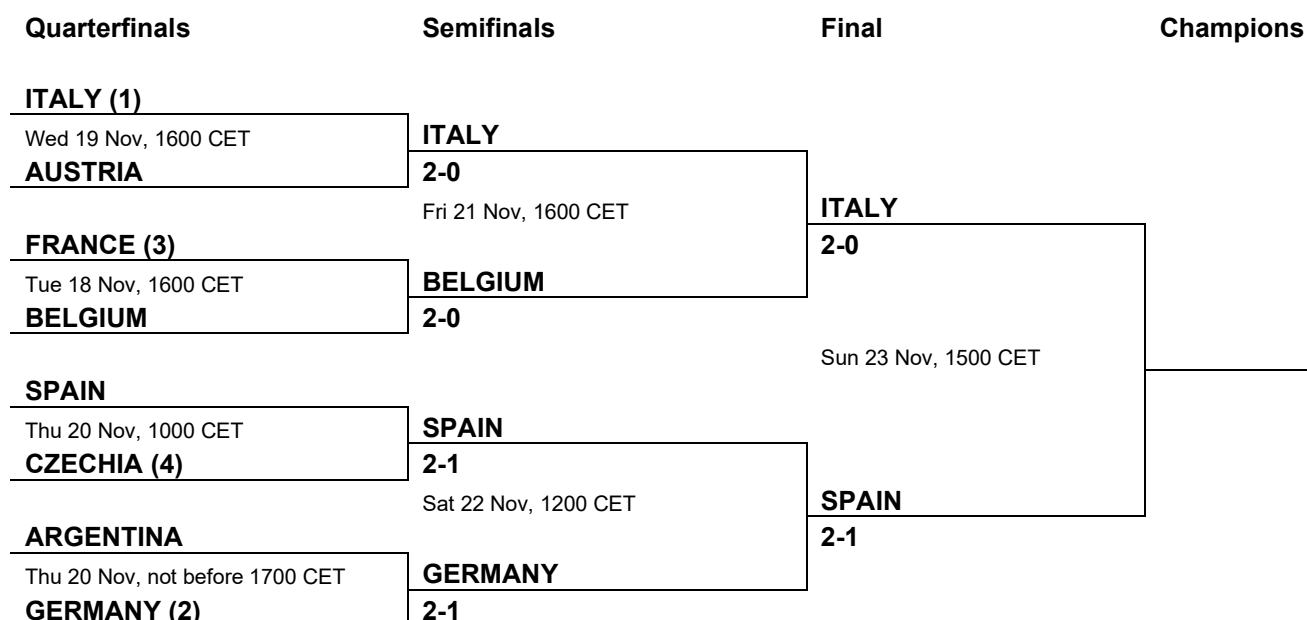
Italy v Spain

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### On court today:

- Italy are making their 3rd consecutive appearance in the Davis Cup final and are bidding to win their 3rd consecutive title in the competition. If they win today they would become the first nation to win 3 consecutive Davis Cup titles in the post-Challenge Round era and the first since USA, who won 5 consecutive titles from 1968 to 1972. USA won 4 consecutive titles only competing in the Challenge Round each year from 1968 to 1971 before winning their 5th consecutive title in 1972 in the first edition of the event without the Challenge Round. After defeating Austria 2-0 in the quarterfinals on Wednesday, Italy defeated Belgium 2-0 in the semifinals on Friday. Matteo Berrettini defeated Raphael Collignon in straight sets before Flavio Cobolli beat Zizou Bergs in a deciding set tiebreak which ended 17-15, the 6th longest tiebreak in Davis Cup history and 5th longest singles tiebreak in Davis Cup history. Cobolli and Bergs had 7 match points each in the match.
- Spain have reached the final for the first time since they won their 6th title in 2019. If they win the title today to claim their 7th title in the competition they will equal Sweden in 5th place on the all-time list for most Davis Cup titles won. After defeating Czechia 2-1 in the quarterfinals on Thursday, Spain defeated Germany 2-1 in the semifinals on Saturday. Pablo Carreno Busta defeated Jan-Lennard Struff in straight sets, recovering from 1-6 down in the second set tiebreak to win the match 6-4 7-6(6) before Jaume Munar fell in two close sets to Alexander Zverev 7-6(2) 7-6(5) to send the tie to a deciding doubles match. Marcel Granollers and Pedro Martinez then defeated Kevin Krawietz and Tim Puetz, ending an 8-match winning streak in Davis Cup doubles for the Germans.

