

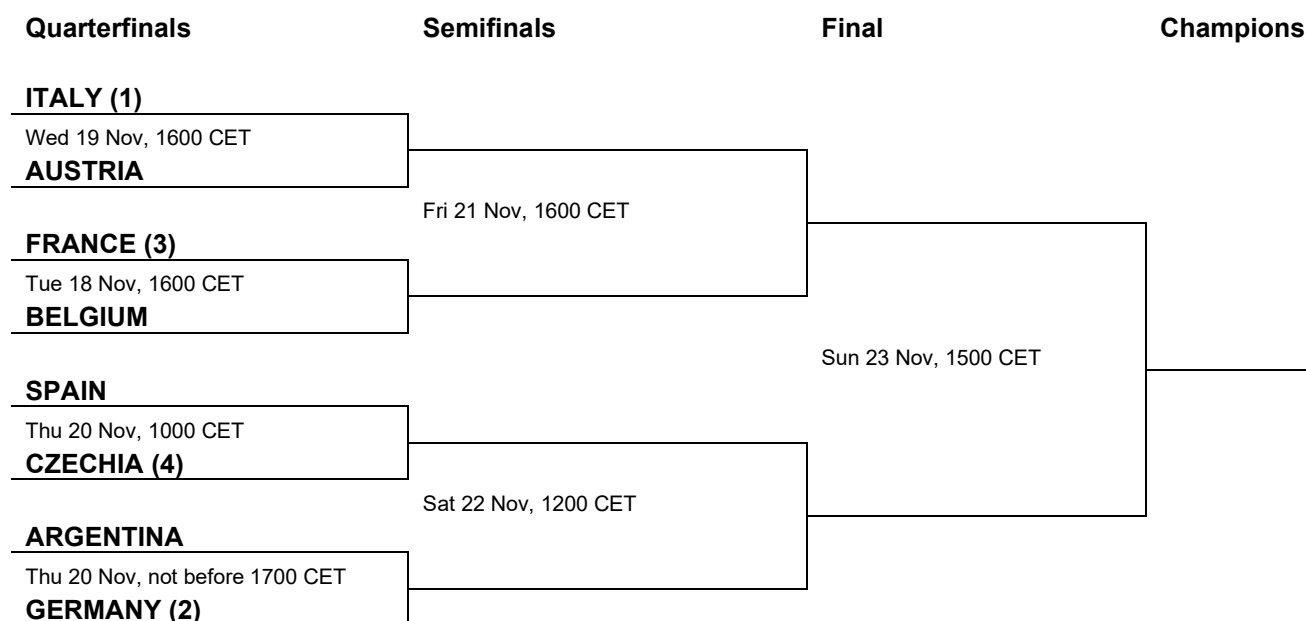

FORMAT

The quarterfinals take place from Tuesday 18 to Thursday 20 November, with 2 ties taking place on Thursday. The semifinals will be played on Friday 21 and Saturday 22 November, before the 2025 Davis Cup final is contested on Sunday 23 November.



FINAL 8 SCHEDULE

The Final 8 knockout stage begins on Tuesday 18 November, with France up against Belgium.

QUARTERFINAL HEAD-TO-HEADS

All 4 quarterfinal ties are well-established Davis Cup rivalries, with each match-up having been contested at least 6 times.

France lead Belgium 6-3

On Tuesday, France face Belgium for a 10th time, 121 years after their first Davis Cup meeting in 1904. That meeting, which was won by Belgium 3-2, was both nations' first-ever Davis Cup tie. Belgium's most-recent victory against France came in the 1997 World Group qualifying round, with France having won the nations' last 4 meetings, including in the 2017 Final, when France won 3-2 to claim their 10th and most recent title. Since then, the nations' only Davis Cup meeting came at the 2022 Finals group stage in Hamburg, with France winning 2-1.

Italy lead Austria 5-1

On Wednesday, defending champions Italy take on Austria in a 7th meeting between the two nations – but their first in 35 years. Between 1930 and 1972, Italy won the first 5 meetings between the two nations. Austria claimed their only win over Italy to date in their most-recent meeting, winning 5-0 in the 1990 World Group quarterfinals in Vienna. Austria's semifinal finish that season remains their best Davis Cup result.

