REPORT FROM THE CHAIR

Golf is going through a real growth period and now is the time for all clubs and facilities to take the opportunity to embrace this growth by attracting new people into the game.

This year has seen a period of continued growth in club membership and activity. Membership of clubs increased by 7.2% to 12094 for adults; junior membership was up by 49% which is encouraging. It is interesting to note however, that only 14% of people playing golf are members of golf clubs. There is a real opportunity to deliver golf in a way that people want to consume, which may not initially be as a member of a golf club. This is and will be challenge for golf clubs going forward in terms of sustainability and providing available golfing products as options to memberships.

Golf development programs have shown continued growth: MyGolf had 1474 registrations. The number of Community Instructors has increased to 61 with another 25 signed up but yet to complete accreditation. Having a team of Community Instructors is critical to being able to maintain school programs. Get into Golf had 814 registrations, including 679 females and had 24 active centres across Tasmania. Congratulations to all those involved as it augers well for the continued growth.

The Australian Golf Foundation provided scholarships to 9 clubs with 66 girls involved in the program around the state. Golf Tasmania (GT) contributed \$10,000 to assist in funding this program. This is a great foundation to increasing female participation and hopefully sustaining it in the future.

With 56 signatories to the R&A Women in Golf Charter in Australia, Tasmania has punched above its weight in having 14 clubs signed up with several more clubs looking to sign. Congratulations and thanks to all involved.

In early 2023 Golf Tasmania (GT) signed a new State Services Agreement with Golf Australia (GA) following a review of the initial One golf Agreement. The new agreement is more focussed on specific Tasmanian needs. Work was completed on aligning our strategic plan with the Australian Golf Strategy via a Balanced Scorecard. The purpose is to link the activities of GT to those of the strategy in a measurable and accountable way.

The 2023 Men's and Women's Tasmanian Open was held at Launceston Golf Club: the first time the event had been held for prizemoney in over 30 years. The new format was great to see and there are promising signs going forward that this marquee event will continue to grow and be a highlight on the golfing calendar. Congratulations to the winners and all the participants. Thanks also to the Launceston Golf club for their support and efforts in conducting a successful event.

The event ran at a small financial loss which was covered by GT. It is important that Tasmania hold this event as this is the only opportunity for us to see golf at this level being held in this state. It is vital for the growth of the game in that it provides opportunities for our golfers to aspire and participate in events at this level here.

Earlier this year Tasmania hosted the Australian Junior Amateur and Australian Junior Interstate Team Matches. Unfortunately, we were not able to field a junior girls' team, but the boys performed admirably. Thank you to the Tasmania and Ulverstone Golf Clubs for hosting the successful events. The Men's and Women's Interstate Teams Matches held in New South Wales saw our teams enjoy some success. Well done to those who participated and also to the support staff and organisers. Congratulations are extended to winners of State events and competitors.

REPORT FROM THE CHAIR

Participation in state events has seen competitor numbers decline. These events are important for the future growth of golf in Tasmania in that they provide a pathway and opportunity for golfers to compete with each other around the state. Clubs need to consider hosting state events and freeing their courses to allow these events to be held at optimal times at weekends. The events are rotated each year, so should not be an impost if the load is shared. Clubs needs to consider the future of golf as these events facilitate this, as people compete and aspire to achieve. Ongoing reviews of events are being conducted as we search to find ways to improve events. It is acknowledged that it is becoming increasingly difficult to fit some state events in over weekends in current formats.

Achieving ongoing growth, interest and participation could not be achieved without the members, clubs, district associations and the volunteers involved in running club, district and state events. We thank them for their continued commitment and support.

Appreciation and gratitude is extended to the Tasmanian Government for their continued generous financial assistance to both GT and member clubs. We were fortunate and appreciative of their financial sponsorship for the Men's and Women's Tasmanian Open this year and their commitment to again support the event in 2024 and 2025.

