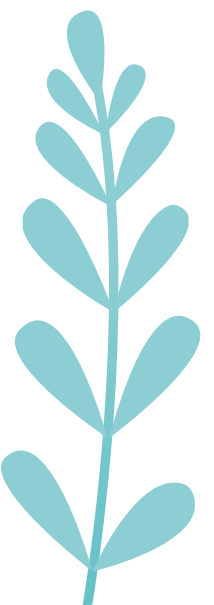
Rays Of Hope

You will need

1 piece of A4 white paper
Felt tips

Instructions

1. Using a yellow felt tip (or your favourite colour) draw around a cup on a sheet of white paper. This will be the outline for your sun.
2. Using the the same colour felt tip, draw 8-10 long triangles coming out from your sun. These will be the rays of the sun.
3. Using the same colour felt tip again make lots of squiggles inside your sun.
4. Using another colour felt tip write inside the triangle rays all the things which make you happy, things which light you up inside, like playing with your friends or playing a musical instrument. You might also want to include things that you haven't been able to do for a while and can't wait to do again, like spending time with friends and family, giving someone you love a hug or going swimming!
5. Colour in the squiggles on the Sun centre.
6. Once you have finished colouring in your sun take a red felt tip and go around the edges of your rays, this creates a 3D look.
7. Draw smaller suns around your big sun or you could draw different colour galaxies if you want to jazz it up a bit.
8. Now give your art a title. Ours is called 'Things which light me up'. What will you call yours?
9. To get a 3D look for your title, take a darker colour felt tip and go around the edges.
10. Stick it on your wall as a reminder of all the things that make you happy or bring you hope. Encourage everyone in your household to have a go too and stick them up together.



Stargazers Diary

You will need

Coloured paper

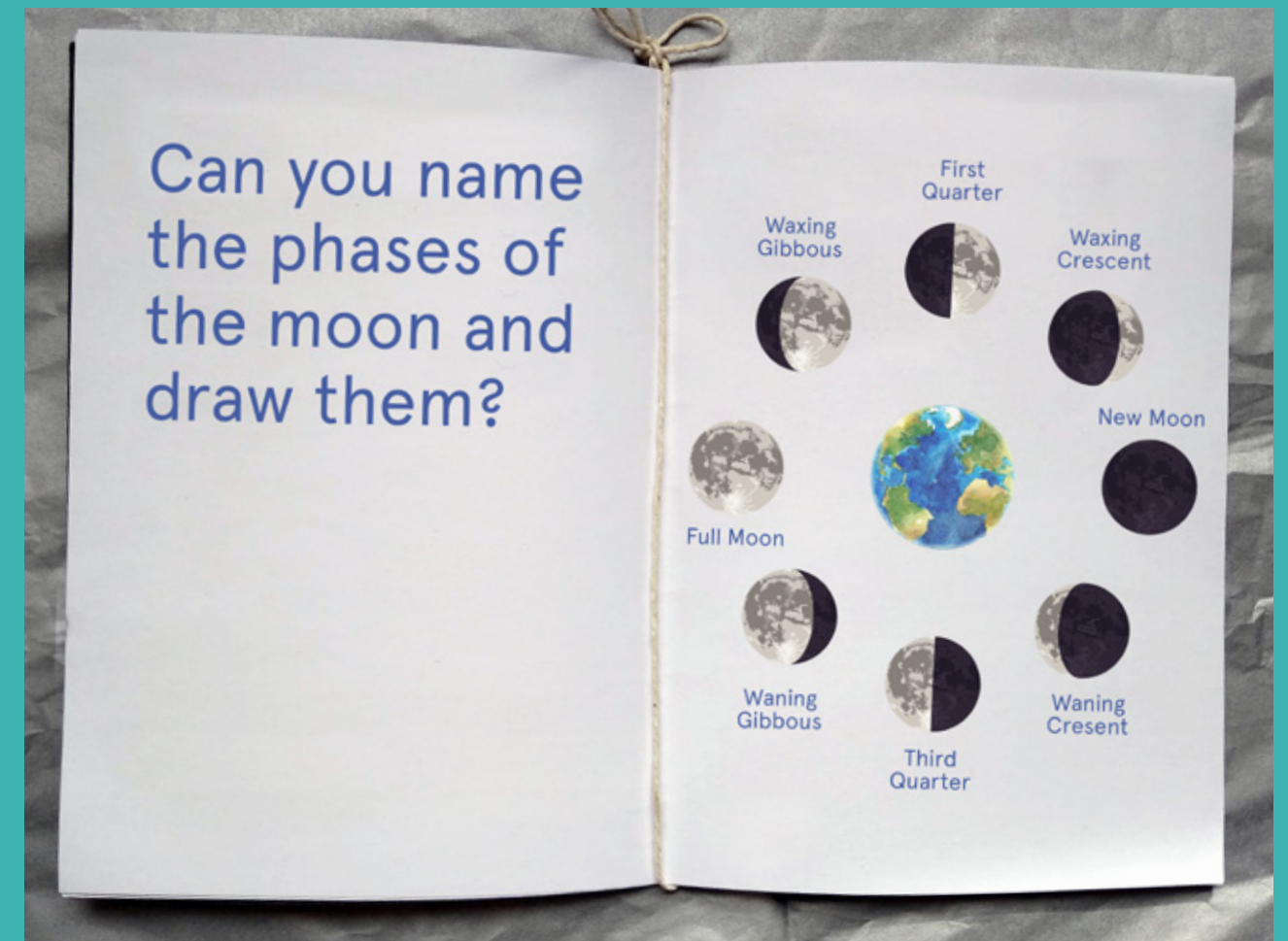
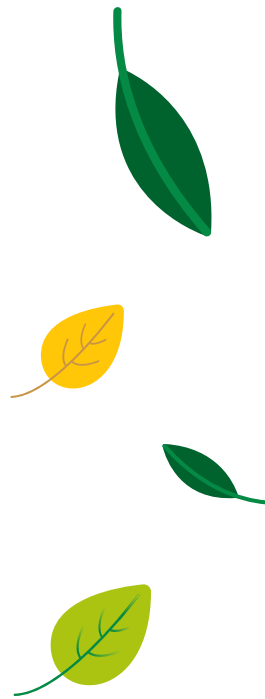
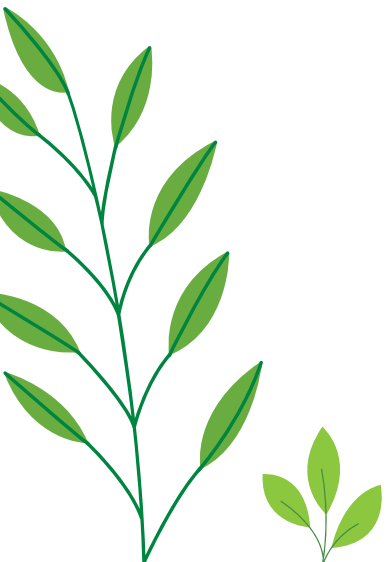
Pencil crayons or pens

