1. Administration

The purpose of this CPP is to ensure that stakeholders or communities affected² by **Clark County** or operations can be informed and participate and have their input thoughtfully considered in the key stages during airport planning efforts, regardless of their race, color, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, creed, age, or disability (hereafter, the "protected bases"). Beneficiary Diversity.

Demographic information is collected from airport customers, attendees at community meetings, and businesses seeking opportunities at the airport, through voluntary disclosures.

Description of Beneficiary Demographic Information Collection Methods

• Demographic information has not formally been collected from airport customers, attendees at community meetings or businesses seeking opportunities at the airport, through voluntary disclosures. However, information is collected regarding number of international passengers by destination and business participation is tracked for MBE & WBE businesses as well as small businesses and Disadvantaged and Airport Concession Disadvantaged Businesses (DBE/ACDBE).

Staff and Advisory Board Diversity.

Demographic information is collected from airport program employees and members of planning and advisory boards, through voluntary disclosures.

Description of Employee and Advisory Board Demographic Information Collection Methods

- Employees are asked to submit voluntary confidential demographic information at time of hiring. Job applicants are asked to submit the same information when submitting their job application through the job application website.
- Every 3 years, the airport administration sends an email to all board members asking them to voluntarily and anonymously enter demographic information through an online survey.
