

"TRINITY TALKS" LECTURE SERIES



On April 27, we held the first lecture in our "Trinity Talks" series, with elder care attorney and "right to die" expert David A. Smith sharing key considerations for end-of-life healthcare decision-making. Held in person and via zoom, the event was attended by more than 30 people.

The speaker David A. Smith, who has been featured on The Today Show, CNN, Fox and more also distributed copies of materials such as forms for a Living Will, and Healthcare proxies. If you would like a copy of these materials, there are extra copies available at Trinity.

The talk focused on essential issues around understanding and controlling options in advance of health care crises and emergencies. Speaker David A. Smith Esq. has more than 40 years of experience in civil litigation, including many "right to die" cases such as the Baby Jane Doe case and the 2012 Grace Lee case. Discussing "right to die issues," he has appeared on numerous television programs, including the Today Show, NBC Dateline, CNN and Fox News.

"Various forms of life-saving and life-sustaining technologies have grown exponentially and to try to make sure we control the technologies, rather than be controlled by them, it is important that we all think about them, understand them, and make decisions concerning these issues while we still can," said David A. Smith. "By preparing, properly executing and fully distributing documents in which we carefully articulate our own healthcare wishes


in advance of any healthcare crisis, we can better control these decisions."

Prior to founding the Law office of David A. Smith in Garden City in 1996, he opened the New York State Attorney General's first Nassau office. In the early 1990s, Mr. Smith served as legal director for the New York-based Society for the Right to Die (later known as Choice in Dying).

As always, it was a great Trinity effort to make this event all come together. Thanks to Rob for managing the zoom in-person and Kathy for her remote support, along with Ruth's efforts on promotion and publicity, and to Liz for finding the speaker for us. NORTH SHORE MADRIGAL SINGERS SUNDAY, JUNE 12



Road to Emmaus

On **Sunday, June 12 at 4:00 pm**, the North Shore Madrigal Singers will hold their spring concert at Trinity Episcopal Church in Roslyn.

Madrigal Singers is the premier vocal ensemble at North Shore High School. They perform a wide variety of largely a cappella repertoire spanning from the 16th to the 21st centuries under the direction of conductor David Catalano. Mr. Catalano, who was inspired to ask if his group could perform at Trinity after coming to a concert here and falling in love with the space and the acoustics, has provided this description of the works that will be performed:

"The centerpiece of the concert is a set of pieces we have titled *Abide* which all take inspiration from Luke 24:29, "Abide with us: for it is toward evening, and the day is far spent." The first is Josef Rheinberger's beloved setting of this biblical text, *Abendlied*. We then will perform Moses Hogan's harmonically rich arrangement of the hymn *Abide with Me*. Poet Adam York and composer Dan Forrest then give us our final piece, a setting of his love poem *Abide*, which he was inspired to write after hearing a performance of the previous hymn. You'll also hear works by Debussy, Monteverdi, and Mozart, among others. It will be an afternoon of love, poetry, and joy."

I've been urged by Trinity Bells to update the Trinity family on my current professional activities.

Following my stroke in July, 2018, my "Sunday Supper" show on WFUV went on hiatus for eight months, while I followed through on a planned retirement as a full-time employee. When it returned in April, 2019, it was reduced to one hour a week from three. (It can be heard from 5-6 pm live at 90.7 FM or anytime in the Weekend Archives at wfuv.org.)

Obviously, the change presented a challenge. I tried to maintain the same features (attention to artist birthdays, up-and-coming artists, concerts in the area, musical themes), but in a streamlined manner. I continued to present occasional artist interviews, but haven't since the pandemic, as I've been recording my show at home. (That may change over time.) I celebrated my 25th anniversary at WFUV in April with a special show spotlighting my all-time favorite performances by guests, including Joan Baez, Judy Collins, Bobby McFerrin, Phoebe Snow, and Rosanne Cash. With more time on my hands, I decided to incorporate as a not-for-profit organization, the New Folk Initiative, with the mission to be an inclusive resource for the propagation and promotion of folk music in its multi-faceted forms.

The website (www.newfolk.org) has playlists, a concert calendar, a blog with reviews of albums and plays, and a selected archive of notable "Sunday Supper" sessions.

My third preoccupation is "On Your Radar," a showcase I curate for three artists on the second Tuesday of every month. It's existed for 17 years, the last nine at Rockwood Music Hall, an intimate venue on the Lower East Side. The shows have introduced listeners to a diverse lineup of deserving artists. (You'll also find the lineups at New Folk.org.)

Sometimes keeping up with all three can make for a busy week, but my motto has always been "Better Busy Than Bored." Hopefully, there will always be time for Trinity priorities!