Instructions

1. Take a few sheets of A4 paper, hold them in landscape and fold them in half.
2. Take coloured paper and fold that in half and add it as the cover of your book. If you don't have coloured paper you can use white paper and decorate it.
3. Decorate your cover with planets, stars and moons.
4. Take a piece of string and tie it around the centre of the paper to make a small book
5. Look at the night sky and see if you can spot any shooting stars, planets or the moon. Record what you see in your diary, in words and/or in pictures.
6. Add to your book whenever you feel like it to document your star and moon gazing, if your pages get full you can always add more paper.



Capture your Spring nature finds in this portable press.
You can press (flatten, dry and preserve) flowers, petals, seeds, grasses, herbs, feathers and leaves!



Tips

1. Pick your items on a dry day so your finds aren't wet when placed in your press.
2. Try pressing an old bunch of flowers if you can't get out on a nature walk.
3. You could place your press under some books for extra pressing!

Instructions

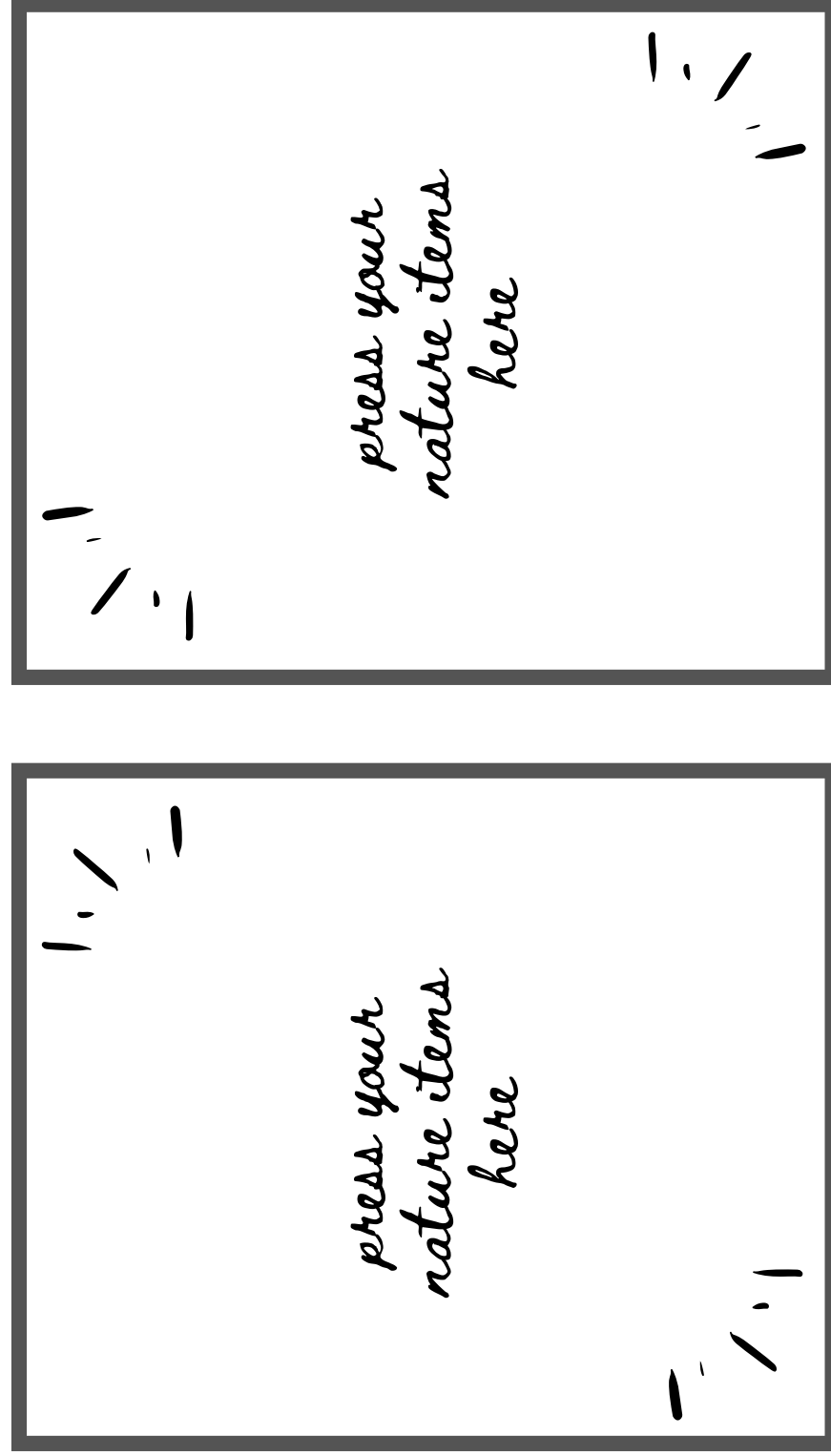
1. Find the nature press template and copy it or print it out.