A 14th Davis Cup meeting for Italy and Spain, but their first for 19 years. The two nations last met in the 2006 World Group play-offs, and today's captains Filippo Volandri and David Ferrer both played in that tie. Volandri defeated Tommy Robredo in the first match of the tie before Spain won the next four matches to win 4-1 in Santander, with Ferrer winning the 5th match against Andreas Seppi after the tie had already been decided.

The two nations first met 93 years ago in 1932 and faced each other 8 times between 1932 and 1992, with Italy leading the head-to-head 6-2 in that time. However, Spain lead the head-to-head from 1994 to present 4-1, only falling to Italy in the 1997 World Group quarterfinals in that time.

This is the 7th time the two nations have met in Italy, with Italy leading 5-1. Spain's win in Italy came in their most recent meeting in Italy, winning 3-2 in the 2005 World Group play-offs in Naples.

Italy lead the head-to-head 7-6 overall and this is a first meeting between the two nations in a best-of-three match tie. This is also their first meeting on indoor hard courts and their 3rd meeting indoors overall, with Italy defeating Spain 4-1 on indoor carpet courts in both the 1992 World Group first round and the 1997 World Group quarterfinals, both in Italy. Their 11 other meetings have all come on clay, with Spain leading 6-5 on that surface.

Before meeting in the final this year, the 1997 World Group quarterfinals were the latest stage of the event where they had met. Spain defeated Italy 4-1 in the 2000 World Group first round en route to winning their first title in the competition.

### Italy – Team Information

- **ITALY** are bidding to win the title for the 3rd consecutive year. They are making their 6th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals and their 3rd consecutive appearance in the final. They defeated Austria 2-0 in the quarterfinals on Wednesday and Belgium 2-0 in the semifinals on Friday.
- After Italy won the Billie Jean King Cup title this year, they are bidding to become the **3rd nation to win the Billie Jean King Cup title and the Davis Cup title in the same season on multiple occasions**, after USA (1963, 1969, 1978, 1979, 1981, 1982 and 1990) and Australia (1964, 1965 and 1973). By winning both the Billie Jean King Cup and the Davis Cup last year, Italy became the 5th nation to achieve the feat, after USA, Australia, Czechia (2012) and Russia (2021, competed as the Russian Tennis Federation).
- Italy are bidding to become the **first nation to win 3 consecutive Davis Cup titles since the Challenge Round was abolished following the 1971 event**. The last nation to win 3 or more consecutive Davis Cup titles was USA, who won 5 consecutive titles from 1968-72. From 1968-71 they won 4 consecutive titles only competing in the Challenge Round each year, before winning their 5th consecutive title in 1972 in the first edition without the Challenge Round.
- Italy are bidding to win their 4th Davis Cup title and claim sole ownership of 7th place on the **all-time list for most Davis Cup titles won**. In addition to their titles in 2023 and 2024, they also won the title in 1976 (d. Chile). They also finished runners-up on 6 occasions – in 1960 (l. Australia), 1961 (l. Australia), 1977 (l. Australia), 1979 (l. USA), 1980 (l. Czechoslovakia) and 1998 (l. Sweden).
- By reaching a 3rd consecutive Davis Cup final this year, Italy have become the **first nation to reach 3 consecutive Davis Cup finals since Australia in 2001**. Australia won the title in 1999 (d. France) before runner-up finishes in 2000 (l. Spain) and 2001 (l. France). Italy have also become just the 4th nation to achieve the feat since the Challenge Round was abolished following the 1971 event, after Sweden (7 consecutive finals from 1983-9 and 3 consecutive finals from 1996-8), USA (3 consecutive finals from 1990-2) and Australia (1999-2001).

