



Advent is a time of preparation. We all know this because we have been told this since childhood, but beyond the chocolate calendars what does Advent mean to us?

For me, Advent is a time of new beginnings. It is a time of reflection upon the past year and an internal accounting of things done well and things that have fallen short of my expectation. If we are to have a new beginning then we must examine ourselves in conjunction with Jesus' commandments to us. Where have we loved God and our neighbor well and where have we fallen short? And how do we see ourselves improving in the next year?

I think it helps to juxtapose Emmanuel with Advent. Emmanuel means God is with us, and Adventus is a Roman ceremony that begins with a populace going out from the city to meet the arriving emperor or bishop and bringing them home. If God is with us, our Adventus goes to greet God as God comes into our lives. I believe this welcoming of God into our lives, in a conscious and intentional manner, reminds us that we all fall short of perfection and need to return to God in humble confession of our shortcomings and misdeeds.

It is a human construct to remind us that, like Jonah, however far we might like to push God aside and rely upon our own reason and devices, God remains. God is always with us, and Advent is the perfect time to welcome God in Christ back to the forefront of our lives in anticipation of the birth of Emmanuel.

WARDEN'S LETTER – December 2022



It's been a very busy fall at Trinity!

- The fall season had its official beginning with an Open House and Blessing of the Animals at the 10:00 service on October 2. The Invite-Welcome-Connect team was instrumental in scheduling and publicizing this service, which was enjoyed by all two- and four-legged friends.
- The second in our "Trinity Talks" lecture series was held on November 20, when former New York Congressman John LeBoutillier, the great-grandson of Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney, gave a fascinating lecture and slide show on the Gilded Age on Long Island. Our church, designed by Stanford White and built in 1906, figures prominently in the architecture from that era.
- A comprehensive upgrade is in the works for our Memorial Garden. New glass doors leading from
 the sanctuary to the garden will be installed, which will give a beautiful view of the garden from the
 church as well as providing more light in the eastern part of the sanctuary. A labyrinth is also
 planned. Various parishioners have made donations to this project, and more details will be
 announced soon.
- The Child Care Center is a continuing source of concern. It has been difficult to find and keep good teachers and balance the child/teacher ratio while keeping a steady income stream. Anyone interested in volunteering in any capacity should contact Father George.
- Outreach is always busy with projects: the Blessing Bags distribution on the 4th Saturday of every month at the Hempstead Transit Center; the Rural & Migrant Ministries party and concert at Trinity on November 19; the Christmas Boutique to be held on December 10 and 11th; the Adopt-A-Family campaign for the Christmas season; and ongoing visits to shut-ins.

As Father George reminded us on the First Sunday of Advent, the first candle lighted on the Advent wreath represents hope. He asked us to look into our hearts and discern what it is we hope for. My hope list is long, but way up there near the top is the hope I hold for Trinity. Our difficulties will not magically disappear, but if we work together faithfully "with gladness and singleness of heart," I do believe the Holy Spirit will guide us in the direction we are meant to go.

ROGER M. GERBER



Long-time Garden City resident, Roger M. Gerber (93), passed away September 18, 2022 following a brief hospital stay. He is survived by his wife Edith E Gerber (94) of Garden City, daughter Suzanne K. Muller of Huntington, and adult granddaughters Alexandra N. Muller of Huntington, and Cameron Miller-Lemus of California.

Born in Switzerland, he emigrated to the US in the 1950s and married his first wife, Jane O. Gerber, now deceased. Roger enjoyed a long career in the financial industry, first as a Partner at Fahnestock & Co, then at Janney Montgomery Scott, and later as a consultant. He was on the Board of Directors of several foundations including the Orvis Foundation, the now defunct Cathedral School of St Mary in Garden City, and the Liederkranz Foundation of New York City. He was also a contributor to many causes dear to his heart including the Mineola Chorale Society. Additionally, as a devoutly religious man all his life, he was an active member of two churches, Trinity Episcopal Church in Roslyn NY and Garden City Community Church in Garden City.

A member of Cherry Valley Country Club for fifty years, he was known as an avid golfer and dapper dresser. He was a lover of theater, opera and the symphony and enjoyed wearing a tuxedo whenever he could. In younger years, his leisure time was spent working in and enhancing his gardens, or building something fabulous in his workshop. He loved his family deeply and will be sorely missed.