2. First, decorate your Nature Press front and back cover (your nature press template) with colourful crayons or pencils.
3. Cut out your template, along with 2 extra sheets for inside your press.
4. Using your nature press template to draw around so that it is the same size, cut out the rectangle from the cardboard box.
5. Fold your cardboard rectangle in half to form a 'book'.
6. Fold and glue your press template as a front and back cover.
7. Pop in your two smaller sheets (you can add more if you wish in the same shape, or even some rectangles of cardboard) to form your pages to press your items in between.
8. Find some beautiful natural items to press in your garden or out in nature. Place them in between the sheets and keep in place with the elastic band.
9. Leave for as long as you can, but a minimum of a few days. Be patient!
10. Take a look at your pressed finds! Why don't you create some natural art by gluing your pressed items onto paper or card - have fun creating different patterns and shapes! Or use to decorate around a poem or story about Spring.

Egg-cellent Bunny Ears

You will need

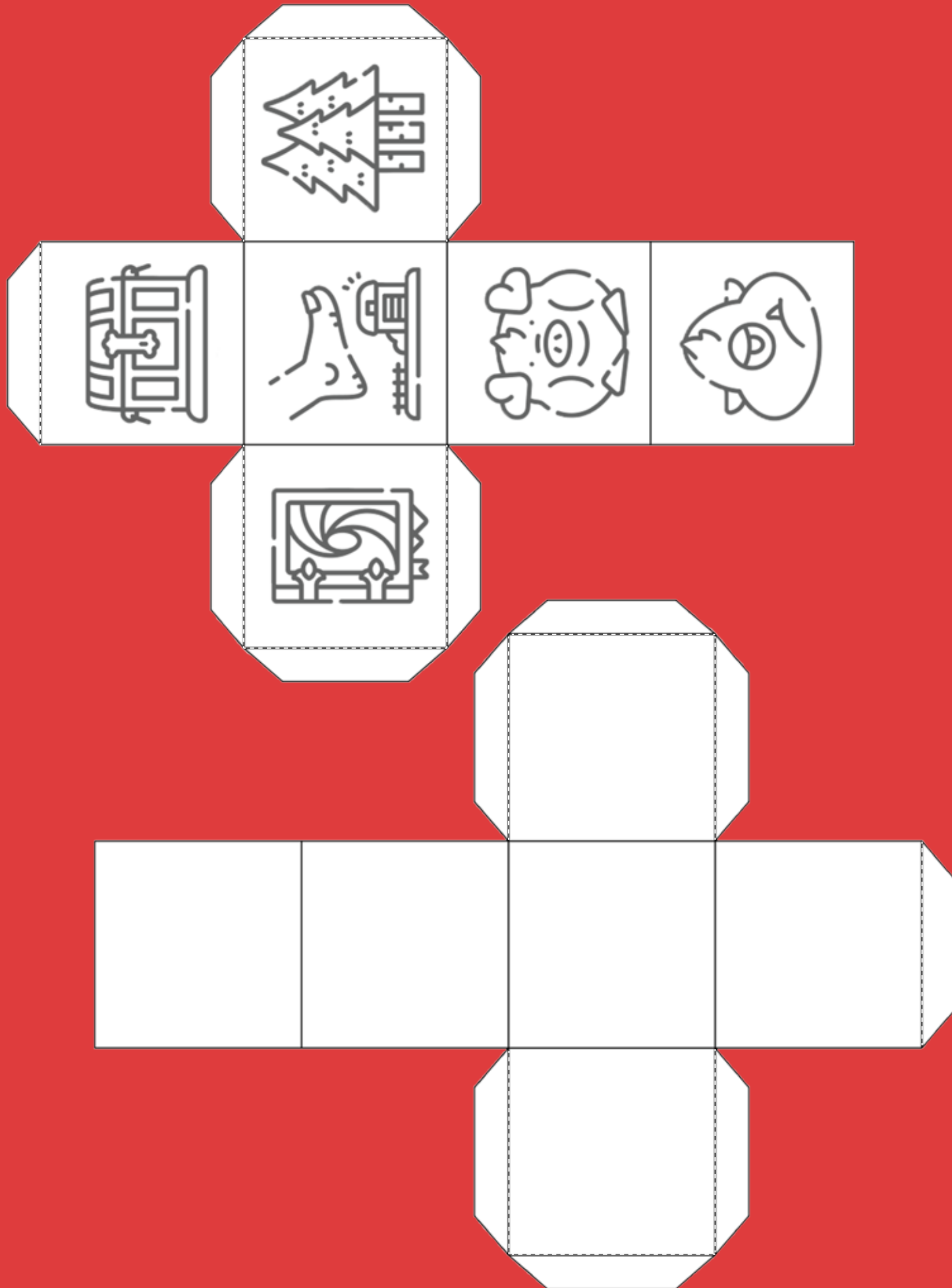
A piece of card or empty cereal box/food packaging
Sticky tape