Spain lead Czechia 5-4

On Thursday morning, Czechia face Spain in a 10th Davis Cup meeting between the two nations. The head-to-head has remained close throughout their history in the competition – the two nations traded wins in their first 4 meetings between 1931 and 1972, but did not meet again until 2004, when Spain won 3-2 in the World Group first round in 2004 en route to the title. The nations then met in 2 Davis Cup finals – in 2009, when Spain defeated Czechia 5-0 in Barcelona, before Czechia recorded a 3-2 win against Spain in the 2012 final in Prague. The nations' 2 Davis Cup meetings since then came at the Finals Group Stage in Valencia in 2023 and 2024 – Czechia won 3-0 in 2023 before Spain won 3-0 in 2024.

Argentina lead Germany 7-3

On Thursday evening, Argentina take on Germany for the 11th time in Davis Cup history. Germany won the nations' first meeting in 1936, but the teams did not meet again until 1981, with Argentina winning 4 consecutive ties against Germany before the Germans ended that losing streak in a World Group quarterfinal tie in 1991. Argentina won the next 3 meetings between the nations (2003, 2012 and 2013), but Germany won their most-recent clash at the 2019 Finals in Madrid – a 3-0 victory, which included a doubles victory for Kevin Krawietz and Andreas Mies against Maximo Gonzalez and Leonardo Mayer; the 38 point tiebreak in the deciding set of that match is the longest tiebreak in Davis Cup history.

2026 DAVIS CUP

As host nation for the Final 8 for 2025-27, Italy will receive a wild card for the 2026 Davis Cup Final 8. The other 7 teams at the 2025 Final 8, the 7 losing teams from the 2025 Qualifiers 2nd Round and the 13 winning teams from the 2025 World Group I ties will compete in the 2026 Davis Cup Qualifiers. The 2026 Qualifiers first round will take place in February and the 2026 Qualifiers second round will take place in September (NB the 2025 Davis Cup champions will receive a bye to the 2026 Qualifiers second round).

PAST CHAMPIONS

In total, 16 nations have won the Davis Cup. Two nations competing at the Final 8 knockout stage this year have never previously won the Davis Cup title: Austria and Belgium.

NATIONS AND PLAYERS

158 nations entered the Davis Cup during 2025. 882 players have been nominated to represent their nations this season – of whom 655 have played at least one match so far. The figure for number of nations competing this year equals the all-time record set in 2024.

DAVIS CUP NATIONS RANKING

Argentina – Team Information

- **ARGENTINA** are bidding to reach the semifinals for the first time since 2016. They are making their 4th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals.
- **In the Qualifiers 2nd Round**, Argentina defeated 2024 finalists Netherlands 3-1 in Groningen to advance to the Final 8 in Bologna. Andres Molteni and Horacio Zeballos defeated Sander Arends and Botic van de Zandschulp in the doubles match to put Argentina 3-0 up and seal the victory in the tie before Jesper de Jong defeated Francisoc Comesana to make the final tie score 3-1.
- **Last season**, Argentina defeated Kazakhstan 3-2 in the Qualifiers and finished as runners-up at the Finals Group D, falling to Canada 1-2 before defeating Great Britain 2-1 and Finland 3-0. They fell to Italy 1-2 in the quarterfinals at the Final 8 in Malaga.
- **In the Qualifiers 1st Round**, Argentina defeated Norway 3-2 in Oslo to advance to the Qualifiers 2nd Round. Mariano Navone defeated Nicolai Budkov Kjaer from a set down in the decisive 5th match to seal the victory for Argentina.
- In 2016, Argentina **won the Davis Cup title for the first time in their history**. They defeated Poland 3-2 in Gdansk, Italy 3-1 in Pesaro, Great Britain 3-2 in Glasgow and Croatia 3-2 in Zagreb to become just the 2nd nation to win the title after playing all four ties away from home after France in 2001.
- Prior to winning the title in 2016, Argentina held the record for **most appearances in the Davis Cup final without victory**. They have finished runner-up on 4 occasions – in 1981, 2006, 2008 and 2011.
- Argentina will bid to **win their 100th Davis Cup tie** in the quarterfinals against Germany and become the 15th nation to win 100 Davis Cup ties.
- Argentina are jointly-ranked at No. 8 in the **Davis Cup Nations Rankings**, alongside Czechia. They are one of 10 nations to rank No. 1 since the Rankings (8 Sep) were introduced in 2001 (alongside Australia, Canada, Croatia, Czechia, France, Great Britain, Italy, Russia and Spain), having been ranked No. 1 between November 2016 and October 2017.

