Spain v Germany

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On court today:

- Spain have reached the semifinals for the first time since they won their 6th title in 2019. Their last two ties have been comeback victories, as the team recorded their nations first comeback from 0-2 down in the competition against Denmark in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September before recovering from 0-1 down against Czechia in the quarterfinals on Thursday. After Pablo Carreno Busta fell in straight sets to Jakub Mensik, Jaume Munar recorded both his first Davis Cup singles win and his first win against Jiri Lehecka by defeating the Czechs in straight sets. In the deciding doubles, Pedro Martinez and Marcel Granollers sealed the tie by defeating Tomas Machac and Mensik in two tiebreak sets, 10-8 in both tiebreaks.
- After falling at this stage last year Germany are once again bidding to reach the Davis Cup final for a 6th time, but for the first time since they last won the competition 32 years ago in 1993. Prior to falling to Netherlands in the semifinals last year, they reached the semifinals 4 times between 1993 and 2023, in 1994, 1995, 2007 and 2021, falling to Russia on all four occasions, who competed as the Russian Tennis Federation in 2021. They defeated Argentina 2-1 in the quarterfinals on Thursday, doing so in similar fashion to Spain with a comeback victory. Jan-Lennard Struff fell to Tomas Martin Etcheverry in 2 tiebreak sets before Alexandeer Zverev levelled the tie by defeating Francisco Cerundolo in straight sets. In the deciding doubles, Andres Molteni and Horacio Zeballos and Kevin Krawietz and Tim Puetz shared 8 match points in a final set tiebreak. The Germans eventually won it 12-10 on their 5th match point after saving 3 match points for the Argentinians.

An 18th Davis Cup meeting for Spain and Czechia, their 5th since 2000. Their first meeting came 97 years ago in 1928 in the second round of the Europe Zone, with Germany winning 3-2 in Berlin. Germany lead 10-7 in the head-to-head, winning 8 of the first 10 meetings between the two nations from 1928 to 1985. Spain lead 5-2 in the head-to-head since 1985, including 3-1 since 2000. They defeated Germany in the quarterfinals in both 2008 and 2009 en route to their 3rd and 4th titles.

The two nations have never contested a Davis Cup final, but they have met at the equivalent of this stage before, in the 1970 Inter-Zonal final, the tie which determined who would face the defending champion for the title in the Challenge Round. Germany, F.R. won 4-1 in 1970 to reach the Challenge Round for the first time where they fell 0-5 to USA.

This is a first meeting between the two nations outside of Spain and Germany. Two of their 4 meetings since 2000 have come on indoor hard courts, with Spain winning 4-1 in Bremen in 2008 and Germany winning 4-1 in Frankfurt in 2014. This is a first meeting between the 2 nations in a best-of-three match tie.

Spain – Team Information

- [SPAIN](#) are bidding to reach the final for the first time since they won the title in 2019. They are making their 6th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals and their first appearance in the semifinals since 2019. They defeated Czechia 2-1 in the quarterfinals on Thursday.
- **In the Qualifiers 2nd Round**, Spain defeated Denmark 3-2 in Marbella by completing their first ever successful comeback from 0-2 down to advance to the Final 8 in Bologna. Trailing 0-2 after day one, Pedro Martinez and Jaume Munar defeated August Holmgren and Johannes Ingildsen before Martinez defeated Holger Rune, saving a match point, to equal the tie at 2-2 before Pablo Carreno Busta defeated Elmer Moeller to seal victory in the tie and send Spain to the Final 8. It was the 67th comeback from 0-2 down in Davis Cup history and the 2nd this season after Denmark defeated Serbia 3-2 in the Qualifiers 1st Round in Copenhagen.
- **Last season**, Spain reached the quarterfinals. They received a wild card for the Finals Group Stage, finishing in 1st place in Finals Group B in Valencia after defeating Czechia 3-0, France 2-1 and Australia 2-1. At the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga, they fell to Netherlands 1-2 in the quarterfinals.
- **In the Qualifiers 1st Round**, Spain defeated Switzerland 3-1 in Biel to advance to the Qualifiers 2nd Round. It was their first Davis Cup tie outside of Spain since 2018, when they fell to France in the semifinals in Lille.
- In 2019, Spain won their **6th Davis Cup title**, defeating Canada 2-0 in the final, with Roberto Bautista Agut and Rafael Nadal recording victories over Felix Auger-Aliassime and Denis Shapovalov, respectively.
- Spain are bidding to win their 7th Davis Cup title this season and equal Sweden in 5th place on the **all-time list for most Davis Cup titles won**. In addition to their title in 2019, they also won the title in 2000 (d. Australia), 2004 (d. USA), 2008 (d. Argentina), 2009 (d. Czechia) and 2011 (d. Argentina). They also finished runners-up in 1965 (l. Australia), 1967 (l. Australia), 2003 (l. Australia) and 2012 (l. Czechia).
- Spain are currently ranked No. 10 in the **Davis Cup Nations Rankings**. They are one of 10 nations to have held the No. 1 ranking (alongside Argentina, Australia, Canada, Croatia, Czechia, France, Great Britain, Italy

and Russia), having been ranked No. 1 between September 2004 and September 2005, and again between July 2009 and February 2013.

- **Captain David Ferrer** has led the Spanish team since 2023 and has an 7-3 tie win-loss record as captain. As a player, he represented Spain in Davis Cup between 2006 and 2018, was part of the Spanish teams that won the title in 2008, 2009 and 2011 and had a 28-5 overall match win-loss record. He is in 4th place on the list for most Davis Cup singles matches won by a Spanish player.

