The following considerations will help you identify elements within the programme which may impact the mental welfare of your on-screen participants (including contestants, interviewees, presenters, celebrities, talent and actors) on a non-scripted or scripted production.

Regardless of the mental welfare 'risk rating' of your programme you must determine 'Fitness to Participate' and can access support and guidance from the ITV Duty of Care Advisor. We appreciate the dynamic nature of production, but you should alert the ITV Duty of Care Advisor if anything arises that could impact the mental welfare of an on-screen participant.

*Note: The term "Producer" refers to the person in control of the production, and may not only be those with a "Producer" job title or grade. On any programme the Producer is accountable for safety. This responsibility covers all staff, contributors, contractors or others who may be affected by the production activity. The Producer can assign responsibility for tasks to others but the accountability for safety cannot be delegated. The producer is accountable for ensuring that the person to whom he/she delegates a duty has sufficient competence (experience, knowledge, skills) and authority to perform it safely