We are so very fortunate to have GA/GT staff members Stuart Eaton, Simon Weston and Damon Burley who deliver high quality services which are responsible for the increased growth in participation and golf development. No request ever seems to be any trouble to them. They are very much appreciated by the GT Board and the golfing community. I hope they can see the positive impacts their work is having on golf here.

GA staff have made a wide range of innovative and inclusive programs available to clubs/organisations and members this year. There is a great opportunity for all the golfing community here to utilise their expertise to grow our game. Thank you to all involved from GA. Looking to the future, the development of a new IT/website platform is an exciting project which promises to deliver expansive services to clubs and members, along with many other initiatives to enhance golf in line with the Australian Golf Strategy.

To David Stein (GT/Vic State Manager) and David Greenhill (Head of Governance and Operations), my sincere thanks for your continued support to golf in Tasmania and especially to me as Chair of the GT Board. It has been a pleasure working with you. I have really appreciated your input and sage advice throughout.

In closing this report, I acknowledge my fellow Directors and thank them for their positive contributions to the administration of golf in Tasmania. To Bev Holman, Fleur King, Alison Sully, Stuart McGrath -Kerr and John Milbourne, thank you for your commitment and time this year. It has been a great group to be part of. Each of you have and are making an important and significant contribution to the growth of golf in Tasmania. Golf is in a great place going forward and I wish you all the best.

On behalf of the GT Board, I thank everyone for their interest and participation in golf. No matter how large or small your contribution is, every contribution is important and appreciated. We, as a golfing community have lots to look forward to and enjoy. My best wishes and thanks to the Tasmanian golfing community. Good golfing!

TREASURER'S REPORT

For the period 1 July 2022 to 30 June 2023 Golf Tasmania Incorporated (GT) recorded a small loss of \$3,904.00. The key components of the result include \$50,572 in rental and interest income offset by expenditure supporting various activities including short term support of a new golf development officer (\$12,730), contribution to the Tasmanian Open (\$11,990) and depreciation (\$13,538).

In addition, GT donated \$10,000 to the Australian Golf Foundation to support the Junior Girls Scholarship Program. Tasmania had 9 golf clubs with 12 scholarships and 66 girls participate in this program. Each club received \$2,000 to be used only for 24 weeks of professional lessons. The increase of 41 girls participating in the program from last year is a great result.


In the year 2023 \$403,220.00 was collected in affiliation fees compared to \$376,906.00 last financial year, which is then provided to Golf Australia Limited (GA) per the service agreement in place.

In late 2018, GT entered into an agreement (the "One Golf Services Agreement") with GA pursuant to which the parties agreed that GA will provide particular member services, as specified in the One Golf Services Agreements, for the benefit of GT and the members.

The five year term of the One Golf Services Agreements completed during the year ended 30 June 2023. GT and GA negotiated and entered into a new agreement - "State Services Agreements" – to continue the services as noted above.

In consolidation of cash assets, GT closed the previously held investment fund of \$37,000.00 and placed a term deposit of \$475,000.00 through the NAB. GT was able to take advantage of wholesale investor rates in accordance with GA's corporate relationship with NAB. Given the majority of state transactions occur through GA under the State Service Agreement, GT can apply a greater balance of cash into a term deposit with a low risk of requiring access to those funds. Term deposits are included in cash at bank within the Financial Report as GT can access term deposit funds in a period not greater than 90 days.

It should be noted that in May 2023 the GT Board resolved to engage PwC as its auditors for the year 2022-23 and onwards. The recommendation to engage PwC to provide audit services was made to the GT Board by GA as they sought to create further efficiencies in the management of the state financial accounts.

DEVELOPMENT REPORT

MYGOLF – AUSTRALIA’S NATIONAL JUNIOR PROGRAM

Nationally there were 33,093 registrations for the 12 months to June 30. This represents a new high and shows that junior golf participation continues to grow. There were 10,312 female registrations nationally which represents 31% of the total participants.