 - **Davis Cup:** Munar recorded his first Davis Cup singles win on Thursday by defeating Jiri Lehecka to level the quarterfinal tie against Czechia 1-1. He returned to Davis Cup action for the first time since his debut in 2017 in the Qualifiers 1st Round tie against Switzerland in February, partnering Pedro Martinez to defeat Marc-Andrea Huesler/Dominic Stricker in the only match he contested, his

first in live play. In Spain's 3-2 victory against Denmark in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September he lost to Elmer Moeller before partnering Martinez to defeat August Holmgren/Johannes Ingildsen to begin Spain's comeback from 0-2 down. His only previous appearance came in Spain's 1-3 defeat to Serbia in the 2017 World Group quarterfinals, falling to Dusan Lajovic after the tie had already been decided.

- **Davis Cup:** Martinez has won 6 of the 7 matches he has contested in the competition since the start of 2024, including partnering Marcel Granollers to defeat Tomas Machac/Jakub Mensik in the deciding doubles of Spain's 2-1 victory against Czechia in the quarterfinals on Thursday. He has also won the other 4 matches he has contested in the competition in 2025, defeating Stricker and partnering Munar to defeat Huesler/Stricker in Spain's 3-1 victory against Switzerland in the Qualifiers 1st Round and partnering Munar to defeat Holmgren/Ingildsen and defeating Holger Rune to bring the score to 2-2 in Spain's 3-2 victory against Denmark in the Qualifiers 2nd Round as they completed their first comeback from 0-2 down.

- **Davis Cup:** Carreno Busta has won one of the 3 matches he has contested in 2025. He fell to Mensik in the first match of Spain's 2-1 victory against Czechia in the quarterfinals on Thursday. Earlier this year he fell to Rune before defeating Moeller to complete Spain's first comeback from 0-2 down to defeat Denmark 3-2 in the Qualifiers 2nd Round. He has a 7-10 win-loss record overall across singles and doubles in the competition since making his debut in 2016 and was a member of the Spanish team which won their 6th Davis Cup title in 2019.

- **Davis Cup:** Granollers partnered Martinez to defeat Machac/Mensik in the deciding doubles of Spain's 2-1 victory against Czechia in the quarterfinals on Thursday in the first match he has contested in the competition this year. He won 2 of the 4 matches he contested in the competition in 2024. At the Finals Group Stage he partnered Alcaraz to defeat Czechia's Mensik/Adam Pavlasek before partnering Carreno Busta in defeat to France's Pierre-Hugues Herbert/Edouard Roger-Vasselin and partnering Martinez to defeat Australia's Matthew Ebden/Max Purcell. At the Final 8 he partnered Alcaraz in the decisive doubles match of Spain's quarterfinal tie against Netherlands as the pair fell to Koolhof/Van de Zandschulp. He has a 14-13 overall win-loss record in the competition since making his debut in 2010. He was a member of both the Spanish team which finished runners-up to Czechia in 2012, and of the Spanish team which won the nation's 6th Davis Cup title in 2019, winning all 3 matches he contested at the 2019 Finals.

Germany – Team Information

- **GERMANY** are bidding to reach the final for the first time since they won their last title in 1993. They are making their 5th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals and their 2nd consecutive appearance in the semifinals. They defeated Argentina 2-1 in the quarterfinals on Thursday.
- Germany are contesting their **250th Davis Cup tie today**, becoming the 7th nation to contest 250 or more ties in the competition, after USA (312 ties played), Australia (285), France (played 277th tie against Belgium in the quarterfinals) and Italy (played 277th tie against Belgium in the semifinals), Great Britain (270) and Sweden (254). They have a 163-86 win-loss record in Davis Cup ties in their history.
- **In the Qualifiers 2nd Round**, Germany defeated Japan 4-0 in Tokyo to advance to the Final 8 in Bologna. Kevin Krawietz and Tim Puetz defeated Yosuke Watanuki and Takeru Yuzuki to seal victory in the tie and send Germany to the Final 8.
- **Last season**, Germany reached the semifinals. They defeated Hungary 3-2 in the Qualifiers before finishing in 2nd place in Finals Group C in Zhuhai, defeating Slovakia 3-0 and Chile 3-0 before falling to USA 1-2. At the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga, they defeated Canada 2-0 in the quarterfinals before falling to Netherlands 0-2 in the semifinals.
- **In the Qualifiers 1st Round**, Germany defeated Israel 3-1 in Vilnius, Lithuania to advance to the Qualifiers 2nd Round.
- Germany have won **3 Davis Cup titles**, most recently in 1993 when they defeated Australia. They also won the title in 1988-89, defeating Sweden on both occasions.
- Germany are currently ranked No. 3 in the **Davis Cup Nations Rankings** – their highest ranking since the rankings were introduced in 2001.
- **Captain Michael Kohlmann** has led the German team since 2015 and has a 23-10 tie win-loss record as captain. As a player, he represented Germany in Davis Cup between 2000 and 2007 and had a 4-4 overall match win-loss record.

- **Davis Cup:** Puetz has won 20 of the 21 Davis Cup matches he has contested, only competing in doubles, including partnering Krawietz to defeat Molteni/Zeballos in the deciding doubles match of Germany's 2-1 victory against Argentina in the quarterfinals on Thursday. His only defeat in the competition came in the decisive doubles match of Germany's quarterfinal defeat to Canada in 2022, when he and Krawietz fell to Pospisil/Shapovalov. The pair have since won all 8 Davis Cup matches they have contested together, including earlier this year defeating Israel's Cukierman/Vales in the Qualifiers 1st Round and Japan's Watanuki/Yuzuki in the Qualifiers 2nd Round. He is in 2nd place on the list for most Davis Cup doubles matches won by a German player.
