## **Annexure II**

### **Best Practice 1**

#### **Title of the Practice**

Pre-knowledge test for newly admitted students

#### **Objectives of the Practice**

To evaluate knowledge of the students at course entry level

#### **The Context**

The students admitted to UG course, i.e., first year of the course, may or may not have required basic knowledge of a particular subject. Also, the class could have a mixed type of students, i.e., some could be advanced learners, some could be slow learners and some, average learners. This information is necessary for the concerned teachers, so that, they can then teach accordingly. To get such information, pre-knowledge test was arranged in the College.

#### **The Practice**

Subject wise question papers (having objective multiple choice questions) were prepared, based upon basic knowledge of that particular subject. The question papers were distributed among the students of first year class of B.A., B.Com. and B.Sc. The students were allowed to write the answers in specific time period. Later, after evaluation, analysis of the results was done.

#### **Evidence of Success**

From the analysis of the results, we got information about range of student's subject knowledge levels, which found helpful for the department and the teachers during teaching practices.

#### **Problems encountered and resources required**

This assessment system may not be applicable to the students who come from other disciplines. No significant resources are required to run this practice.

## **Annexure III**

### **Best Practice 2**

#### **Title of the Practice**

Interdepartmental group discussion for faculty

#### **Objectives of the Practice**

To exchange knowledge among the faculty

To encourage interdisciplinary research

#### **The Context**

Generally, teachers make advancement in their knowledge related to their subject only. They take little efforts to gain the same of other subjects. This creates gap between two subjects having some relevance.

#### **The Practice**

To overcome above lacuna, the activity, interdepartmental group discussion for faculty was arranged. For this, the teachers were asked to make pairs of departments having some relevance in their subjects; like, Botany and Biotechnology, Public administration and Political science, etc. Teachers were asked to discuss and exchange their knowledge within group of subject pairs.

#### **Evidence of Success**

Practically, it is difficult to measure the exact degree of success in a short period, but this activity would help not only to upgrade their knowledge of other subjects having some relevance but also would helpful to bring interdisciplinary approach in their research.

#### **Problems encountered and resources required**

Some subjects have no direct relevance with other subjects. Resources for updating of subject knowledge are the requirements to conduct this activity.
