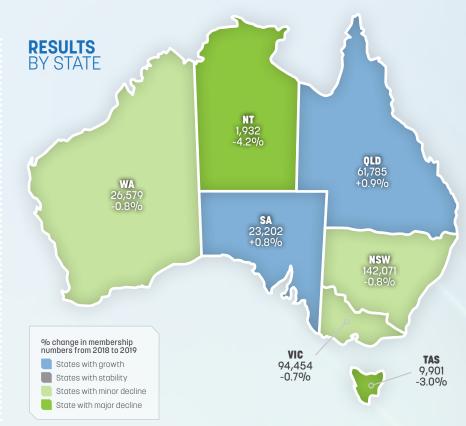

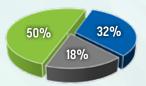

1 Key Findings

Golf Australia is pleased to present to you the 2019 National Golf Club Participation Report.

The key findings from 2019 are outlined as follows:

An estimated 878,000 adults (15+ years old) participated in golf at least once for 2019 according to data from AusPlay. This equates to 4.2% of the adult population, down from 5.2% in 2016.

Whilst overall participation is falling, the frequency mix is shifting, with at least fortnightly participation now reflecting two thirds of all participants, up from 58% in 2016.

81% of member clubs are classified as 'small', having less than 500 members.

84% of member clubs (1,105 / 1,311) clubs in Australia are located in a regional area

National membership numbers across Australia were reported as 383,794. This result represented a 0.05% net increase from 2018, the first annual increase recorded since 1998.

40% of clubs experienced a net increase in membership numbers (significant growth or moderate growth) in 2019, with 19% experiencing growth of greater than 5%.

Small clubs have incurred the largest declines in membership, -1.8% over 2018 and an average of -2.6% over the past five-year period.

With 73 golf districts reported across the six states, 32% of these districts experienced membership growth of more than 1% over 2018. 18% reported stable outcomes and 50% reported declines of more than 1%.

The overall national movement for metropolitan clubs was a decline of 0.9%, in line with the average annual decline recorded over the past five years.

The overall national movement for regional clubs was a decline of 0.2%, a positive outcome against the long-term five year trend of -1.2% for regional clubs.

Steady growth has been recorded in social club member numbers of the past five-year period, growing by an average of 3.6% per year to now account for 6.2% of total club members across Australia.

The national gender mix remained steady at 80/20 male to female. Western Australia has the highest percentage of female members at 22%.

Representing 3.4% of total membership numbers, reported junior members (under the age of 18) totalled 13,127 in 2019, increasing by 349 members over 2018.

With over 30,000 new members recorded for 2019, a resultant national new club member attraction rate of 9% was recorded.

The average reported age of club members across the country is 56.3 years. In terms of gender, the average age of male members (54.7 years) is nine years younger than females (63.9 years).

52% of new members were under the age of 50 compared to 28% across all members.

For the same club dataset there were 10.534 million competition rounds played in 2019, a 2% increase over 2018. Average annual rounds played on a per member basis increased in 2019 from 26.9 rounds to 27.5 rounds.

838 clubs (64%) recorded 9-hole rounds in 2019, playing a total of 392,114 9-hole rounds, an increase of 33% over 9-hole rounds played in 2018.

AusPlay Data Introduction

In April 2020, the results of the latest (2019) Ausplay National Participation Survey were released. The 6th release in the series since the survey was resurrected by the ASC, the annual data presented is a valuable reference point for understanding overall participation levels in golf.

With four years of now consistent time series data available, we are able to determine the trends that are apparent at not only the high level but into key subsegments – gender, region and age.

All sports

Participation increases were recorded in a number of activities/sports for 2019. Fitness / Wellness related activities continue on an upward trajectory with a +32% increase over last 4 periods for Pilates & Yoga. A 17% increase was reported for Fitness & Gym activities.

