needs. The work you find isn't the kind where you make a livable wage and save for your future; it's painstaking labor that puts your life at risk and often exposes you to abuse. Unable to invest in a better life for yourself, you're subject to a vicious cycle of disadvantage that stifles your opportunity.

While these misfortunes are significant, there are proven solutions to help young people break this cycle and move into a life they aspire to. All young people, in spite of their circumstances, possess assets, skills, and gifts that can improve their lives. Investments in financial literacy, job and entrepreneurship training, and youth-led groups and networks can help overcome the setbacks of poverty. By joining the Youth Uplift Challenge, YOU will support young people to achieve their dreams.

What is the Youth Uplift Challenge?

Students Rebuild is a collaborative program of the Bezos Family Foundation that inspires young people to connect, learn, and take collective action on critical global issues. We believe every young person should have an opportunity to help others, but we recognize that not everyone has the ability to fundraise. The Students Rebuild Challenge requires young people to create a simple, symbolic object which the Bezos Family Foundation matches with funding. This approach allows students around the world of all ages and backgrounds to take action and witness change on issues young people care about.

Students Rebuild has partnered with Save the Children and Global Nomads Group to launch the Youth Uplift Challenge that focuses your creativity and empathy on supporting young people to accomplish their dreams. There are three simple steps.

- 1) Connect: Form a team and join the Students Rebuild community. There are many ways to connect more deeply with the community throughout the Challenge.
- 2) Learn: Learn about poverty's impact on young people all around the world and how young people can be empowered to change their lives.

3) Take Action: You'll be invited to "make a hand to lend a hand" to impact those living in poverty around the world and in local communities. Reflect on what you can do, either as an individual or as a team, to uplift someone in your local community. Make a hand to represent this commitment. For each hand you mail to the Bezos Family Foundation, the Foundation will donate \$1.90—up to \$500,000 total—to Save the Children's youth empowerment programs in Nicaragua and Indonesia.

Who are we partnering with and why?

Save the Children has a proven track record of effective programming that helps empower young people by offering them education, employability skills, entrepreneurship and job training, peer support groups, and career counseling. For the Youth Uplift Challenge, Save the Children will focus on providing pathways and possibilities to impoverished youth specifically in Nicaragua and Indonesia.

2. Register your team

During the Challenge

Here's a brief description of the resources available to you during the Challenge:

Learning Resources

We encourage you to pick and choose from the lessons provided in the Students Rebuild Youth Uplift Learning Resources to help your team understand what poverty is and how it impacts young people. Feel free to adapt the information to the learning goals of your classroom or program. Your team can use this information to fuel their creativity and thoughtfulness as they dive into the Challenge.



Make a Hand

The creative call to action for the Youth Uplift Challenge is to make hands to help uplift young people impacted by poverty. For every thoughtful hand created, the Bezos Family Foundation will donate \$1.90 to Save the Children's youth empowerment programs. In addition to making hands, your team members might consider what local actions they might take, big or small, to help uplift others in their own community. Suggestions can be found in the Hand Making Instructions. It also includes background on why hands were chosen as a creative item, a template for making hands, and instructions on what to do with the hands you create. The instructions can be found online.

Webcast

During the Youth Uplift Challenge we'll conduct a free special event live-streamed through the Internet called a webcast. To participate, all you need is an Internet connection! The webcast will feature a live conversation between youth involved in Save the Children's empowerment programs and youth in classrooms around the United States who are participating in the Youth Uplift Challenge. As you watch the conversation, you can send questions in real time through a chat feature. Webcasts provide your team with a better understanding of obstacles and opportunities other youth face around the world. If you're unable to watch the live broadcast, footage will be available shortly afterwards on our YouTube channel. Consider starting a TED-Ed Club

We encourage your team to consider ways to build awareness about the Youth Uplift Challenge and share what they learn in their community. To that end, Students Rebuild encourages our Challenge teams to consider becoming TED-Ed Clubs.

In TED-Ed Clubs, students work together to discuss and celebrate their creative ideas. Club leaders receive TED-Ed's flexible public speaking curriculum to guide their school's club and help inspire public speaking and leadership. Students following the TED-Ed Clubs curriculum will research and develop their own "ideas worth spreading" and learn how to present it in the form of a short, TED-style talk. TED-Ed Clubs are designed to support students between 8-18 years old all over the world.



As your team takes the Youth Uplift Challenge, the TED-Ed Clubs curriculum will enhance your team's ability to consider, discuss, and speak about the impacts of poverty, youth empowerment, and youth resiliency, plus other topics your team might be passionate about.

Details on how to send your hands to Students Rebuild are included in the Hand Making Instructions. Here are some further reminders:

- If possible, please print and complete the downloadable package slip included in the Hand Making Instructions and send it with your package.
- If you are unable to print the packing slip, please be sure to include the following information with your package:
 - The name of your Youth Uplift Challenge Team (the one you registered with)
 - The number of young people (under age 19) on your team
 - The number of hands inside your package



- This information helps us track the contributions of your team. Thank you in advance for following these steps!
- If sending your package by postal mail is too expensive, please contact us at Students Rebuild for help covering postage costs.
- Virtual hands and submissions for teams outside the United States can be sent following the instructions outlined in the Hand Making Instructions.

Once we receive your hands, we'll ensure they're counted and each matched with \$1.90—up to \$500,000—in funding for Save the Children's youth empowerment programs. Save the Children will deliver a selection of the hands made to youth in Nicaragua and Indonesia during the Youth Uplift Challenge. Stay tuned to our website for details!
