## Online payments now accepted for McCarran parking citations

Individuals who have been cited for parking violations at McCarran International Airport can now pay their fines online by logging on to the airport's Web site, <a href="www.mccarran.com">www.mccarran.com</a>.

Drivers cited at the airport were previously required to return to McCarran to pay their fines in person using cash or a credit card, or were asked to pay by mail using a check or money order. These options presented challenges to some customers residing outside of Las Vegas, particularly those whose home countries operate under different banking systems than those in the United States. The new system makes it simple for anyone to pay their fines, from any location at any time of day.

Drivers who pay within 10 days of their violation will be charged only half of the citation's stated amount. Those who pay within 31 to 60 days of their initial violation are subject to additional late fees, with further penalties assessed if a citation is still unresolved 61 days beyond the initial violation. Failure to pay within 60 days will prompt notification to the Department of Motor Vehicles, which could impede a driver's ability to register his or her vehicle until the matter is resolved.

The system is easy to use. Simply log onto McCarran.com and click a "Pay Parking Citations" link found on the home page or within the Ground Transportation section. Once there, enter your citation number or vehicle's license plate number, select the citation you wish to settle, then enter your credit card information. Visa, MasterCard, American Express and Discover cards are accepted.

Commercial vehicle drivers issued citations at McCarran can also use the new online payment option.

The Department of Aviation is an enterprise fund of Clark County and is self-supported through revenue generated at airport facilities, not local tax dollars.