The traditional sports of Swimming, Cycling, Basketball, Netball and AFL all record increases over the four year period.

Golf participation trends

With seven bi-annual survey periods complete for AusPlay, longer term trends can be established. The latest AusPlay data relates to the 2019 calendar year.

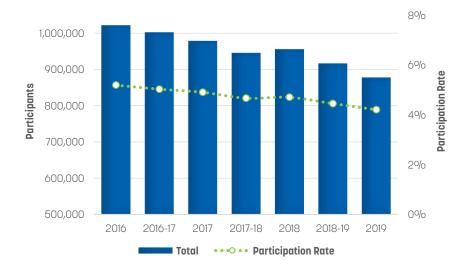
An estimated 878,000 adults (15+ years old) participated in golf for 2019. This equates to 4.2% of the adult population, down from 5.2% in 2016.

The decline recorded since 2016 is entirely sourced to the male gender. The male participation rate has fallen from 8.6% to 6.8% with the female participation rate steady at approximately 2%. As a result, female market share has risen from 18% share of total market in 2016 to 21% in 2019.

Participation frequency

Although overall participation is falling, AusPlay data indicates the frequency mix is shifting. Frequency of at least fortnightly has been trending upwards for the past four years, now reflecting two thirds of all participants.

As a result, the more than fortnightly (less frequent) cohort has declined by 31% over the period, compared to only a 3% decline in the at least fortnightly cohort. These results are summarised in Chart 2.



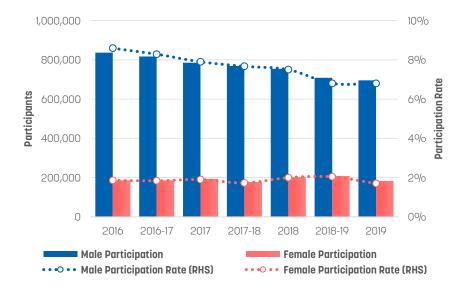


Chart 1: Annual golf participants by gender and overall participation rate Source: AusPlay

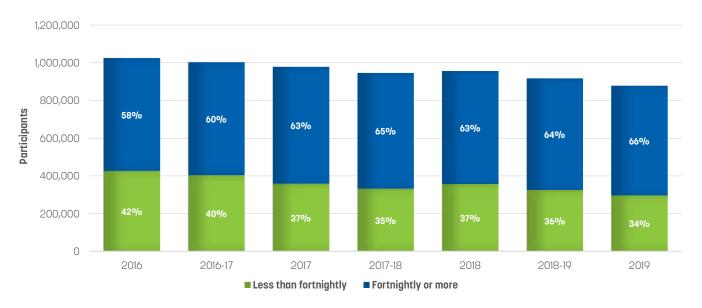


Chart 2: Annual golf participants by frequency

2019 Club 14 Membership

Member Golf Association Reporting

Club golfer numbers are reported annually each year by the seven respective state and territory member golf association [MGA] bodies.

The reported numbers reflect those members who pay a capitation fee to their respective body, generally defined as those classified as 'having a class of membership that provides regular golf course access. Individuals that have a membership (and pay a capitation fee) at more than one club will therefore be counted in the reported figures multiple times.