- **Captain Javier Frana** has led the Argentinian team since the beginning of 2025 and has won both ties he has overseen as captain, Argentina's 3-2 victory against Norway in the Qualifiers 1st Round and Argentina's 3-1 victory against Netherlands in the Qualifiers 2nd Round. As a player, he represented Argentina in Davis Cup between 1986 and 1997 and had an 18-19 overall match win-loss record. He is in 5th place on the list for most Davis Cup match-wins by an Argentinian player and for most ties played by an Argentinian player.

 - **Davis Cup:** Cerundolo won the only match he has contested in the competition in 2025, defeating Botic van de Zandschulp in Argentina's 3-1 victory against Netherlands in the Qualifiers 2nd Round. He was not nominated for the 2025 Qualifiers 1st Round tie against Norway. He has won 5 of the 7 matches he contested in the competition since the start of 2024. He has a 7-4 win-loss record since making his debut in 2022, only ever competing in singles.
- **TOMAS MARTIN ETCHEVERRY**
 - **Age:** 26 (born 18 July 1999 in La Plata, Argentina)
 - **2025 singles highlights:** SF Hamburg; QF Santiago, Halle, Hangzhou, Stockholm
 - **2025 doubles highlights:** SF Buenos Aires
 - **Davis Cup:** Etcheverry has won 2 of the 3 matches he has contested in the competition in 2025, defeating Nicolai Budkov Kjaer and falling to Casper Ruud in Argentina's 3-2 victory against Norway in the Qualifiers 1st Round and defeating Jesper de Jong in Argentina's 3-1 victory against Netherlands in the Qualifiers 2nd Round. He has a 5-2 win-loss record since making his competition debut in 2023, only ever competing in singles.
- **FRANCISCO COMESANA**
 - **Age:** 25 (born 6 October 2000 in Mar del Plata, Argentina)
 - **2025 singles highlights:** SF Rio de Janeiro; QF Bucharest, Gstaad; R16 Cincinnati-1000
 - **Davis Cup:** Comesana made his Davis Cup debut in the Qualifiers 2nd Round earlier this year but is yet to contest a live match in the competition. He fell to De Jong in the 4th match of Argentina's 3-1 victory against Netherlands after the tie had already been decided.
- **HORACIO ZEBALLOS**
 - **Age:** 40 (born 27 April 1985 in Mar del Plata, Argentina)
 - **2025 doubles highlights:** Won Bucharest, Madrid-1000, Roland Garros, US Open, Basel; SF Wimbledon; QF Rome-1000
 - **Davis Cup:** Zeballos made his first Davis Cup appearance since the 2022 Finals in the Qualifiers 1st Round tie against Norway in January, partnering Andres Molteni to defeat Viktor Durasovic/Casper Ruud in the doubles match in Argentina's 3-2 victory before again partnering Molteni to defeat Sander Arends/Botic van de Zandschulp in Argentina's 3-1 victory against Netherlands in the Qualifiers 2nd Round. He has won 8 of the last 10 matches he has contested in the competition, has contested 17 ties in the competition since making his debut in 2010 and will equal Guillermo Villas in 2nd place on the list for most Davis Cup doubles matches won by an Argentinian player if he wins a doubles match this week.
- **ANDRES MOLTENI**
 - **Age:** 37 (born 15 March 1988 in Buenos Aires, Argentina)
 - **2025 doubles highlights:** RU Santiago, Hamburg; SF Auckland, Rio de Janeiro, Washington, Toronto-1000; QF Indian Wells-1000, Miami-1000, Madrid-1000, Paris-1000
 - **Davis Cup:** Molteni has won 5 of the 7 Davis Cup matches he has contested since the start of 2024, including partnering Zeballos to defeat Durasovic/Ruud in the doubles match of Argentina's 3-2 victory against Norway in the Qualifiers 1st Round and to defeat Arends/Van De Zandschulp in Argentina's 3-1 victory against Netherlands in the Qualifiers 2nd Round. He only played 3 matches in the competition prior to 2024 and has a 6-4 win-loss record in the competition since making his debut in 2017, only competing in doubles.