In Tasmania we achieved 1,476 total registrations with 608 being female. These are both new highs and gives us great momentum moving forward. It has been another strong year for MyGolf in Tasmania. It is very pleasing to see how high the female registration rate is.

MYGOLF SPORTING SCHOOLS

MyGolf Sporting Schools is a Federal Government funded initiative that provides funding to schools to offer sport to their students. There are 37 sports available to schools. Golf is often among the most requested sports in Tasmania.

During 2022/23 there were 41 school programs delivered across the entire state. This means that over 8,000 children experienced golf many for the first time. Sporting Schools remains a key priority as this is often the first step in many junior golfers’ pathway onto the game.

GET INTO GOLF – AUSTRALIA’S INTRODUCTORY ADULT PROGRAM

Get into Golf continues to build momentum with more adults taking up golf through this program. Nationally there were 12,722 with 11,279 of these females. In Tasmania there were 827 registrations including 688 females. 23 Tasmanian golf clubs offered Get into Golf programs in the 12 months to June 30.

WOMEN & GIRLS ENGAGEMENT

Golf Australia has committed to the R&A’s Women in Golf Charter that aims to enable more women and girls to maximise their potential at all levels of the sport. Golf Australia is now encouraging Australian golf clubs and facilities to become signatories of the R&A’s Women in Golf Charter, publicly stating their commitment to improving the sport for women and girls.

Nationally there have been 75 clubs recognised as signatories to the Women in Golf Charter. Of these, 14 are in Tasmania. This is something to be proud of as a small state. Having more women and girls involved at all levels of golf is something that we should all be aiming for.

AUSTRALIAN GOLF FOUNDATION – JUNIOR GOLF SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The Scholarship program has grown considerably over the past two years, from 37 funded clubs and 226 girls in the inaugural pilot year (2021) to 117 clubs and 683 girls in 2022. In 2023, there were just under 1,000 scholarship holders spread across the country.

In Tasmania there were 12 scholarships on offer at 9 clubs with 68 girls involved! This was a huge increase over 2022 where there were 24 girls at 5 clubs in Tasmania.

Adhering to Golf Australia’s strategic plan for women and girls through our Women and Girls Engagement Strategy, this program is designed to foster a deep love of golf by creating a strong bond between girls (aged 10-16) and their golf club/facility.

Encouraging and supporting junior program participants to continue their golfing journey beyond their initial introductory steps and to obtain a handicap, this program will in turn help to reduce drop-out rates of teenage girls in golf.

DEVELOPMENT REPORT

TEEMATES

TeeMates is the new junior golf community which supports all kids on their golfing journeys, giving kids and teenagers awesome access to all types of golf all over Australia. It's fun and interactive, gives kids a chance to play golf with their peers, get a Golf Australia handicap which helps track rounds and progress, a membership gift, and the chance to get out and play events! Everybody is welcome at TeeMates, and we just want kids to have fun and go play!

6 new junior events have been created and added to the event schedule. The feedback from participants has been very positive. It is critical for junior retention that we increase their playing opportunities.

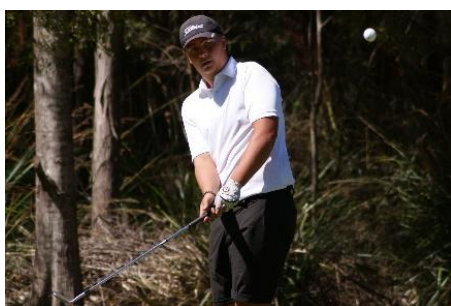

MAJOR EVENTS

2023 MEN'S AND WOMEN'S TASMANIAN OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS

It was to herald the return of a professional prize purse yet the Tasmanian Open stayed in the hands of the amateurs at Launceston Golf Club.

The 54-hole tournament on the adidas PGA Pro-Am Series offered prize money of \$35,000 for the first time since 1992 but Toby Walker showed the pros how it is done with a four-stroke win in the men's, while Bendigo teen Jazy Roberts won a playoff to secure the women's Open.