RMM staff members, family members, farm workers and even a Girl Scout troop arrived at Trinity on November 19 for their Roots of Gratitude event. Frank Ferrara started the program with several musical pieces, then RMM's Youth Empowerment Coordinator Lionel Charles spoke, as did several young people. Maria Del Mar Piedrabuena, liaison to the LI Flower Coop shared how the workers grow & sell poinsettias along with wreaths and holiday floral arrangements. With no middleman, the workers get to keep more of the proceeds.

Trinity's choir provided another musical treat, encouraging all to sing along with well-known songs and hymns.

Rev. Richard Witt, RMM's Executive Director explained that they had started years ago with a Christmas toy drive. One migrant worker, a mother, said she would like to select the toy for her child herself and suggested that he set up a store, selling the toys at prices the workers could afford. It continues to this day to work well. The parents know what toy is best for their child(ren), and this approach recognizes the dignity of each customer. Rev. Witt added that the monies collected from the purchases are used to provide a meal to the people who come in to shop.

The children have really enjoyed the Fall. They did activities celebrating all of the beautiful colors Fall brings and even got to enjoy jumping in the fallen leaves. Child Care families came to enjoy our Fall celebration; we had a pumpkin patch, pumpkin painting, hayrides, games and Fall snacks.

In November we learned about being thankful for all that we have, and about families that aren't as lucky. We collected non-perishable foods to donate to needy families. Spirituality is also important to the program. "Be kind", and also "Do unto others as you would want them to do unto you" was taught. Our Child Care has added an extra S to the STEAM curriculum. S-Science, T-Technology, E-Engineering, A-Art, M-Math, S-Spirituality.

For the Thanksgiving feast, the children prepared several dishes: homemade applesauce, cranberry relish and biscuits to eat with their turkey lunch. Cooking with children is a great activity that covers Science, Math, and beginning Reading.

In December we will continue helping less fortunate families; we are collecting toys for the Marines 'Toys for Tots' drive, and we are joining the Church in their Adopt-A-Family program.

We have been very lucky to add 3 new staff members. Miss Sabrina is our new Infant teacher, Miss Jackie is our new Pre-K teacher and Miss Melina is a new assistant. They are all wonderful additions to the Center.

Speaking of additions, we were hit pretty hard this September, when the local school districts all began offering Universal Pre-K. We started September with only 16 children. As of this writing we are now up to 26 children.! We even have a waiting list in our Toddler room. As a mission of the Church, we have a contract with Nassau County Dept. of Social Services. This allows lower income children to attend a quality program while their parents are at work. The parent pays a co pay and the County pays the difference. This is only for working parents, who qualify. Six of the ten new children are here through

that program. We are thrilled to be able to offer quality care to these children.

On December 16, the Child Care is having a pot luck supper. Our first one was right before COVID hit, so we are excited to be bringing it back. It is very special to have the families join us for these kind of events.

We want to wish you all a Joyous Christmas, and the Happiest of New Years.

"LONG ISLAND'S GILDED AGE" PRESENTED BY GERTRUDE WHITNEY'S GREAT GRANDSON JOHN LEBOUTILLIER

John LeBoutillier, Gertrude Whitney's great grandson, presented a lecture on "The Gilded Age: A Tour of Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney's Long Island Studio," on November 20th at Trinity Church. Over 85 people were in attendance. It was hosted by the Roslyn Landmark Society and Trinity Church.

Father George Sherrill, priest-in-charge, welcomed the attendees. Jennifer Lister, executive director of the Roslyn Landmark Society, provided a brief history of the historic Church and introduced John LeBoutillier.

In a lively lecture, former congressman John LeBoutillier took attendees back to the Gilded Age to share stories about his great-grandmother and for an inside look at her studio in Old Westbury, now his home. Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney was an American sculptor, art patron and collector, and founder in 1931 of the Whitney Museum of American Art in New York City. She was a prominent social figure and hostess, who was born into the wealthy Vanderbilt family and married into the Whitney family.

A life-long resident of Old Westbury, Long Island, John LeBoutillier was born in Glen Cove in 1953. A 1976 Magna Cum Laude graduate of Harvard College with a Master's Degree in Business Administration from Harvard Business School, LeBoutillier used his college experience as the basis of his book, Harvard Hates America. LeBoutillier has since written numerous articles which have appeared on the New York Times Op-Ed Page, The Wall Street Journal, The New York Times Sunday Magazine and in major publications throughout the nation.