Austria – Team Information

- [AUSTRIA](#) are bidding to reach the semifinals for the first time since 1990 and equal their best Davis Cup result. They are making their 2nd appearance at the Davis Cup Finals, after 2021, and their first appearance in the quarterfinals since 2012.
- **In the Qualifiers 2nd Round**, Austria defeated Hungary 3-2 in Debrecen to advance to the Final 8 in Bologna. Jurij Rodionov and Lukas Neumayer defeated Fabian Marozsan and Marton Fucsovics respectively to put Austria 2-0 up after day one before Marozsan and Zsombor Piros defeated Alexander Erler and Lucas Miedler and Piros defeated Neumayer to level the tie at 2-2. Rodionov defeated Fucsovics in the deciding 5th match to send Austria to the Final 8.
- **Last season**, Austria defeated Ireland 4-0 in the World Group I Play-offs and defeated Turkiye 3-0 in a World Group I tie to secure their place in the 2025 Qualifiers 1st Round.
- **In the Qualifiers 1st Round**, Austria defeated Finland 4-0 in Schwechat to advance to the Qualifiers 2nd Round.
- Austria's **best Davis Cup performance** is reaching the semifinals in 1990, when they came within one set of reaching the final, but eventually lost to USA 3-2.
- Austria are ranked at No. 12 in the **Davis Cup Nations Rankings**. Their highest ranking is No. 8, which they achieved in February 2012.
- **Captain Jurgen Melzer** has led the Austrian team since 2022, except for the 2024 World Group I tie against Turkiye, and has a 4-3 win-loss record as captain. As a player, he represented Austria in Davis Cup between 1999 and 2020 and had a 37-41 overall match win-loss record. Belgium – Team Information

- **BELGIUM** are bidding to reach the semifinals for the first time since 2017. They are making their 4th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals, and their first appearance in the quarterfinals since 2018.
- **In the Qualifiers 2nd Round**, Belgium defeated Australia 3-2 in Sydney to advance to the Final 8 in Bologna. Raphael Collignon and Zizou Bergs defeated Alex de Minaur and Jordan Thompson respectively to put Belgium 2-0 up after day one before Rinky Hijikata and Thompson defeated Sander Gille and Joran Vliegen and De Minaur defeated Bergs to level the tie at 2-2. Collignon defeated Aleksandar Vukic in the deciding 5th match to send Belgium to the Final 8.
- **Last season**, Belgium defeated Croatia 3-1 in the Qualifiers to advance to the Finals Group Stage. They won one of the 3 ties they contested in Finals Group A in Bologna – defeating Netherlands 2-1 but falling to Italy 1-2 and Brazil 1-2 – and did not advance to the Final 8 Knockout Stage.
- **In the Qualifiers 1st Round**, Belgium defeated Chile 3-1 in Hasselt to advance to the Qualifiers 2nd Round.
- Having finished runner-up in 1904 (I. British Isles), 2015 (I. Great Britain) and 2017 (I. France), Belgium jointly hold the record for **most appearances in the Davis Cup final without ever having won the title**, alongside India and Romania.
- Belgium are currently ranked at No. 11 in the **Davis Cup Nations Rankings**. Their highest ranking is No. 3, which they reached for the first time in November 2017.
- **Captain Steve Darcis** has led the Belgian team since their 2023 World Group I tie against Uzbekistan and has a 5-2 win-loss record as captain. As a player, he represented Belgium in Davis Cup between 2005 and 2019, had a 24-19 overall match win-loss record and was part of the Belgian teams that finished runner-up in 2015 and 2017, playing at least one match at every stage of the World Group draw in both seasons. France – Team Information

