MEMORIES OF A SPECIAL PERSON.

Anne Stone O.A.M. died on 17th April, 2010 with her four children at her bedside. She was born on 3rd November, 1927 and her father was Charles Smethurst Snow who started the first Scout Group in Queensland at St. Mary's Anglican Church, Kangaroo Point in 1908.

Anne grew up with parents who lived life according to Scout ideals and love of nature was paramount. She married another Scout – Bernard Stone – and together they were actively involved with the start of Greening Australia and Men of the Trees in the 1980s. Anne was always very observant and noticed there were stands of weeds on the creek bank below the Holy Spirit Anglican Church at Kenmore where she has been a member for many years. MOTT was approached some time ago and we cleared and planted trees all along that section of Gubberley Creek. We are still visiting for maintenance and care.

MOTT was well represented at the service on Friday, 23rd April, 2010 to celebrate Anne Stone's life and her great contribution to so many organisations, to encourage and inspire people to

care for their environment. She will be greatly missed.

Fran Gilje, Mott's enthusiastic Coordinator, arranged an action packed planting expedition to Killarney with the assistance of historian and local bush care coordinator, Susan Savage.


Crossing the Great Divide, we passed through a mosaic of bituminized and dirt roads, and arrived at the summit - WOW!!! - being the collective response. Queensland's first Governor, George Bowen, described the view as an "incomparable panorama". The view is just the same now as it was then, except for the pollution on the horizon, manicured farms, the dams and that linking system of roadways. Just a few hundred metres below the lookout seeped Moss's Well. Everybody laughed upon reaching the well, was truly the great Australian understatement. For everybody that missed this adventure "you have to see it to believe it!"



The convey of cars carried on to our next destination, the Queen Mary Falls Café where we received a warm welcome by Susan and Clive.

The Queen Mary Falls were spectacular. The rock formation of basalt and trachyte had been worn away since ancient times and I could see faces peering out of the highlights and shadows. The ravine was steep and sheltered the tallest, thickest Hoop Pines that I had ever seen.

Next stop - Brown's Falls - the drive was breathtaking.



The amazing thing that I noticed was that nearly all the cattle I saw were standing under stands of trees that were pocketed right throughout the rambling green countryside. The lush green grass was growing in the shade right up to the trunks of these isolated trees. WHY o WHY have these vast tracks of land been clear-felled by the older generation of farmers? Hopefully, the current and future generations of farmers will plant more trees throughout our vast vulnerable openness to realise a greater productivity (cows actually like shade) and create more wildlife corridors at the same time. Throw in less maintenance, machinery and fuel costs - more profit and a healed earth!

Back at Killarney we assembled in the dining room for dinner. Next day we arrived at 'The Head' where we were met by our hosts, Sandra and Malcolm, who escorted us along their beef fattening property to a beautiful spot which is very near being a billabong - there was plenty of shade - it was the perfect location.

The soil was soft and fertile and bamboo stakes firmly held the protective barriers and copious amounts of mulch was laid. Out came the buckets of water, compliments of the creek that ultimately feeds into the longest river system in Australia, the Murray Darling.



After the mass planting we went back to the homestead and were treated to a lavish lunch prepared by Sandra in the front garden. After the best site planting lunch that MOTT had ever feasted upon, Susan lead the convoy to the 'Rabbit Proof Fence'. The other side was New South Wales. Keaton asked "why is this fence here?" Jeff proudly responded by saying, "to keep the rabbits out".

On returning to the cars it was time to bid goodbyes. It felt like a week and it had to be the best road trip ever! We should make this an annual pilgrimage with more MOTTers in a 30-seater SUV bus.

MEET THE PLANTERS (FRAN GILJE)

Fran Gilje is one of the best known faces at MOTT. In fact it was MOTT that decided her to settle in Australia in 1996.



Fran was born at Falconbridge in the province of Ontario, Canada, to a Norwegian father and a French mother so among her many other skills, Fran is tri-lingual.

She moved to Toronto in her early twenties to teach. She taught general classroom and then studied music to become a music supervisor. At

one stage, she was teaching "open complex" where there are four groups of grade eight students, with their teachers, in one large room.

She noticed that the girls came back from Home Economics and the boys came back from Woodwork with boring things, each making the same "pin cushion", "shelf" or "utility box" so, hoping to get both the boys and the girls working in a more creative way, she developed a co-ed programme of industrial arts which was later renamed Design and Technology.