Scissors
Felt tips and/or paint
Ruler

Instructions

1. Open out your cereal box so that it is flat on the table.
2. Draw out a long strip of card at the bottom of your open box (about 5cm deep), long enough to go around your head with some overlap (about 50 cm)
3. Draw the shape of two long bunny ears on top of your strip. Leave a gap of about 6cm in between them.
4. Cut out the strip and ears, leaving them attached together.
5. Now you can decorate your ears with paints and felt tips to make the best Easter bunny headdress. Use spring colours of your choice. You could add images of eggs and flowers around the sides.
6. When decorated, get a grown up to attach the two ends of the band together so that it fits perfectly around your head.





Make Your Own Story Cube

You will need

Scissors

Glue/tape

Coloured pencils/pens

Instructions

(this can be tricky so get help from an adult)

1. Copy the template on the previous page on to plain paper, or print it out.
2. Colour in the template.
3. Cut out template.
4. Fold along SOLID lines to make a nice cube shape.
5. Fold in flaps along the DOTTED line and glue cube together.

How to play

A game for 1 player:

1. Roll the story cube 3 times.
2. Tell a story that links the 3 pictures together.

A game for 2 or more players:

1. Take turns rolling the cube.
2. Create a story together using the pictures you see.



Welcome The Spring Wreath

You will need

Glue	Card
Scissors	Ruler
Leaves	

Instructions

1. Go and collect some leaves. Try and get a good variation and some flowers too!
2. Get a piece of card from a cardboard box, like a cereal box. Get something circular to draw around, like a big plate. Draw around the plate so you have a large circle that fills up your piece of card.
3. Take a smaller plate and draw another circle in the inside of the large circle so that you have a circular band about 8cm wide. (See picture 1)
4. Cut out this band - you might need a bit of help from a grown up for this.
5. Start to stick your leaves onto your cardboard ring in an arrangement that you like. Overlap them so you don't see any of the cardboard ring.
6. Find a toilet roll tube and cut it up into small cardboard rings. You can get about 10 from one tube. (See picture 5)
7. Glue the rings together edge to edge all the way around until you get a flower shape.
8. Tie some string through the flower and attach it to your wreath.
9. Tie some extra string around the wreath so you can hang it in your home or give it to someone else as a lovely spring time gift.



Make your own bugs and beasties from the natural things that you find on a walk. What bugs could you make? A spider, a dragonfly, a grasshopper, a ladybird, a butterfly, a stick insect or a bee. Can you think of any more?



If you collected any pine cones in autumn then you could have a go at a pine cone bug too:

1. Take a pine cone and two petals, feathers or leaves. Glue the leaves to the back of the pine cone as wings.
2. Use seeds, rocks or small twigs for the eyes.
3. Add smaller twigs for legs and attach with glue.
4. Bring your bugs to life by flying them around or make a bug display. See how many different types of bugs you can make using all of your natural materials.