- **FRANCE** are bidding to reach the semifinals for the first time since 2018. They are making their 6th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals and their first appearance in the quarterfinals since 2018.
- **In the Qualifiers 2nd Round**, France defeated Croatia 3-1 in Osijek to advance to the Final 8 in Bologna. Davis Cup debutant Corentin Moutet won both singles matches he contested, including defeating Marin Cilic to seal victory in the tie and send France to the Final 8.
- **Last season**, France defeated Chinese Taipei 4-0 in the Qualifiers before finishing in 3rd place in Finals Group B in Valencia, where they fell to Australia 1-2 and Spain 1-2 before defeating Czechia 2-1.
- **In the Qualifiers 1st Round**, France defeated Brazil 4-0 in Orleans to advance to the Qualifiers 2nd Round. It was their first home tie since defeating Ecuador 4-0 in the 2022 Qualifiers.
- France have **won the Davis Cup title on 10 previous occasions** – most recently in 2017, when they defeated Belgium in Lille. They have finished runner-up on 9 occasions, including in 2014 (l. Switzerland) and 2018 (l. Croatia).
- France are bidding to win their 11th Davis Cup title this year and claim sole ownership of **3rd place on the list for most Davis Cup titles**, ahead of Great Britain. They equalled Great Britain in 3rd place on the list after winning their 10th title in 2017.
- France are currently ranked at No. 6 in the **Davis Cup Nations Rankings**. They are one of 10 nations to have held the No. 1 ranking, alongside Argentina, Australia, Canada, Croatia, Czechia, Italy, Great Britain, Russia and Spain. They first reached the No. 1 ranking in February 2002 and most recently held the No. 1 ranking uninterrupted for over 4 years, from November 2017 to December 2021.
- **Captain Paul-Henri Mathieu** has led the French team since the start of 2024 and has a 4-2 win-loss record as captain. As a player, he represented France in Davis Cup between 2002 and 2008 and had a 4-8 overall match win-loss record. He was part of the French team that finished runner-up in 2002, falling to Russia 2-3 in the final.

- [GERMANY](#) are bidding to reach the semifinals for the 2nd consecutive year. They are making their 5th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals and their 5th appearance in the quarterfinals in the last 6 editions.
- **In the Qualifiers 2nd Round**, Germany defeated Japan 4-0 in Tokyo to advance to the Final 8 in Bologna. Kevin Krawietz and Tim Puetz defeated Yosuke Watanuki and Takeru Yuzuki to seal victory in the tie and send Germany to the Final 8.
- **Last season**, Germany reached the semifinals. They defeated Hungary 3-2 in the Qualifiers before finishing in 2nd place in Finals Group C in Zhuhai, defeating Slovakia 3-0 and Chile 3-0 before falling to USA 1-2. At the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga, they defeated Canada 2-0 in the quarterfinals before falling to Netherlands 0-2 in the semifinals.
- **In the Qualifiers 1st Round**, Germany defeated Israel 3-1 in Vilnius, Lithuania to advance to the Qualifiers 2nd Round.
- Germany have won **3 Davis Cup titles**, most recently in 1993 when they defeated Australia. They also won the title in 1988-89, defeating Sweden on both occasions.
- Germany are currently ranked No. 3 in the **Davis Cup Nations Rankings** – their highest ranking since the rankings were introduced in 2001.
- **Captain Michael Kohlmann** has led the German team since 2015 and has a 22-10 tie win-loss record as captain. As a player, he represented Germany in Davis Cup between 2000 and 2007 and had a 4-4 overall match win-loss record.

As host nation, Italy received a wild card for the 2025 Final 8.

