Happy Spring,

Learn from the past, live in the present, plan for the future. As I gaze around this venerable old building, I see the past come alive. Our rich history is written on the walls. Ms. Mackay's bold move to build our church back in 1907 is the starting point of Trinity, but it is not the beginning. Many years of developing Episcopal identity in Roslyn and planning for the future went into the hopes and dreams of those loyal servants of Christ so many years ago. These pathways were formed, and the foundations laid for a future they would not see; their paths, however, live on with us into today and tomorrow.

Paths are an interesting thing. Back when I was in high school, a wise old Master exhorted us to always remain on the path, never cut across the yard." You see, he said, upon these paths trod great people of history, and in following precisely in their footsteps perhaps your light will shine alongside theirs." The lights of those who came before us continue to shine in the windows and structures of Trinity, and it is up to us to build upon this past and bring Trinity to a future of which our forebears would be proud.

It is incumbent upon each of us to grow the church by moving our mindset from scarcity to abundance. I believe we currently live in a false sense of scarcity. It happens. The kingdom of the world continuously harangues us with cries of fear, Covid, jobs, money, the economy, who's in and who's out, poverty, hunger, and injustice. If you look at the world only through these brown-colored lenses, then scarcity is all you will see. However, if we choose to see the Kingdom of heaven in our daily lives, the scarcity of the world fades, and the abundance of God prevails. The scarcity of the world did not diminish; rather, our focus shifted away from the scarcity of the world and onto the abundance of God.

The lesson we learn from those that came before us is that the abundance of Christ outweighs any scarcity the world tries to burden us with, whether it be the trials of old; WWI, Spanish flu, the Great Depression, WWII, or any other myriad troubles we have faced and triumphed over in the past. We have present concerns and are assured our future might hold for another day, but with the faith in Christ's abundance, we, like those that walked these paths before us, will triumph and continue to bring the Kingdom of God to this troubled world. This is our mission; this is our quest.
