

Products beyond their expiration date may lose their effectiveness because the active ingredients can have a limited shelf life. Storage conditions such as temperature, moisture, or light can also influence expiration – always store as directed by the label.

Don't risk it with expired medicine.

Make sure your kids have an effective dose when they need it most.



Head to your medicine cabinet and look for the expiration date, usually printed on the label or stamped onto the bottle or carton. It may be listed as USE BY MM/DD/YYYY or EXP MMDDYYYY.



Read the label and identify any specific disposal instructions. One safe and easy way to dispose of expired medicine is at your local pharmacy, or a drug-take back program. You can throw expired medicine away in household trash after mixing with unwanted substances like coffee grounds, dirt, or kitty litter. Safe disposal means the expired product can't be accidentally found by kids or pets.



Replace your expired medicine with a fresh set at your local retailer, online, or wherever you do your shopping. Be sure to store your medicine safely in a cabinet or drawer that is out of the reach of children. Keep the product in its original packaging and away from direct sunlight or harsh temperatures.