Nature Bugs & Beasties

You will need

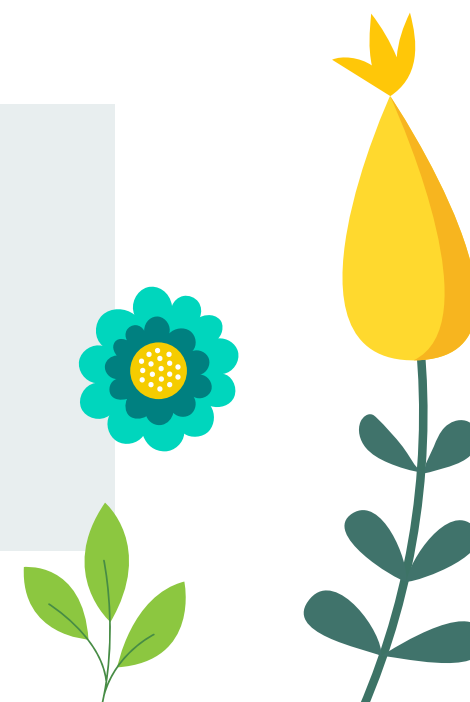

Instructions

1. Go on a walk in the woods or to the park with a grown up. Explore the area and collect some interesting, natural objects. These might include sticks, feathers, twigs, leaves, tree seeds or bark, stones, acorns, grass, or anything else that is natural and could look great as part of your nature bugs. Make sure you include a few sticks and pine cones if you can find any.
2. Place some paper or newspaper onto a table and lay out your found objects.