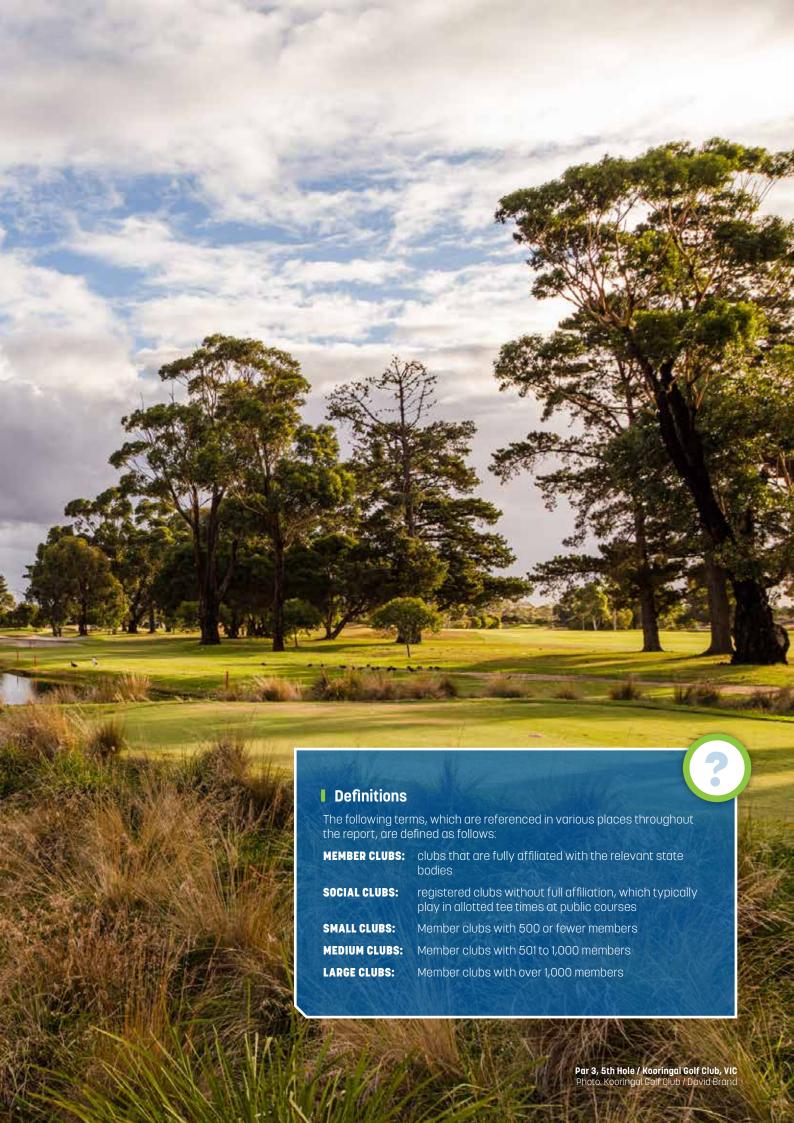
The respective reporting periods and the respective membership timing they represent are summarised in Table 2.

Given the different collection and reporting periods, the reported numbers for each state are not for the same comparable 12-month period. With data provided by individual club by gender for all national regions and clubs, the MGA reports are the most accurate source of member data available. In order for annual trends to be determined, the most recently published (or to be published) state numbers have been aggregated and classified as belonging to 2019.

Profile of Australian Clubs

Overall club numbers for 2019

1,656 clubs reported membership numbers for 2019.

Table 1 summarises the profile of golf clubs, classified by general geographic location, club type and club size.

There are 345 social clubs affiliated to various state bodies, accounting for 21% of total clubs.

The current club size profile by general geographic area for 2019 is outlined in Table 3.

Key Observations

Key observations noted from the size profile data outlined above include:

- 79% of clubs are member clubs, totalling 1,311 clubs.
- 64% of member clubs are classified as 'small', having less than 500 members.
- 84% of member clubs (1,106 / 1,311) clubs in Australia are located in a regional area, with 89% of those clubs being classified as 'small'.
- 24% of clubs in metropolitan areas are classified as 'large', having over 1,000 members. This compares to just 2% in regional areas.