After many years of developing and nurturing this programme until it had spread through Toronto then throughout Ontario and finally was Canada-wide, Fran took a year's leave and came to Australia in 1994. She had been here before, but this time she wandered around the bush, eventually ending up in Brisbane and becoming associated with MOTT.

Having decided that she would like to move to Australia instead of shovelling snow for the rest of her life, Fran returned to Canada, sold her house and emigrated and, because she had so enjoyed her time with MOTT, she settled in Brisbane in 1996 where she has served as a bushcare worker and as a member of the Management Committee. She served as MOTT's president recently for a couple of years and has been one of its most active members.

Fran has recently had surgery to raise her eyelids 2mm in order for her to still have a line of vision. She has a very rare disorder called Chronic Progressive, External Opthalmalplegia which is a kind of muscular dystrophy that affects only the muscles of the eyes and lids. The disorder is characterized by slow progressive paralysis of the extraocular muscles. Patients usually experience bilateral symmetrical progressive ptosis and, to alleviate this, she has had surgery twice in order to attach the eyelids to other muscles in the forehead. Other than that, the medical community is still searching for answers. As in many other conditions, there is no cure as yet.

It is, as I said, a very rare condition and little is known about it. It is known that three French prostitutes who arrived in Canada in the 17th century had some eye problem so it may be a French-Canadian condition. On the other hand, Fran's father (Norwegian) also had the same condition so we figure that it didn't come from the prostitute side of the family.

Fran's surgery seems to have been a success so if you used to think that Fran was half asleep – look again! Anyway, this is a very alert lady who has been making musical instruments and running her own business, laminating and turning wood. Add to that her volunteer work with Save The Children and Homeless Connect and you'll see yet another of MOTT's gems.

THE SECRET LIFE OF MARION GOWARD

After her 25 years of planting trees, Marion Goward has to be one of the best-known and most active members of MOTT, yet despite all the work she puts in, Marion has another passion to which she devotes much of her time.

Underneath her house is a fully-functional, well-equipped, wood-working community workshop, the main purpose of which is the making musical instruments.



You could form an orchestra from the instruments that have been, or are being, created there – flutes, guitars, violins of all sizes, a spinet, a clavichord, a cittern, a cornemuse, harps, Aeolian harps, banjos, a bass viola da gamba and a harpsichord.

As far back as she can remember, Marion has been interested in musical instruments. She first became involved in building them when she discovered Renaissance music and became a Baroque buff.

Her first instruments were a small spinet and a clavichord which she assembled from kits she had imported from the U.S. and Britain.

In 1998, Marion's mates from MOTT – Fran Gilje, Gerry Dunford, Ron Clancy, Allan Thomas and Rob Thomson suggested that the workshop

be built and from there, like Topsy, it grew.



Gerry and Allan concreted the floor and lined the walls, the versatile Rob Thompson built the very solid benches (the smallest of which is 3 ½ metres long) and the stands for the machines.

Marion became interested in guitars when she discovered a local guitar maker, Doug Foster, who lived at Ashgrove. Marion and Fran approached him to learn how to make guitars and when he discovered Marion's workshop, he thought it would be perfect to use as a guitar-making school, something he had always wanted to establish.

The school began with a handful of students and Marion ended up accompanying Doug when he took some of his guitars to the U.S. where they spoke to other guitar makers and explored the big trees of California.

When Doug died, Marion continued to welcome people who wanted to make guitars, sharing her knowledge, her collection of notes from his workshops and her extensive library of books with them.

Marion's latest project is building an Octet, a consort of eight stringed instruments, based on the proportions of the violin. These range from a body length of just over 30 cms to 1.8 metres and include the piccolo, which has a range an octave above the standard violin, through the soprano, the mezzo, the alto, the tenor, the baritone and the bass right up to the contrabass.

Next projects on the drawing board are ukuleles and a series of North American Indian flutes.

The workshop, which is accredited by AAMIM (the Australian Association of Musical Instrument Makers) of which Marion is a

member, has featured on several TV magazine programmes and has now been awarded a grant by the Lord Mayor's Urban Initiative Fund.



At least twice a week, you will find Marion's workshop being used by various instrument makers who are able to follow their passion because of what Marion and other MOTT members have created.

CLIMATESMART INITIATIVE