3. Take one of the sticks and two leaves. The leaves could be wings. Attach these to the stick with a dab of glue.
4. Use small twigs as legs. Stick them on with glue. How many legs does your bug have?
5. Stick on small stones or seeds from fruit to make eyes and two pieces of grass for antennae.

Things to find

Things to use as eyes, things to use as wings, things to use as legs, things you can use as antennae, things to use as body. If you find a twig that already has legs or arms, that's great!



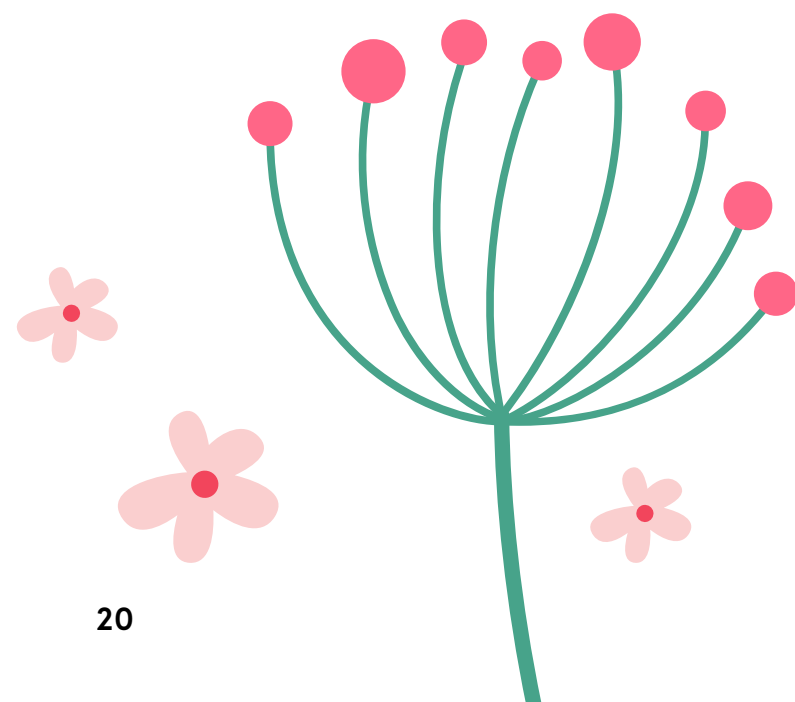
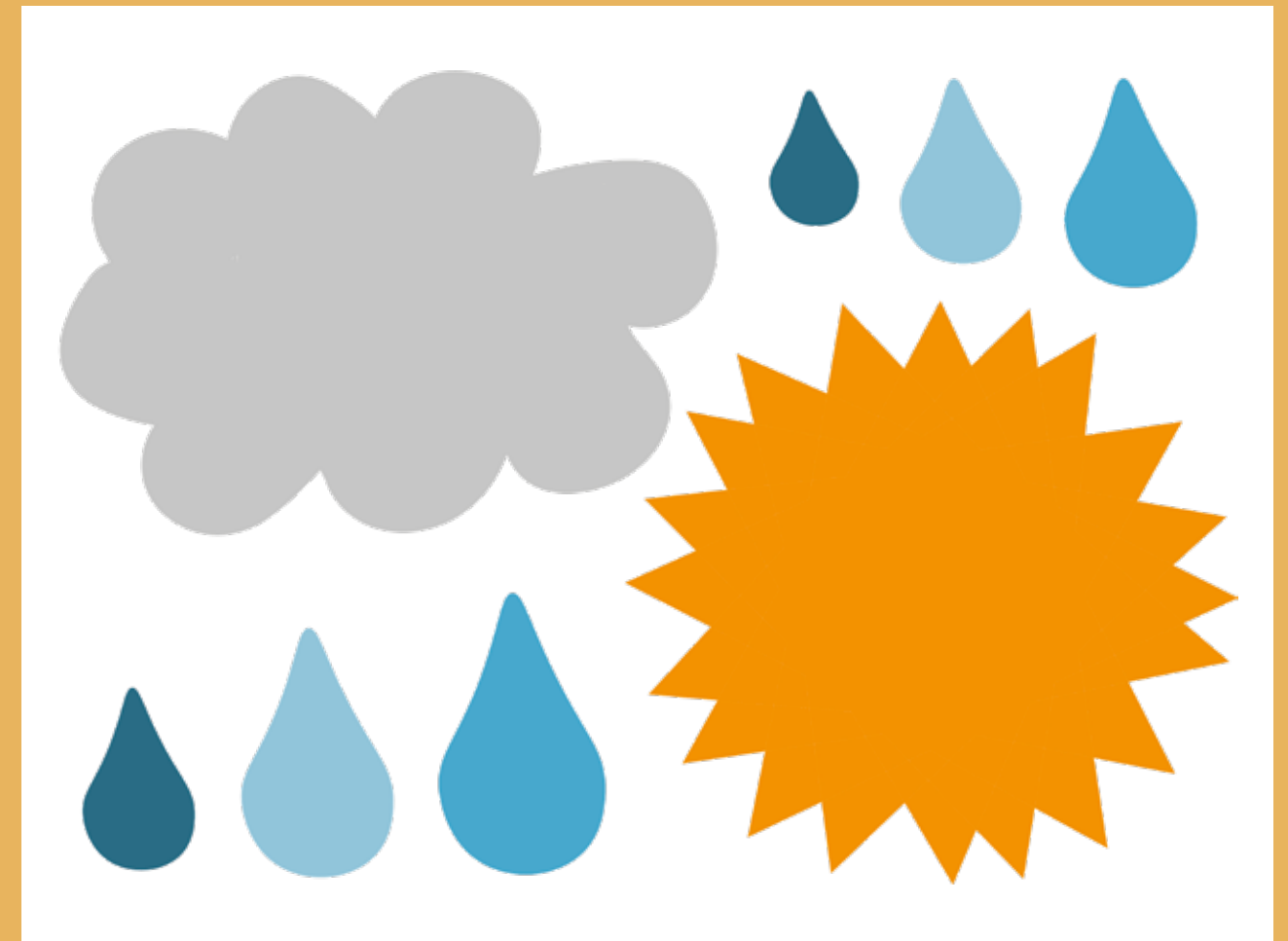
Sun & Rain Mobile