- By winning the title last year, Italy became the **first nation to successfully defend a Davis Cup title since Czechia in 2012-13** and the 7th nation to do so since the Challenge Round was abolished, after USA (1978-9 and 1981-2), Sweden (1984-5 and 1997-8), Germany (1988-9 as Germany, F.R.), Spain (2008-9) and Czechia (2012-13).
- Italy are bidding to extend a **13-tie winning streak**. They have not lost a tie since falling to Canada 0-3 in the Finals Group Stage in 2023.
- **Last season**, Italy won their 3rd Davis Cup title. As 2023 champions they qualified automatically for the Finals group stage, where they defeated Brazil 2-1, Belgium 2-1 and Netherlands 2-1 to finish first in Group A, then defeated Argentina 2-1 in the quarterfinals, Australia 2-0 in the semifinals and Netherlands 2-0 in the final. As hosts, Italy automatically qualified for the Finals this year.
- Italy's Nicola Pietrangeli is the **leading all-time Davis Cup player**. He holds the record for playing the most matches (164), as well as the records for the most wins in singles (78-32) and is in 3rd place for the most wins in doubles (42-12). He also forms half of the most successful doubles partnership with Orlando Sirola (34-8).
- Italy are currently ranked No. 1 on the **Davis Cup Nations Ranking**, reaching the top ranking after winning the competition in November 2023. They are the 10th nation (alongside Argentina, Australia, Croatia, Czechia, France, Great Britain, Russia, Spain and Canada) to have been ranked No. 1 since the Davis Cup Nations Ranking was introduced.
- **Captain Filippo Volandri** has led the Italian team since 2021 and has a 20-3 tie win-loss record as captain, including leading Italy to the title in 2023 and 2024. He is bidding to become the 6th captain since the abolition of the Challenge Round in 1972 to win the Davis Cup title on 3 or more occasions, after Neale Fraser and Niki Pilic (both 4) and Yannick Noah, Hans Olsson and Shamil Tarpishev (all 3). He is one of 11 captains to have won the Davis Cup title on multiple occasions since 1972, after Fraser, Pilic, Noah, Olsson, Tarpishev and Arthur Ashe, Albert Costa, Tom Gorman, Carl-Axel Hageskog and Tony Trabert (all 2). As a player, he represented Italy in Davis Cup between 2001 and 2010 and had a 10-7 overall match win-loss record.

- **Davis Cup:** Cobolli defeated Filip Misolic to seal Italy's 2-0 victory against Austria in the quarterfinals on Wednesday and defeated Zizou Bergs to seal Italy's 2-0 victory against Belgium in the semifinals on Friday. The final set tiebreak of his win against Bergs ended 17-15, the 6th-longest tiebreak in Davis Cup history and the 5th-longest singles tiebreak in Davis Cup history. He is playing in the competition for the first time since his debut at the 2024 Finals Group Stage, where he won one of the 2 matches he contested, falling to Belgium's Bergs but defeating Netherlands' Tallon Griekspoor. He was not part of the team that competed in the 2024 Final 8 and won Italy's 3rd title.

- **Davis Cup:** Sonego could return to Davis Cup action for the first time since winning the title with Italy in 2023 this week. He won 5 of the 6 matches he contested in the competition in 2023, including partnering Jannik Sinner to defeat Novak Djokovic/Miomir Kecmanovic in the deciding doubles match of Italy's 2-1 victory against Serbia in the semifinals. He is bidding to extend a 5-match winning streak in the competition, having won the last 5 matches he has contested in the competition since falling to Canada's Alexis Galarneau at the 2023 Finals group stage. He has a 9-3 overall win-loss record in the competition across singles and doubles.

- **Davis Cup:** Berrettini defeated Jurij Rodionov to put Italy 1-0 up against Austria in the quarterfinals on Wednesday and defeated Raphael Collignon to put Italy 1-0 up against Belgium in the semifinals on Friday, extending his Davis Cup winning streak to 8 matches and his Davis Cup singles winning streak to 10 matches. He won all 6 matches he contested in the competition in 2024 as he helped Italy win their 3rd Davis Cup title. He defeated Brazil's Joao Fonseca, Belgium's Alexander Blockx and Netherlands' Botic van de Zandschulp at the Finals Group Stage in September before partnering Jannik Sinner to defeat Argentina's Maximo Gonzalez/Andres Molteni in the quarterfinals, defeating Australia's Thanasi Kokkinakis in the semifinals and defeating Netherlands' Van De Zandschulp in the first match of the final. He has a 13-4 win-loss record in the competition across singles and doubles since making his debut in 2019.

- **ANDREA VAVASSORI**

- **Davis Cup:** Vavassori made his Davis Cup debut at the 2024 Finals Group Stage, winning one of the 3 matches he contested, partnering Simone Bolelli in all 3 matches, defeating Belgium's Sander Gille/Joran Vliegen but falling to Brazil's Rafael Matos/Marcelo Melo and Netherlands' Wesley Koolhof/Botic van de Zandschulp. He was part of the team that competed in the 2024 Final 8 and won Italy's 3rd title but did not contest a match in the knockout stage.

- **SIMONE BOLELLI**

- **Davis Cup:** Bolelli has contested only doubles matches in the competition since 2016, winning 8 of the 18 Davis Cup doubles matches he has played in that time, including one of the 3 matches he contested in 2024, all partnering Vavassori at the Finals Group Stage as the pair defeated Belgium's Gille/Vliegen but fell to Brazil's Matos/Melo and Netherlands' Koolhof/Van de Zandschulp. He will claim sole ownership of 4th place on the list for most Davis Cup ties played by an Italian player if he contests a match today. He was part of the team that competed in the Final 8 in 2023 and 2024 and won Italy's 2nd and 3rd titles but did not contest a match in the knockout stage on either occasion.

