Your itinerary

The following pages contain general information about your car or motorcycle tour and the locations where you will stay. The order in which they appear may not be the order your hotels have been confirmed for you - for your individual itinerary please refer to your holiday documentation.







Advance planning

To decide on places to see and plan your route it's useful to refer to tourist office and travel websites such as Google maps, viamichelin.com (which will also show motorway tolls if applicable) or theaa.co.uk.

Hotel directions

With your travel documents is an information sheet for each hotel which has been booked for you giving directions together with some further details.

Arrival

Unless stated, you will be expected to arrive at each of the hotels prebooked for you by 6pm each day. This should allow time for a fairly leisurely drive between overnight stops but if you find you will be arriving later than this please ring the hotel so your room is held for you.

This tour is on a bed and breakfast basis.

Your itinerary gives you the opportunity to explore the stunningly beautiful Picos de Europa area as well as the unspoilt coastline, without the need to drive very far from either of our Spanish ports. You may wish to pack your walking shoes because this is a part of Spain ideally seen on foot, to take in the magnificent scenery and also to walk off the delicious traditional cooking you will find in northern Spain. Here we give some ideas of places you may like to visit in and around your overnight stops.



Cosgaya (Potes)

If you are driving from Bilbao, you may like to stop en route at Castro Urdiales on the Bay of Biscay. This has grown from a small fishing port to a modern seaside town with several lovely beaches and a backdrop of mountains. Cosgaya is in a wonderful setting nestled in a mountain valley - a perfect place to relax or go for a hike. The market town of Potes is a short drive away and is the centre and departure point for many outdoor pursuits (white water rafting, canoeing, mountain biking etc) and excursions into the Picos. These mountains are amongst the most spectacular and unspoilt in Europe and there are some incredibly scenic routes to follow. The flora and fauna is exceptional and it's possible to see a large number of birds including eagles and vultures - the mountain flowers can be breathtaking too, particularly early in the season.





Arenas de Cabrales

Arenas is known as the gateway to the Picos de Europa mountains and, like Potes, is a popular base for exploring the area with lots of walking trails and great rock climbing. The village produces a well known, veined cheese, Queso Cabrales, made from goat and sheep milk. Matured in caves, this strong flavoured cheese features in many local recipes and at the August cheese festival here.



The sanctuary of Covadonga, near Cangas de Onis is a recommended trip. Even viewed from the road it is impressive, particularly because of its beautiful setting, but a visit to the sanctuary and monastery itself attracts tourists from all around and is an interesting visit. In the Holy Cave is the tomb of Pelayo, who defeated the Moors here in 722 and became the first king of Asturias.







Ribadesella & Llanes

The lovely resorts of Ribadesella and Llanes are a good detour en route back to the ferry port. Ribadesella lies on two sides of an estuary - one half has a fine sandy beach and the other has the pretty old town and fishing harbour - and is also home to the Cueva de Tito Bustillo, a Unesco World Heritage Site where you can see some of the best and oldest cave art in the world (limited access so best to book ahead). Llanes, a fishing port and popular summer resort with a choice of wonderful beaches and coves and some excellent seafood restaurants.








Santander & Bilbao

Standing along the north shore of a great bay of stunning natural beauty, Santander is one of the most traditional holiday resorts of northern Spain where many of the Spanish themselves choose to holiday, escaping the more arid inland areas. There is a superb sandy beach, modern leisure amenities and an attractive promenade laid out with flower borders and trees, popular with the locals who enjoy strolling along it in the early evening and at weekends. The city has wonderful restaurants and shops plus a variety of nightlife and entertainment.



Over recent years Bilbao has been transformed into a vibrant modern city with plenty to entice tourists. The top visitor attraction is the Guggenheim Museum with its striking modern architecture which is spectacular both inside and out. There are permanent art displays and regular temporary exhibitions held here which are well worth a visit. There is much more to see (and best explored on foot) - the atmospheric Casco Viejo old quarter with its maze of cobbled streets filled with shops, cafés and restaurants; remarkable buildings, stunning bridges, squares, lovely parks, museums, art galleries. Shopping is also excellent and there is a large colourful Sunday market.