You will need

Paper	Sticks
Pens or Pencils	String

Instructions

1. Copy or trace the templates on the opposite page onto your paper and colour in your sun, rain and clouds. Do this as many times as you like.
2. Cut out your drawings. Colour in the back as well, so it is coloured on both sides.
3. Gather some sticks from outside and bind them together with string (you might need a grown up to help you with this bit).
4. Add string to all of your drawings at different lengths. You can poke a small hole in the top and attach the string or use sticky tape.
5. Hang all of your drawings from the sticks. Space them out at different heights so they don't all knock into each other.
6. Attach string to the top so you can hang this in your home – or why not give it to a friend to hang in theirs!





Did you know During the Second World War the cherry blossom became a symbol of hope and comfort in Japan. It is now a famous part of the Japanese Cherry Blossom Festival, where their blossoming around April time continues to be a symbol of renewal and hope.



Cherry Blossom Branch

You will need

An egg box (ideally a light colour, or pink)

Red and white paints (or felt tip pens)

A paint brush

Scissors

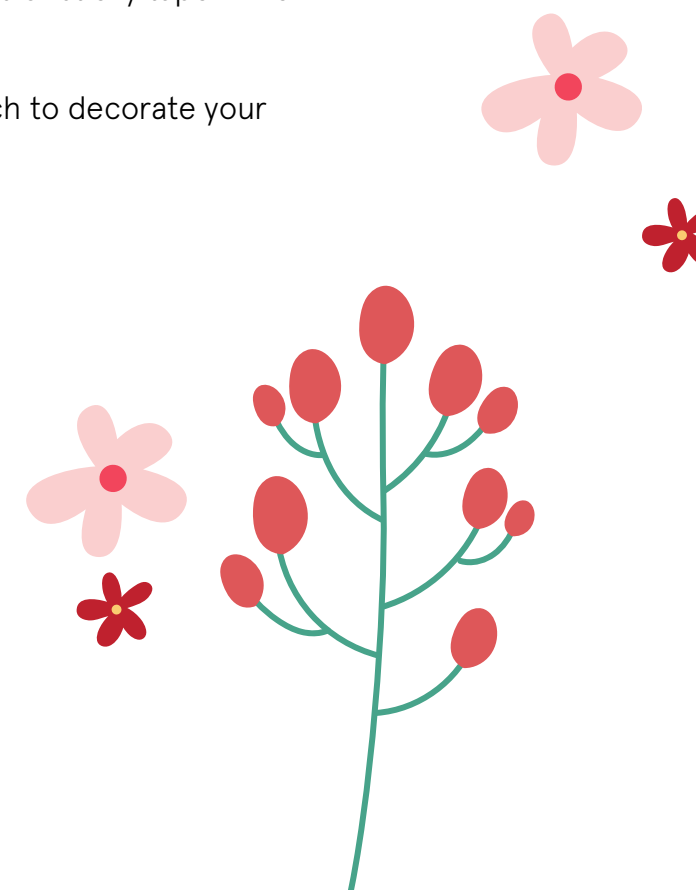
Glue

Sticky tape

A small tree branch from outside with a few arms coming from it. Go out into the garden or go on a short walk with your family to find the perfect branch.

Instructions

1. Take the egg box and cut out the six cup shaped egg holders. Cut them into flower shapes.
2. Mix some white paint with a small amount of red to make pink. Using the paintbrush, paint the egg cup flowers pink and leave to dry. Don't worry if you don't have paints at home, you can use your felt tip pens.
3. When they are dry, place each of the flowers at different points on your branch and stick with glue.
4. You might need to hold them in place with pieces of sticky tape while they dry.
5. You now have a springtime cherry blossom branch to decorate your bedroom and give a great feeling of spring.



Challenge O'Clock

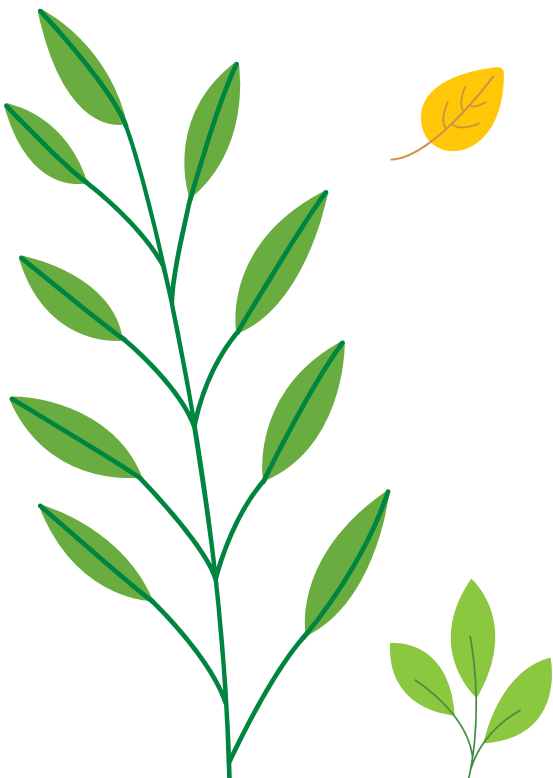
You will need

How to play

1. Copy out the challenges (or print the page and cut them out), fold them in half and put them into your bowl/hat/container.
2. Get into teams and give yourself a team name (you can be a team of one).
3. The oldest player takes a challenge from the bowl and reads it aloud.
4. Set your timer for the allotted time (or a stopwatch where the fastest team wins) and when everyone is ready press Go!

Wish Jar

You will need

Empty jar	Pencil
1 piece of A4 white paper	Scissors
Felt tips (Yellow, Blue, Green, or whatever colours you have)	Material
	Sticky tape or Glue

Instructions

1. Get your clean and dry empty Jar to decorate and place it to one side for now.
2. Using a sheet of paper and pencil, draw 3 Stars and a Butterfly.
3. Cut out your shapes using a pair of scissors.
4. Colour in your stars with a yellow felt tip. Don't worry if you don't have a yellow felt tip, just choose another colour that you like.
5. Colour in your butterfly using bright colours. Now you should have 3 stars and a butterfly all coloured in and cut out ready for sticking.
6. Take some white paper and write 'WISH JAR' on it using a yellow felt tip.
7. Cut out around your letters being careful not to cut too close to the letters.
8. Take off the lid of the Jar and with a thin piece of old cloth wrap it around the neck of the jar, tying in a loose knot at the side. Do this again on the other side of the Jar so you have 2 knots, one on each side of the jar.
9. Using glue or sticky tape, stick your 'WISH JAR' and Stars cut outs onto the front of the jar.
10. Put the lid back on your jar and stick your butterfly on the top using glue or sticky tape. Now your jar is complete, think of lots of things to put inside it.
11. Cut out or rip thin strips of white paper and write your wishes on them. Then fold them up and put them into your jar.
12. Now wait and see if your wishes come true!

