## **Secondary Prevention:**

Secondary Prevention is applied when early detection and treatment of diseases occurred, often before symptoms appear, to minimize serious consequences of the detected disease.

The Target Population in Secondary Prevention: Individuals at risk or with early signs of a specific condition.

Examples in Secondary Prevention are:

- Screening Programs: Mammography for breast cancer detection, dual x-ray absorptiometry (DXA) for osteoporosis.
- Contact Tracing: Identifying and treating sex partners of someone diagnosed with a sexually transmitted infection to prevent further spread.

# **Tertiary Prevention:**

Tertiary Prevention is when managing existing, usually chronic diseases to prevent complications or further damage.

The Target Population in Tertiary Prevention: Individuals already diagnosed with a condition.

Examples in Tertiary Prevention are:

- Diabetes Management.
- Supportive and Rehabilitative Services.
- Preventing Complications in Disabilities.

These prevention levels work together to promote overall health and well-being in communities.