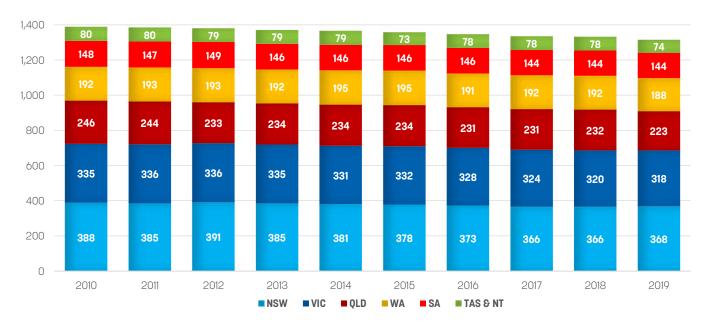

■ 10-year member club trend

As reported above, there are currently 1,311 member clubs in Australia. There has been a steady decline in member clubs over the past 10-year period, from a high of 1,390 in 2010. These results by state are summarised in Chart 3.

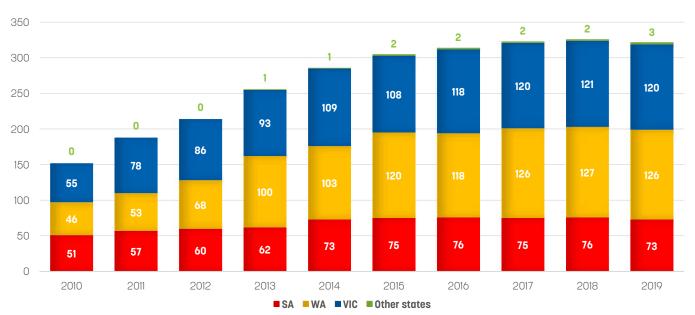
Chart 3: Member club count

I 10-year social club trend

There are currently 322 social clubs reporting membership numbers in Australia. Over the past ten years there has been a sizeable increase in social clubs, increasing from 152 in 2010. Since 2015 as further 16 clubs have been added. Results by state are summarised in Chart 4.

Playing Members - 2019 Results

"...the first reported increase in club member numbers since 1998"

Member numbers for 2019

National membership numbers across Australia are reported as 383,794. This result represents a 0.05% increase (181 members) when measured against total 2018 results. Whilst small, this annual increase is the first reported increase in club member numbers since 1998.

While overall results reflected little change, movement was evident with the key market segments. For member clubs, there was a decline in member numbers of 0.5% (1,747 members) while for social clubs, member numbers increased by just under 9% (+1,928 members) to now account for 6% of total members.

When assessed by gender, male members increased by 0.2%, supported by the social club member growth, while female members declined by 0.7%. Junior numbers accounted for 3% of the market, increasing by 349 members and helping to offset the losses in total adult members. These outcomes are summarised in Table 4.

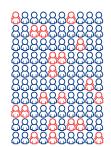

Five-year overall member totals

Table 5 summarises 2019 outcomes contextualised by the broader fiveyear trend.

For all categories except Juniors the rate of decline slowed in 2019 when compared to the five-year trend. Growth in Social club numbers in 2019 was over double the average annual result for the five-year period.

Club member participation rate

For 2019 the overall participation rate (members excluding from social clubs as a percentage of population 10+ years) across Australia is 1.7%.

This rate varies significantly across different cohorts, ranging from as high as 2.9% for male adults down to 0.2% for female juniors. These results are summarised in the right infographic and Chart 5.

Medium clubs were effectively unchanged in 2019, a positive result against the -0.9% average annual decline recorded over the past five years. Large size clubs, accounting for 26% of the market, recorded annual growth near in line with the category's five-year trend. These results are summarised in Table 6.