A member at Heidelberg Golf Club in Melbourne with aspirations of attending PGA Tour of Australasia Qualifying School in the middle of the year, Walker made seven birdies in his final round of four-under 68, clinching the title with birdies at 15 and 17 and a total score of 12-under par.

"I played pretty solid from the start," said Walker.

"It was nerve-wracking when the boys made birdies early but I holed a lot of good putts coming down the stretch and got a couple of nice drives away for those last couple of finishing holes."

It was a welcome return to form for Walker and a positive step towards a career in professional golf, whether through Q School or via the PGA's Membership Pathway Program.

"It's been a struggle towards the end of last year but found something this year," he added.

"It's been solid but nothing special so it's good to finally bring it all together here this week."

Queenslander William Bruyeres made the trip to Tasmania worth his while with a runner-up finish, banking the largest of the professional cheques with a final round of four-under 68.

He finished one clear of Victorian Ben Ford (67) with Cameron Kelly's three straight 70s enough to earn fourth ahead of a four-way tie for fifth.

Roberts edged Jorjah Bailey in a playoff to claim the Women's Tasmanian Open while Wynnum's Keith Dobie took out the Tasmanian Inclusive Championship.

2022 MEN'S AND WOMEN'S TASMANIAN AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIPS

A pair of Victorians won the Tasmanian Amateur Championships with Keeley Marx and Siddharth Nadimpalli winning two gripping 36-hole finals at Devonport Country Club.

The finals were an all-Victorian affair with Marx, from Heritage Golf Country Club, in control for the most of the day as she claimed a 3&2 victory against stroke play winner Jazy Roberts.

MAJOR EVENTS

Spring Valley Golf Club's Nadimpalli prevailed by the same margin against Rupert Toomey but their match followed a very different script.

Toomey was five-up after 18 holes and appeared to be on his way to victory before Nadimpalli stormed home to register a breakthrough win at open age level.

In recent years, Nadimpalli has been a prolific junior in his home state - playing under the surname Annangi - including winning the Geoff Ogilvy Trophy for the Victorian Boys' Order of Merit in 2021.

For Marx, the win continues her impressive year which has included co-captaining the victorious Victorian side at the Australian Interstate Teams Matches in May and winning the IMG Academy Junior World Championship in the United States in July.

On her path to victory this week she defeated June Song one-up in their semi-final and Sarah Johnstone 4&2 in the quarter-finals.

Nadimpalli meanwhile defeated stroke play winner Declan O'Donovan from Avondale Golf Club by one hole in their semi-final match after winning 2-up against Benjamin Blaich in Sunday morning's quarter-final.

Queensland's Thomas Sims took out the Tasmanian men's handicap title with a 6&5 victory over Victoria's Tri Nguyen Quang.

2023 BOYS' & GIRLS' TASMANIAN AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIPS

Josiah Edwards and Jazy Roberts were the only boy and girl to break par as they took out the Tasmanian Junior Amateur at Riverside Golf Club in January.

West Australian Edwards was particularly dominant across the 72 holes in finishing 15-under par and 18 shots clear of his nearest rivals - Bonnie Doon's Maximilian Fischer and Shepparton's Bailey Goodall.

The Gosnells member fired rounds of 66, 72, 66 and 69 to claim his second ever victory in a World Amateur Golf Ranking (WAGR) event.

The highlight of his week was undeniably his Monday morning and Tuesday morning six-under 66s where he went bogey free on both occasions.

Victorian Roberts also claimed her second career win in a WAGR event by ending the tournament one-under par. The Belvoir Park member carded rounds of 73, 71, 72 and 75 to finish two shots clear of The Australian Golf Club's Sophia Perkins.

2023 TASMANIAN JUNIOR MASTERS

Jazy Roberts secured her second trophy of the week in dominant fashion, while Rupert Toomey took out the boys competition at the Tasmanian Junior Masters at Mowbray Golf Club.

Roberts fired home a four-under par final round 68 to prevail by 13 shots after also winning the Tasmanian Junior Amateur earlier in the week.

