
Write about what you already know or want from an amusement park to help come up with ideas.

INTRODUCTION

You learned about the importance of writing for any film, creative project, or business idea. Whether you need to convince a family member of something or apply for a new job, writing is an important skill in life. The nice thing is that everyone can always practice to become stronger writers.

NARRATIVE

A narrative is another word for a story. Sometimes stories are the best way to make a person or reader feel like they are inside a new experience, or a new world.

To help you think about the world you are creating in your amusement park, write a short story that takes place at an amusement park.

Do you want to write about a group of kids who get lost at an amusement park? Or a young girl who finally goes on her birthday after years of asking her family?

Your story can be about anyone or anything, as long as your ride is a part of it somehow.

All stories usually contain the following things:

Setting: Where does the story take place?

Plot: Your story should have a beginning, a middle, and an end. All of the things that happen make up your plot.

Characters: They can be people or aliens or talking pencils, but there should be people or things to follow and care about in your story.

Action: Things have to happen in your story. Maybe someone gets lost or goes on a new adventure. Action moves things along from the beginning to the end.

Details: Details help to build the world and interesting characters in your story.

Original ideas: You are creative! You are the creator of this story. Use as many of your own ideas as you can, and you'll make a new and original story.

If you need some ideas, look at the example sentences below. Try to use them to come up with your own ideas to tell a story with a beginning, middle, and end.

INTRODUCTION

A **press release** is a written notice to news outlets to announce something. A press release is meant to get out the word about something.

It can be about a movie that's coming out, or the release a new product, or an announcement for an upcoming event. Its goal is to get the public excited so there is interest to buy it or attend the event.

PRESS RELEASE

In this assignment, you are a journalist. You are writing a press release about the amusement park your class created to get people excited about the new park opening.

In order to get people to show up during the first week of its opening, you have to make them feel like they have to be there.

Be persuasive! If you do a good job, your news will be shared on social media to help spread the word.

Your press release should include:

Headline: How would you summarize the news you are writing about in one short sentence? This is your headline to get people's attention!

Body: This is where you write about all the details of the event. What is your news you are sharing? When does it take place? Why should people care?

News Outlets: Where would you send this press release? Think of a few newspapers or websites where you would send the press release.

Contact information: Leave your name so that people can contact you if they want to know more!
