## TO TAKE A CUTTING

Softwood is the term used to describe the stage of growth on a deciduous woody plant that's neither the new, green growth at the end of a shoot nor the stiff, woody growth near the base of the stem. The softwood stage lies between the two. The best way to know if a shoot has reached the softwood state is to bend it. If the softwood snaps, the shoot is ready to be taken as a cutting. If the shoot is very flexible and doesn't snap, it's too green. If the shoot is not flexible at all, it is too far gone.

From a healthy plant, cut off a growing tip 4-5 nodes long. Then with a sharp knife or cutters remove all but 4 leaves at the tip, and keep a "tail" below the bottom node of approximately 1/2". The remaining leaves may be trimmed to half their size, to help with evaporation, but this is not essential.

Dip the bottom tip into a rooting hormone. There are several on the market, but an effective mix can be made by soaking willow leaves in water for approximately 10 days...it works just as well as a commercial hormone. The rooting hormone speeds up the development of roots.

Insert the bottom tip of the cutting into well moistened growing mix, making sure that the bottom node is in the soil as this is where the roots will grow from. The potting mixture should be 60 percent perlite and 40 percent soilless mix, which provides the good drainage and maximum aeration that new roots need. Cuttings placed into a mix that holds moisture are apt to rot before rooting occurs.

There are various containers for rooting cuttings but I have found a good one to be a 6" pot as one can then use a 2 liter plastic bottle with the top cut off to make a cover to keep the moisture in.

Alternatively, push 3 or 4 supports in the pot and cover with a plastic bag. Each pot will take 4 or 5 stems, more is not a good idea because when they are ready to be potted up the roots will be entwined. The pot or pots should be kept in a warm, not hot, place—away from direct sunlight. I find the top of my fridge is a good place.

Some cuttings root faster than others. I've found that the best way to check for root development is with my eyes. After 4 to 5 weeks, I can check the bottom of each tray for small white roots that may be poking out of the drainage holes of the pot. If none are visible, another way to check for root development is by gently pulling on a cutting. If it shows resistance, then it is a good bet that roots have developed. If it pulls out of the tray easily, I inspect the stem for very fine root hairs. If no roots are apparent, I place the cutting back into the tray, reseal the bag and wait for a few more weeks before checking again.

Apart from checking for roots, it is a good idea to keep an eye on your pots to ensure that there is no wilt or mildew (spray with a fungicide) or that the pots are not drying out.