The 17-year-old from Bendigo finished 16-under par with rounds of 71, 66, 67 and 68 across the two days to further enhance her reputation as a rising star of Australian golf.

Queensland's Millie Komulainen shot the low round of the week with a seven-under final round 65 to jump into second place alongside Tasmanian Jorjah Bailey, while Toomey also had a 65 on his way to the title.

The Huntingdale member carded rounds of 71, 72, 65 and 71 to finish five-under par and win by three shots from Queensland's Thomas Winn.

West Australian Josiah Edwards, who won the Tasmanian Junior Amateur earlier in the week, produced a final round 65 to grab a share of third place alongside Royal Sydney's Edward Procter.

2023 MEN'S TASMANIAN SENIOR AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP

Victorians James Lavender and Nadene Gole took out the Tasmanian Senior Amateur in convincing fashion at Kingston Beach Golf Club in February.

Lavender won by nine shots from New South Welshman Adam Cornell and fellow Victorian Stephen Valentine, while Gole prevailed by the same amount from prolific winner at senior level Sue Wooster.

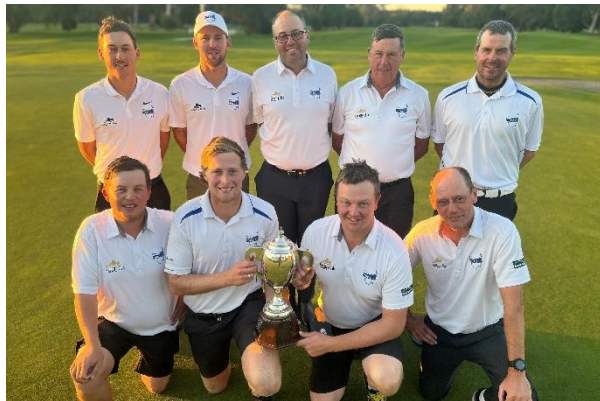

1 Summary of significant accounting policies

This note provides a list of all significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated. The financial statements are for Golf Tasmania Inc. (the "Association").

(a) Basis of preparation

(i) *Special purpose financial report*

In the Board of Managements opinion, the Association is not a reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial reports. This is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act 1964* Tasmania and must not be used for any other purpose.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement principles of all applicable Australian Accounting Standards. It contains the disclosures that are considered necessary by the Board of Management to meet the needs of the members.

(ii) *Historical cost convention*

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, unless otherwise stated.

(iii) *Comparatives*

Where necessary, comparative information has been reclassified and repositioned for consistency with current year disclosures.

(b) Foreign currency translation

Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates ('the functional currency'). The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars (\$), which is Golf Tasmania Inc.'s functional and presentation currency.

(c) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised at the fair value of consideration received or receivable. Amounts disclosed as revenue are net of taxes paid. The following specific recognition criteria must also be met before revenue is recognised:

(i) *Affiliation fees*

Affiliation are recognised as revenue as performance obligations are met and the service is rendered to members throughout the year.

(ii) *Rental income*

Rental income from investment property is recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives granted are recognised as an integral part of the total rental income, over the term of the lease.

(iii) *Interest income*

Interest income is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

(d) Income tax

Golf Tasmania Inc. is exempt from income tax under section 50-45 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997. Golf Tasmania Inc. assesses and determines its exemption on an annual basis in accordance with relevant legislation.

1 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(e) Impairment of non-financial assets

Assets are tested for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs to sell and value-in-use. For the purposes of assessing impairment, assets are grouped at the lowest levels for which there are separately identifiable cash inflows which are largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets (cash-generating units). Non-financial assets that suffered an impairment are reviewed for possible reversal of the impairment at the end of each reporting period.

(f) Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of presentation in the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

(g) Trade receivables

Trade receivables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost, less loss allowance. Trade receivables are due for settlement no more than 30 days from the date of recognition.

