On February 22, 2015 (1PM) the Bowen Island Garden Club welcomes Grant Sauer and Michael Campbell of NATS Nursery located in Langley BC. NATS is a wholesale nursery specializing in Pacific Northwest Plants for the purposes of reforestation, reclamation, restoration, construction and gardening. In addition to growing plants for the above purposes, the nursery also specializes in the propagation and growth of plants for green roofs and in the installation of green roofs.

HELP! WE NEED A TREASURER!

The nominee for the position of Treasurer has been unable to take up the position, so we need someone to take on this job. It's not onerous—the filing system is set up in Quicken, which is straightforward and easy to learn. Many previous Treasurers have not had professional training, so do not let that deter you. One of our former executive members suggested there must be a male Garden Club member who could be persuaded to take this on.

The responsibilities are that the Treasurer receive and account for (but not collect) all monies, including membership and guest fees and special fundraising events; make appropriate payments on behalf of the Club; maintain a balance of the Club's B.C. Ferries Experience Card; monitor the Club mail and mailbox; complete Club banking, balance Club accounts and prepare monthly statements for the Executive and prepare an annual budget for approval by the Executive.

Essentially the Treasurer pays the bills, monitors the bank account and reports to the executive. The book-keeping system is already set up in Quicken. It is not a challenging job! If we cannot find a member willing to take this on, then we will have no choice but to hire a book-keeper to handle the book-keeping role with some of the Executive members authorized to sign cheques.

What the heck is xeriscaping?

Simply put, xeriscaping is a system of landscaping with water conservation as the priority. In areas that receive little rainfall in the summer, some thoughtful xeriscaping will allow flowering plants to thrive, adding visual appeal – as well as important forage for pollinators.

There are five principles that are key to xeriscaping success:

Plant selection is fundamental to xeriscaping because different plants have different needs when it comes to moisture, light, and soil. Drought tolerant plants are the most useful for this system, and there are masses to choose from.

Plant grouping keeps plants with similar needs together. If your property has a high, exposed point, as well as a low area where water gathers, you would select drought tolerant plants for the high area, and plants that require more moisture for the lower area.

Prepare the soil in your xeriscaped area with this in mind, adding more moisture-retaining organic matter where necessary.

Grading takes advantage of the natural tendency of water to move downhill, even over low grades. This is an important concept in xeriscaping design. Xeriscaped areas are rarely flat like lawns might be.

Mulching prevents weeds from growing, and it conserves what little moisture there is in the soil below. Mulching with finished compost or well-rotted manure helps to build soil's structure and fertility over time.

Irrigating efficiently is perhaps the most important concept to achieve a really robust and healthy xeriscape landscape. A carefully designed xeriscape might survive well simply using the naturally occurring rainfall. But in times of extended summer drought, some additional irrigation may be necessary. The trick is to irrigate efficiently. Watering deeply and infrequently encourages deeper root growth. Irrigate in the morning, before the heat of the afternoon. Drip irrigation is more efficient than overhead sprinklers.

Even if you don't have the resources to convert a whole yard or landscape, maybe it's time to focus on gardening with drought-sensitive plants. The list below is not exhaustive, but it shows how diverse the selection of flowers might be. All of these plants will perform well with minimal extra irrigation. Alyssum, Asclepias, Calendula, California Poppy, Chives, Cosmos, Gaillardia, Gypsophila, Hollyhocks, Iberis, Lavender, Marigold, Nasturtium, Poppies, Sage, Scabiosa, Sunflower, Thyme, Yarrow, Zinnia....