Italy – Team Information

- [ITALY](#) are bidding to reach the semifinals for the 4th consecutive year. They are making their 6th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals and their 5th consecutive appearance in the quarterfinals.
- Italy are bidding to win a **3rd consecutive Davis Cup title** and become the first nation to win 3 consecutive Davis Cup titles since the Challenge Round was abolished following the 1971 event. By winning the title last year they became the first nation to successfully defend a Davis Cup title since Czechia in 2012-13 and the 7th nation to do so since the Challenge Round was abolished, after USA (1978-9 and 1981-2), Sweden (1984-5 and 1997-8), Germany (1988-9 as Germany, F.R.), Spain (2008-9) and Czechia (2012-13).
- Italy are bidding to extend an **11-tie winning streak**. They have not lost a tie since falling to Canada 0-3 in the Finals Group Stage in 2023.
- **Last season**, Italy won their 3rd Davis Cup title. As 2023 champions they qualified automatically for the Finals group stage, where they defeated Brazil 2-1, Belgium 2-1 and Netherlands 2-1 to finish first in Group A, then defeated Argentina 2-1 in the quarterfinals, Australia 2-0 in the semifinals and Netherlands 2-0 in the final. As hosts, Italy automatically qualified for the Finals this year.
- Italy have won **3 Davis Cup titles**, in 1976, defeating Chile in the final, in 2023, defeating Australia in the final and last year. They have finished as runners-up on 6 further occasions – most recently in 1998, when they fell to Sweden.
- Italy's Nicola Pietrangeli is the **leading all-time Davis Cup player**. He holds the record for playing the most matches (164), as well as the records for the most wins in singles (78-32) and is in 3rd place for the most wins in doubles (42-12). He also forms half of the most successful doubles partnership with Orlando Sirola (34-8).
- Italy are currently ranked No. 1 on the **Davis Cup Nations Ranking**, reaching the top ranking after winning the competition in November 2023. They are the 10th nation (alongside Argentina, Australia, Croatia, Czechia, France, Great Britain, Russia, Spain and Canada) to have been ranked No. 1 since the Davis Cup Nations Ranking was introduced.
- **Captain Filippo Volandri** has led the Italian team since 2021 and has an 18-3 tie win-loss record as captain, including leading Italy to the title in 2023 and 2024. He is bidding to become the 6th captain since the abolition of the Challenge Round in 1972 to win the Davis Cup title on 3 or more occasions, after Neale Fraser and Niki Pilic (both 4) and Yannick Noah, Hans Olsson and Shamil Tarpishev (all 3). He is one of 11 captains to have won the Davis Cup title on multiple occasions since 1972, after Fraser, Pilic, Noah, Olsson, Tarpishev and Arthur Ashe, Albert Costa, Tom Gorman, Carl-Axel Hageskog and Tony Trabert (all 2). As a player, he represented Italy in Davis Cup between 2001 and 2010 and had a 10-7 overall match win-loss record.

- **Davis Cup:** Vavassori made his Davis Cup debut at the 2024 Finals Group Stage, winning one of the 3 matches he contested, partnering Simone Bolelli in all 3 matches, defeating Belgium's Sander Gille/Joran Vliegen but falling to Brazil's Rafael Matos/Marcelo Melo and Netherlands' Wesley Koolhof/Botic van de Zandschulp. He was part of the team that competed in the 2024 Final 8 and won Italy's 3rd title but did not contest a match in the knockout stage.

- **SIMONE BOLELLI**

- **Age:** 40 (born 8 October 1985 in Bologna, Italy)
- **2025 doubles highlights:** Won Adelaide, Rotterdam, Hamburg, Washington; RU Australian Open, Halle; SF Stockholm; QF Cincinnati-1000
- **Davis Cup:** Bolelli has contested only doubles matches in the competition since 2016, winning 8 of the 18 Davis Cup doubles matches he has played in that time, including one of the 3 matches he contested in 2024, all partnering Vavassori at the Finals Group Stage as the pair defeated Belgium's Gille/Vliegen but fell to Brazil's Matos/Melo and Netherlands' Koolhof/Van de Zandschulp. He will claim sole ownership of 4th place on the list for most Davis Cup ties played by an Italian player if he contests a match this week. He was part of the team that competed in the Final 8 in 2023 and 2024 and won Italy's 2nd and 3rd titled but did not contest a match in the knockout stage on either occasion.

