KEITH FORDYCE TURNS 90

On a rainy afternoon, the 18^{th} of November, Keith Fordyce, who featured in last April's *Twahamwe*, celebrated his 90^{th} birthday at the Gaythorne RSL.

The inclement weather didn't keep away many of Keith's friends from MOTT, the Lions Club, the RSL and the Historical Society, just a few of the organizations with which Keith has been, and is, associated.

Some of Keith's many awards and citations were on display: his Life

Membership of the ALP; his Distinguished Service Award from the Lions Club; his Life Membership of the Gaythorne RSL and commendations from the Queensland Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals and QR Ambulance Corps. Not to ignore, of course, his OBE (Over Bloomin' Eighty) which he received ten years ago.

Several people spoke in glowing tones of Keith's achievements and of the qualities that have made him special ... but of course those of us with whom he has worked at MOTT know all about that anyway!

I say 'miraculous' because we were planting in sand and when I arrived, Patrick Peek intrduced me to a somewhat miraculous tool that one had only to plunge into the sand and withdraw to make a planting hole – none of your rocks, clay or need for mattocks here!

Kedron Brook Catchment Branch of the Wildlife Preservation Society of Queensland's newsletter, *The Kedron Brook Babbler*, had an article that directed me to an interesting website.

On The Brisbane City Council's website www.brisbane.qld.gov.au/ - under the *Environment and Waste* pull down menu, you will find *Weeds*.

This part of the website list 22 pages of weeds that may be found in the Brisbane area. Things like:



MILE-A-MINUTE:

A vine with hairless stems, growing with a twining habit and rooting at the joints (nodes).

Leaves divided into five or seven deep lobes, fingerlike in appearance. They are

alternately arranged and hairless with stalks 2-6 centimetres long.

Flowers tubular and purple to pinkish-purple (occasionally white) with a dark centre. Petal lobes 4-6 centimetres long, and flowering occurs year round. Fruits globular.

Also known as coastal morning glory or five-leaf morning glory, it is similar in appearance to morning glory but has shorter leaves with 5-7 lobes.

Aha! So what we need at plantings in future is a laptop! Laptop donations? Volunteers to write a grant application???? Money would do!!!

MEET THE PLANTERS. JAN RUSSELL

When I approached Jan about being our featured planter, her reaction was: "What would I talk about?"

Well, I started asking about her five-year plan and along the way she happened to mention her travels, ceramics, her art – installations and paintings – food styling, astrology, palmistry, rayid, dealing in oriental antiques and her work in interior design!



Jan has a 5-year plan that includes having a solo exhibition of her artworks and to travel some more. She works in acrylic and *objêts trouvées*, both as installations and as works to hang on a wall. She has a work in a current TAFE exhibition and describes her art as very emotional but always with the idea of a much brighter future.

Jan started out studying ceramics when she left school; worked as a food stylist, preparing food for commercials for companies like Pauls, KR Darling Downs and Sunny Queen eggs.

When she was nearing 40, she was dealing in oriental antiques and realized that she hadn't done what she really wanted to do, so she studied interior design at the College of Arts and then did work experience in Japan.

She has also lived and worked in London and Hong Kong and would happily live overseas again.

When she turned 60, she was asked if it was depressing. "Not at all", was her reply. She thinks

of her sixties as being such an opportunity to do things she has never done before.

Asked what brought her to MOTT, she dropped, "Palmistry". Palmistry? Yes, her interest in Astrology and Rayid (the emotional reading of the iris structure) took her to palmistry where she met Hugh who talked about MOTT and she thought it sounded interesting so came along and stayed, although we may not see too much of her next year as she has to move to a development of beach houses she has done up on the coast, so will be living at Peregian for most of the year. Jan tells me this with a tinge of regret because she describes herself as a city girl, not a coastal girl even though she grew up in Western Queensland at Wallumbilla. Jan says she went to boarding school in Brisbane when she was 10 and never went back!

Of course she would have something interesting to talk about – anyone who works with MOTT is interesting!