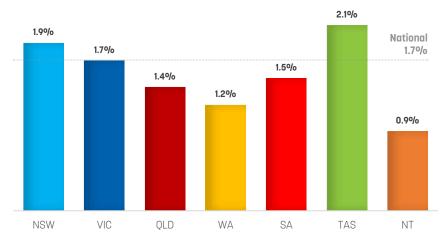


Chart 5: Participation rate by states

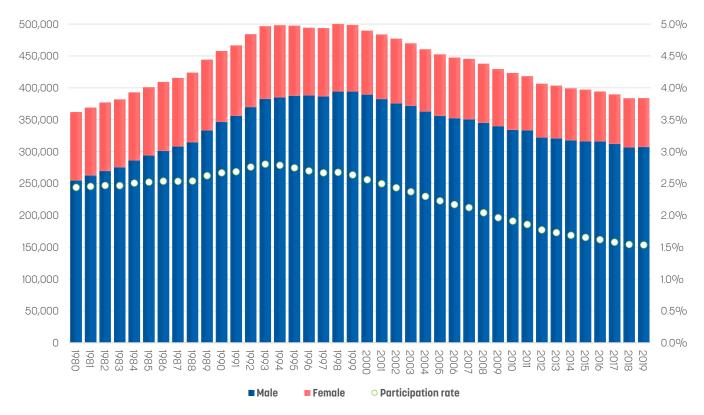

Playing Members -Key Segments

The overall national movement in total member clubs was a decline of 0.5%.

Members by club type

The overall national movement in 2019 for member clubs (aggregate of metropolitan and regional clubs, and excluding social clubs) was a decline of 0.5%. This is slightly lower than the average annual decline of 1.1% recorded since 2015.

Queensland and South Australia both experienced increased in 2019 at 0.9% and 0.8% respectively, the latter driven by growth in social clubs affiliated in that state. These results are summarised in Table 7.

Social club numbers continued to grow in 2019, recording an 8.8% increase over 2018, more than double the 5-year annual average rate. Growth was most evident in clubs affiliated in South Australia, with approximately 1,400 new members added. Growth of 2% or more was also seen in Victoria and Western Australia, both states with significant social club representation.

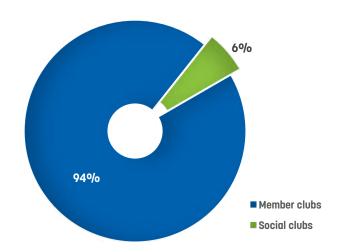


Chart 7: 2019 share of total members by club type Source: Golf Australia, member golf associations

Members by state

The overall national movement in 2019 for metropolitan clubs was a decline of 0.9%, consistent with the average annual decline recorded since 2015. All losses in the metropolitan markets occurred in the Eastern seaboard states. These results are summarised in Table 9.

The overall national movement in 2019 for regional clubs was a decline of 0.2%, lower than the average annual decline of 1.2% recorded since 2015. Queensland was the only state to experience an increase in regional club members, with a 1.7% increase. These results are summarised in Table 10.

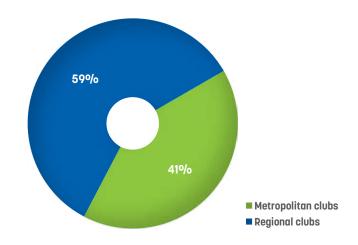


Chart 8: 2019 share of total members by general geographic area

Members by club size

Membership numbers at small member clubs (500 or less members) declined by 1.8% against 2018. Queensland was the only state to experience an increase in club members in this cohort. These results are summarised in Table 11.

Membership numbers at medium sized member clubs (501 to 1,000 members increased marginally over 2018. Queensland, Western Australia, South Australia and Northern Territory all experienced greater than 1% increases in member numbers at medium sized clubs. These results are summarised in Table 12.

Membership numbers at large member clubs (over 1,000 members) increased by 0.6% in 2019. All states increased an increase in member numbers across their large club cohort. These results are summarised in Table 13.

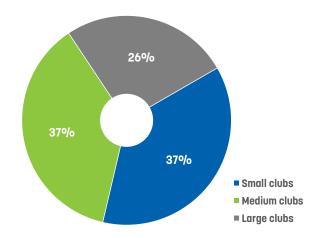


Chart 9: 2019 share of total members by club size

Members by gender

Total reported male members increased by 0.2% in 2019. This outcome was driven by a strong outcome in the social club market, with male members increasing by 11.7%. These results are summarised in Table 14.