Spain – Team Information

- **SPAIN** are bidding to reach the semifinals for the first time since they won the title in 2019. They are making their 6th appearance at the Davis Cup Finals and their 2nd consecutive appearance in the quarterfinals and their 3rd in 4 years.
- **In the Qualifiers 2nd Round**, Spain defeated Denmark 3-2 in Marbella by completing their first ever successful comeback from 0-2 down to advance to the Final 8 in Bologna. Trailing 0-2 after day one, Pedro Martinez and Jaume Munar defeated August Holmgren and Johannes Ingildsen before Martinez defeated Holger Rune, saving a match point, to equal the tie at 2-2 before Pablo Carreno Busta defeated Elmer Moeller to seal victory in the tie and send Spain to the Final 8. It was the 67th comeback from 0-2 down in Davis Cup history and the 2nd this season after Denmark defeated Serbia 3-2 in the Qualifiers 1st Round in Copenhagen.
- **Last season**, Spain reached the quarterfinals. They received a wild card for the Finals Group Stage, finishing in 1st place in Finals Group B in Valencia after defeating Czechia 3-0, France 2-1 and Australia 2-1. At the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga, they fell to Netherlands 1-2 in the quarterfinals.
- **In the Qualifiers 1st Round**, Spain defeated Switzerland 3-1 in Biel to advance to the Qualifiers 2nd Round. It was their first Davis Cup tie outside of Spain since 2018, when they fell to France in the semifinals in Lille.
- In 2019, Spain won their **6th Davis Cup title**, defeating Canada 2-0 in the final, with Roberto Bautista Agut and Rafael Nadal recording victories over Felix Auger-Aliassime and Denis Shapovalov, respectively.
- Spain are bidding to win their 7th Davis Cup title this season and equal Sweden in 5th place on the **all-time list for most Davis Cup titles won**. In addition to their title in 2019, they also won the title in 2000 (d. Australia), 2004 (d. USA), 2008 (d. Argentina), 2009 (d. Czechia) and 2011 (d. Argentina). They also finished runners-up in 1965 (l. Australia), 1967 (l. Australia), 2003 (l. Australia) and 2012 (l. Czechia).
- Spain are currently ranked No. 10 in the **Davis Cup Nations Rankings**. They are one of 10 nations to have held the No. 1 ranking (alongside Argentina, Australia, Canada, Croatia, Czechia, France, Great Britain, Italy and Russia), having been ranked No. 1 between September 2004 and September 2005, and again between July 2009 and February 2013.

- **Captain David Ferrer** has led the Spanish team since 2023 and has an 6-3 tie win-loss record as captain. As a player, he represented Spain in Davis Cup between 2006 and 2018, was part of the Spanish teams that won the title in 2008, 2009 and 2011 and had a 28-5 overall match win-loss record. He is in 4th place on the list for most Davis Cup singles matches won by a Spanish player.

In Spain's 3-2 victory against Denmark in the Qualifiers 2nd Round in September he lost to Elmer Moeller before partnering Martinez to defeat August Holmgren/Johannes Ingildsen to begin Spain's comeback from 0-2 down. His only previous appearance came in Spain's 1-3 defeat to Serbia in the 2017 World Group quarterfinals, falling to Dusan Lajovic after the tie had already been decided.

At the Final 8 he partnered Alcaraz in the decisive doubles match of Spain's quarterfinal tie against Netherlands as the pair fell to Koolhof/Van de Zandschulp. He has a 13-13 overall win-loss record in the competition since making his debut in 2010. He was a member of both the Spanish team which finished runners-up to Czechia in 2012, and of the Spanish team which won the nation's 6th Davis Cup title in 2019, winning all 3 matches he contested at the 2019 Finals.
