LAS Summer 2023 Travel Tips

LAS VEGAS – As passenger volumes continue to reach record levels, Harry Reid International Airport (LAS) is preparing for one of the busiest summer travel seasons ever. Demand for Las Vegas air travel continues to be at all-time highs, and airlines are adding more opportunities to travel to and from Southern Nevada. Those flying this summer will want to keep the following in mind.

New Parking Options:

The biggest change for summer travelers is the new Terminal 1 Economy Lot. Located in the surface lot adjacent to the Terminal 1 parking garage, this option added 1,100 convenient parking spots mere steps away from Terminal 1. Economy Lot parking is \$12 daily.

Approximately 600 covered, long-term parking spots were also added on the Zero Level of the Terminal 1 parking garage. Long-term parking is \$18 daily.

Prepare for a Busier Airport:

- Even with new parking options, spots will remain at a premium. Consider all transportation options for getting to and from the airport.
- Plan to arrive at the airport at least two hours before the scheduled departure time, and allow even more time if parking at the airport, returning a rental car or needing a last minute accommodation.
- If someone in the traveling party requires special accommodations, such as wheelchair service, make those arrangements through your airline and prior to arriving at the airport.
- An increase in travelers may result in longer waits for food and beverage options. For concession availability, hours and locations, visit www.HarryReidAirport.com/Dining.
- Be ready for the TSA checkpoint by knowing what should go in checked luggage and what can be in carry-ons. All the checkpoints at LAS are equipped with technology that requires you to only present your government-issued photo identification. Not only is it quicker, it means you can keep that boarding pass safely tucked away until you get to the gate.

Account for Travel Disruptions:

While no one wants them to occur, delays and cancellations have the potential to affect travel plans. Those flying should prepare for potential delays by having essentials on hand such as snacks, childcare items, medication, chargers, etc. As always, travelers should check their flight status with their airline.