(h) Contract assets

A contract asset is a right to receive consideration in exchange for services rendered to the customer. Contract assets are recognised to the extent that services have been rendered but not yet invoiced and at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Association expects to be entitled in exchange for the services rendered.

(i) Financial assets and financial liabilities

Financial assets

(i) Classification

The Association classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- those to be measured subsequently at fair value (either through OCI or through profit or loss), and
- those to be measured at amortised cost.

The classification depends on the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual terms of the cash flows.

The Association classifies its financial assets as at amortised cost only if both of the following criteria are met:

- the asset is held within a business model whose objective is to collect the contractual cash flows, and
- the contractual terms give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest.

The Association's financial assets at amortised cost includes cash and cash equivalents, term deposits, and trade and other receivables. The Association does not have any financial assets measured subsequently at fair value (either through OCI or through profit or loss).

(ii) Recognition and derecognition

Regular way purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised on trade date, being the date on which the Association commits to purchase or sell the asset. Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the financial assets have expired or have been transferred and the Association has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership.

(iii) Measurement

At initial recognition, the Association measures a financial asset at its fair value.

1 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(i) Financial assets and financial liabilities (continued)

(iii) Measurement (continued)

Subsequently, financial assets at amortised cost are measured using the effective interest method. Interest income from these financial assets is included in finance income using the effective interest rate method. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition is recognised directly in profit or loss and presented in other gains/(losses) together with foreign exchange gains and losses. Impairment losses are presented as separate line item in the statement of surplus or loss and other comprehensive income.

(iv) Impairment

The Association assesses on a forward-looking basis the expected credit losses associated with its debt instruments carried at amortised cost. The impairment methodology applied depends on whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk.

For trade receivables, the Association applies the simplified approach permitted by AASB 9 *Financial Instruments*, which requires expected lifetime losses to be recognised from initial recognition of the receivables, see note 1(g) for further details.

Financial liabilities

(i) Recognition and derecognition

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs. The Association's financial liabilities include trade and other payables and borrowings.

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of surplus or loss and other comprehensive income.

(ii) Measurement

Subsequent to initial recognition financial liabilities are recognised at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Offsetting

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the Statement of financial position when, and only when, the Association currently has a legally enforceable right to set off the amounts and it intends either to settle them on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

(j) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less depreciation. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of any component accounted for as a separate asset is derecognised when replaced. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to surplus or deficit during the reporting year in which they are incurred.

Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line and reducing balance method to allocate the cost or revalued amounts of the assets, net of their residual values, over their estimated useful lives, as follows:

- Buildings 5-20 years

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting year.

1 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(j) Property, plant and equipment (continued)

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount (note 1(e)).

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These are included in surplus or deficit. When revalued assets are sold, it is Association policy to transfer any amounts included in other reserves in respect of those assets to retained earnings.

(k) Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Association prior to the end of financial year which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition. Trade and other payables are presented as current liabilities unless payment is not due within 12 months from the reporting date. They are recognised initially at their fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Where trade payables are settled via electronic cash transfer, they are derecognised when the Association has no ability to withdraw, stop or cancel the payment, has lost the practical ability to access the cash as a result of the electronic payment instruction and the risk of a settlement not occurring is insignificant.

(l) Contract liabilities

A contract liability is the obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer for which the Association has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due) from the customer. If a customer pays consideration before the Association transfers goods or services to the customer, a contract liability is recognised when the payment is made or the payment is due (whichever is earlier). Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the company performs under the contract.

(m) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the taxation authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included with other receivables or payables in the Statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the taxation authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

2 Critical estimates and judgements

The preparation of financial statements requires the use of accounting estimates which, by definition, will seldom equal the actual results. Management also needs to exercise judgement in applying the Association's accounting policies.

(a) Significant estimates and judgements

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated. They are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that may have a financial impact on the entity and that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

(b) Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The preparation of financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Association's accounting policies. There are no areas involving a higher degree of judgment or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements.