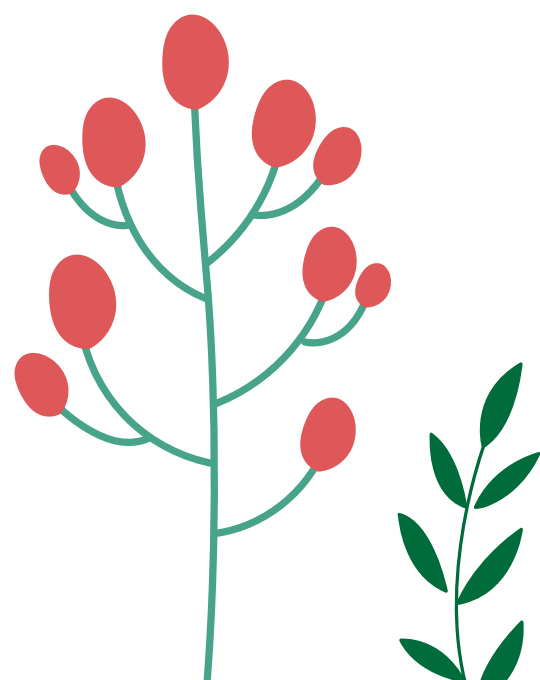
Leaf People

You will need

Leaves
Pens
Paper
Glue
Googly eyes (optional)

Instructions

1. Gather some leaves, sticks and flowers.
2. Take a piece of paper and arrange your leaves, sticks and flowers into shapes of people and animals. Use your imagination and be creative!
3. One you are happy with their shape, draw out eyes, noses, ears, wings, arms, feet - whatever you have seen in your head onto paper and cut them out.
4. Place your features onto the leaves and around their bodies moving them until you are happy.
5. Create a world for your leaf people by drawings backgrounds onto paper and placing your leaf people on top.
6. Glue them down or start all over again and make a new leaf person.



Make your own Shadow Puppet Show with springtime animals and bugs to create your own stories. Or use your favourite book characters as inspiration!



Ideas:

1. Draw a spider and a fly or cut out lots of paper lines to make up a spider's web.
2. Draw and cut out some big flowers, and then make some bee puppets, to show how they fly from flower to flower, pollinating them.
3. Draw and cut out a caterpillar and show how it eats and eats. Then draw and cut out a butterfly shape and show how the caterpillar transforms as part of your story.



Top Tips

1. Try using your new shadow puppets in a different way. When the sun shines into your house and lights up a wall, put your puppets up to the wall to cast a shadow and bring them to life in your room.
2. Try making shapes with your hands and hold them up to the wall to see what other shapes and types of creatures you could create.



Shadow Puppets

Exploring the Wild

You will need

For the shadow puppet theatre:

A cardboard cereal box
Sticky tape
Scissors
One sheet of A4 white paper

For the four shadow puppets:

Black card or card from food packaging (Cereal box etc.)
Sticky tape
Scissors
Four lolly sticks or "straight-ish" twigs from outside
Ruler

Instructions

Shadow Puppet Theatre

1. Take an empty cereal box and pull it apart so that it is flat.
2. Draw a rectangle on the front section and a curved shape at the top and cut them out. Then draw a large U shape on the other side and cut out.
3. Tape the box back together inside-out so that it stands up.
4. Decorate your puppet theatre as you like, with felt tips and paints.
5. When painted, take a sheet of plain, white A4 paper and stick it at the back of the hole in the stage to make a shadow puppet screen.

Shadow Puppets

1. Using the theme of bugs and beasties, draw some of your favourite characters onto black card, using a pencil. Make them as strange and unusual as you like. Make sure they are small enough to fit into the shadow screen, so between about 3cm and 15cm in size would be ideal.
2. Attach your scenery to the screen with sticky tape. (flowers, web, grass)
3. When you've cut out your puppets, attach them to a lolly stick or twig with sticky tape.
4. Hold the puppets up behind your puppet theatre and shine a torch onto them from behind.
5. Create your story about your characters. What sounds will they make? Do they talk? What do their voices sound like? What would they say? What kind of personality do they have?

Stone Bird Eggs

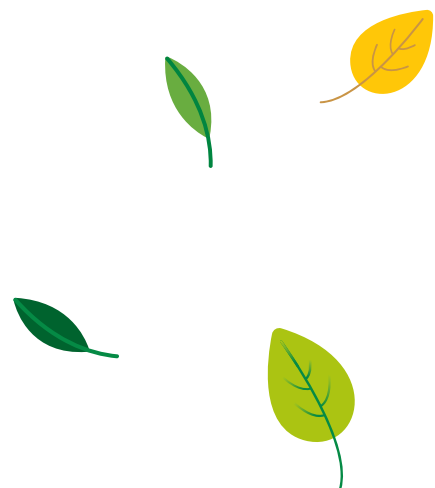
You will need

Some oval stones
Paintbrush

Acrylic paint
(or whatever paint you have)

Instructions

1. On your walks outdoors keep your eyes peeled for oval shaped stones and rocks that you could turn into beautiful eggs!
(see photo 1)
2. Once you have found your stones, take a look at the guide to some of the different eggs that British birds produce - look at all the different sizes, colours and patterns.
3. Choose your base colour and using your paintbrush, cover your stone in an even layer of paint. You will need to wait for the coat to dry before painting another layer or two.
4. Once dry, add any extra details like speckles or even cracks using another paint color.
5. Why don't you...find small twigs to create a nest for your bird eggs?