## Spain – Team Information

- **SPAIN** are bidding to win the title for the first time since 2019. They are making their 6th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals and their first appearance in the final since 2019. They defeated Czechia 2-1 in the quarterfinals on Thursday and Germany 2-1 in the semifinals on Saturday.
- Spain are bidding to win their 7th Davis Cup title and equal Sweden in 5th place on the **all-time list for most Davis Cup titles won**. In addition to their title in 2019, they also won the title in 2000 (d. Australia), 2004 (d. USA), 2008 (d. Argentina), 2009 (d. Czechia) and 2011 (d. Argentina). They also finished runners-up in 1965 (l. Australia), 1967 (l. Australia), 2003 (l. Australia) and 2012 (l. Czechia).
- **In the Qualifiers 2nd Round**, Spain defeated Denmark 3-2 in Marbella by completing their first ever successful comeback from 0-2 down to advance to the Final 8 in Bologna. Trailing 0-2 after day one, Pedro Martinez and Jaume Munar defeated August Holmgren and Johannes Ingildsen before Martinez defeated Holger Rune, saving a match point, to equal the tie at 2-2 before Pablo Carreno Busta defeated Elmer Moeller to seal victory in the tie and send Spain to the Final 8. It was the 67th comeback from 0-2 down in Davis Cup history and the 2nd this season after Denmark defeated Serbia 3-2 in the Qualifiers 1st Round in Copenhagen.
- **Last season**, Spain reached the quarterfinals. They received a wild card for the Finals Group Stage, finishing in 1st place in Finals Group B in Valencia after defeating Czechia 3-0, France 2-1 and Australia 2-1. At the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga, they fell to Netherlands 1-2 in the quarterfinals.
- **In the Qualifiers 1st Round**, Spain defeated Switzerland 3-1 in Biel to advance to the Qualifiers 2nd Round. It was their first Davis Cup tie outside of Spain since 2018, when they fell to France in the semifinals in Lille.
- In 2019, Spain won their **6th Davis Cup title**, defeating Canada 2-0 in the final, with Roberto Bautista Agut and Rafael Nadal recording victories over Felix Auger-Aliassime and Denis Shapovalov, respectively.
- Spain are currently ranked No. 10 in the **Davis Cup Nations Rankings**. They are one of 10 nations to have held the No. 1 ranking (alongside Argentina, Australia, Canada, Croatia, Czechia, France, Great Britain, Italy and Russia), having been ranked No. 1 between September 2004 and September 2005, and again between July 2009 and February 2013.
- **Captain David Ferrer** has led the Spanish team since 2023 and has an 8-3 tie win-loss record as captain. He is bidding to become the 6th captain to lead Spain to a Davis Cup title after Albert Costa, who captained Spain to the title in 2009 and 2011, Javier Duarte (2000), Jordi Arrese (2004), Emilio Sanchez (2008) and Sergi Bruguera (2019). He is also bidding to become the 2nd Spanish player to win the Davis Cup as both a player and as a captain, after Costa, who won the title as a player in 2000 in addition to his two later wins as captain in 2009 and 2011. As a player, Ferrer represented Spain in Davis Cup between 2006 and 2018, was part of the Spanish teams that won the title in 2008, 2009 and 2011, had a 28-5 match win-loss record and is in 4th place on the list for most Davis Cup singles wins by a Spanish player.

- **Davis Cup:** Munar recorded his first Davis Cup singles win on Thursday by defeating Jiri Lehecka to level the quarterfinal tie against Czechia 1-1. He then fell to Alexander Zverev in the second match of Spain's 2-1 semifinal victory against Germany on Saturday. He returned to Davis Cup action for the first time since his debut in 2017 in the Qualifiers 1st Round tie against Switzerland in February, partnering Pedro Martinez to defeat Marc-Andrea Huesler/Dominic Stricker in the only match he contested, his first in live play. In Spain's 3-2 victory against Denmark in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September he lost to Elmer Moeller before partnering Martinez to defeat August Holmgren/Johannes Ingildsen to begin Spain's comeback from 0-2 down. His only previous appearance came in Spain's 1-3 defeat to Serbia in the 2017 World Group quarterfinals, falling to Dusan Lajovic after the tie had already been decided.
