Pathways

- **Skin Science:** We're providing AAD members with a diversity champion toolkit to help them conduct outreach to increase awareness of dermatology in local high schools and community colleges serving Black, Latine, and Indigenous communities.
- **Dermatology Career Preparation Program:** Premed college students can spend an immersive five days with dermatologists, dermatology residents, and medical students learning about medicine, dermatology, and how to succeed in a challenging field.
- Bioskills Workshops: Dynamic workshops offered for medical students in partnership with Nth
 Dimensions in order for students to have a deep dive into the specialty and try their hands at some
 basic dermatologic procedures.
- AAD/Nth Dimensions Scholars Program: First- and second-year medical students have an
 opportunity to participate in a robust 2-month summer internship, build a mentorship with a
 practicing dermatologist, and get guided support to prepare for their residency application and get
 ready for residency.
- AAD/SID Gap Year Fellowship: This fellowship aims to increase the representation of minorities in academic dermatology by supporting a competitive yearlong research program under the supervision of a vetted mentor.

- Expert Resource Groups Expert Resource Groups (ERGs) are made up of individuals who come
 together to share information and knowledge about a particular topic. While different activities and
 goals exist among the ERGs, a common passion for the advancement of patient care is at the core
 of their efforts. ERGs develop and promote high standards of clinical care for patients with skin
 disease by providing clinical expertise, fostering research, advocating for the therapeutic needs of
 dermatology, and furthering education in the management of cutaneous disease. ERGs

may be utilized as a source of knowledgeable individuals to call upon when an issue in the specific subject area arises that requires action on the part of the Academy.

In some instances, the President may ask that the ERG serve as an official Ad Hoc Task Force to address an issue, or the ERG may be asked to serve as subject matter experts to work with another committee or task force. There are fourteen Board-approved ERGs on the following topics: Atopic Dermatitis; Climate Change and Environmental Issues; Cutaneous Imaging; Dermatologists in Industry; Epidemiology; Geriatric Dermatology; Hidradenitis Suppurativa; Integrative Dermatology; Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender/Sexual and Gender Minority (LGBT/SGM) Health; Psoriasis; Quality and Patient Safety Officers; HIV/Sexually Transmitted Infections; Society of Dermatology Hospitalists; and Women's Health.

Academic/Physician Education
