DIOCESAN CREATION CARE TEAM FIGHT FOR EARTH DAY

On Saturday, May 3rd I attended the Fight for Earth Day event presented by the Creation Care Community of the Diocese of Long Island. It was a lovely day held at Mercer School of Theology. We began the day with Morning Prayer and Bishop Larry gave us a warm and inspiring sermon. Then we gathered in the Mercer Library for a morning full of discussions and presentations by various people throughout the Diocese as well as special speakers from various organizations.

Chelsea McMillan spoke from Greenfaith, an advocacy group involved in Ecojustice and Climate Advocacy. Nico Carl, Landscape Ecologist from the Sisters of St. Joseph spoke about using native plants to green our spaces. Jody Gangloff, Entomologist from Cornell University spoke about native and invasive insects.

Susan Macdonald spoke about the ReWild initiative which provides grants to churches and private homes to plant a garden using native plants. They help with planning out the space for the garden. (This might be a great idea for Trinity!)

After lunch we participated in a Rogation Procession around the campus where we prayed for the buildings and activities of the campus, the people of the Diocese and the campus grounds.







Many of us then participated in a workshop on foam-free floral arranging. A few of us even visited the Cathedral bees!

The day was inspirational and a wonderful opportunity to connect with others across the Diocese. I always enjoy meeting people from other churches and strongly encourage everyone to attend other events and workshops offered by Mercer and the Diocese.

One of the things I was most inspired by was learning about the resolution passed at the 2024 Diocesan Convention: Discontinuing single use plastic products, single-use foam products, and single-use plastic water bottles at the Diocese of Long Island churches and facilities.

Resolved to immediately discontinue the use of disposable single-use Styrofoam and foam products including but not limited to plates, cups, and food containers, and be it further

Resolved to discontinue within four years the use of single-use plastic products, including but not limited to plastic water bottles, plates, cups, cutlery, straws, coffee pods, food wraps, bags and be it further

Resolved to transition within four years to reusable, compostable and washable alternatives and away from single-use plastic products, single-use foam products and single-use water bottles unless health and safety considerations require otherwise.

I will be researching alternatives that we can purchase for use during coffee hour and will share that information with the vestry in the hopes we can provide these compliant products as soon as possible. I also propose that we purchase additional washable plates and forks, knives etc. to use for larger parish events such as All Saints Brunch, Pancake Breakfast and Maundy Thursday Soup Supper.

If anyone would like to learn more about the event, let me know. I will also be making copies of the materials I picked up with information on how to become more involved in climate advocacy.


TRINITY WOMEN'S MONTHLY MEETUP

QUEENS INTERFAITH UNITY WALK

So, ... why were Ken Bongort and Diane Stillerman participating in the Queens Interfaith Unity Walk on March 23rd? Well, if you are open to new experiences, they will appear.

Diane sings with Willow - an interfaith acapella chorus led by Farah Chandu who is also a board member of the Flushing Interfaith Council. One evening at rehearsal, Farah asked if any singers wanted to join her on the Council's annual unity walk. Diane readily volunteered since whatever Farah participates in is bound to be interesting, and Ken decided to join her.

Similar to a progressive dinner, the walk began at the Sikh Center in Flushing, where they had some delicious food and experienced the Sikhs' prayer room. Next was the First Baptist Church of Flushing with their striking Tiffany windows. Then they visited the Bowne House built by John Bowne, a Quaker, about 1661. Their walk through Flushing concluded at the Hindu temple with more presentations and food. During the walk, everyone took turns carrying the banner, and the members of Willow sang at various stops.



It was at the Bowne house that they learned how this interfaith walk reflects the struggle for freedom of religion that has long characterized Flushing. It began with the 1645 Charter of the Town of Flushing, granted by the Dutch East India Company. This charter guaranteed liberty of conscience. Disregarding this grant, Governor Stuyvesant declared that all worship must be through the Dutch Reformed Church. This prompted a group of

Quakers to formerly protest in 1657 in what became known as the Flushing Remonstrance. When Bowne and his wife held Quaker meetings in their home, they ran afoul of the Governor's edict. John Bowne was tried in the Netherlands, but ultimately prevailed, and another step towards our First Amendment rights was taken.

By afternoon's end, the soles of their shoes were worn down but not their spirits. Experiencing other's houses of worship was uplifting and a reminder of all that we share rather than all that divides us.

Lunch is provided daily (reservations required), and bus service is also available for those residing in our catchment area.