Female member numbers declined by 0.7% over 2018, a rate near half the annual average recorded for the past 5 years. Victoria, Western Australia and South Australia all experienced an increase in female member numbers from 2018.

The resultant gender mix reported for 2019 remains unchanged from 2018, that being 80% male, 20% female. Female share of member numbers is above the national average in Western Australia (22%) and Victoria (21%) and also typically larger in regional markets (21%) and at larger clubs (22%). These results as summarised in Chart 10.

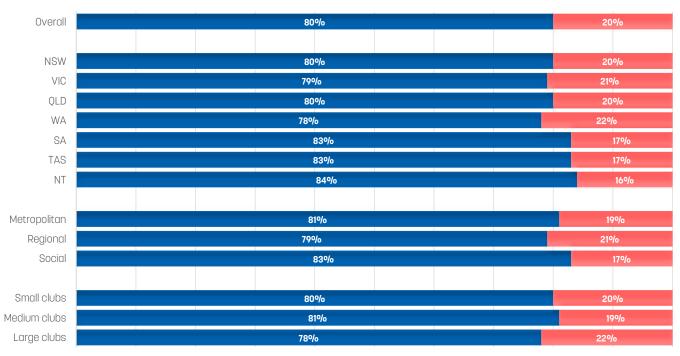

Junior members

Reported junior members (under the age of 18) totalled 13,127 in 2019, which represents an increase of 2.7% from 2018. This positive result was driven by the reported outcome in Queensland, where there was an increase of 36% in junior members (counting methodology change). Overall junior members represent 3.4% of the total member count across the country. These results are summarised in Table 16.

Junior representation was slightly higher at regional clubs (3.8%) than metropolitan clubs (3.4%). By gender, male juniors represent a slightly higher proportion of total males (3.5%) than junior females of total females; (3.1%).

Junior representation outcomes by state and gender are represented in Chart 11.

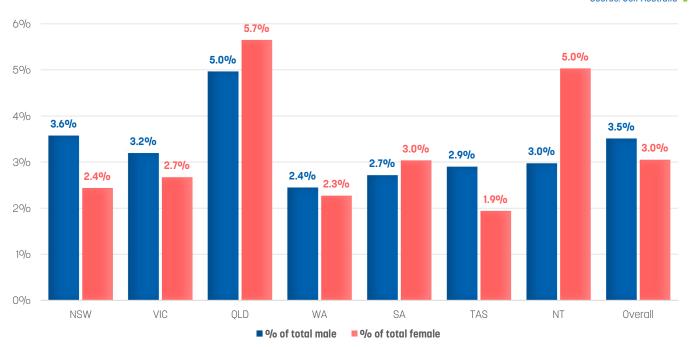

MyGolf Program

MyGolf is Australia's national junior introductory program to develop and promote participation in golf. The MyGolf program is designed for 5 to 12 year olds and is the major driver of junior golf participation in Australia.

The MyGolf program reached a record high of 24,139 registrations in the 2018/19 year against a target of 20,600 registrations nationally. The total number reflects a growth of 43% compared to 2018, a huge milestone as the program aims to reach 30,000 registrations.

Female participation KPIs were set for the first time, reflecting the percentage difference when compared to male participation. The final female participation figure reached 24.6% of the national total, just shy of the 25% target. In 2019/20, MyGolf aims to reach a national total of 28%, with the launch of MyGolf Girls to ensure that centres are catering for girls only programs and providing the right atmosphere for female participants.

MyGolf participation numbers and total centres delivering this program for the past five years are summarised in Table 17 and Table 18.

40% of clubs experienced a net increase in membership numbers (significant growth or moderate growth) in 2019, with 19% experiencing growth of greater than 5%. Member count stability was more prevalent in Large clubs with greater movement (less stability) evident in Small clubs. Results by club size are summarised in Chart 12.

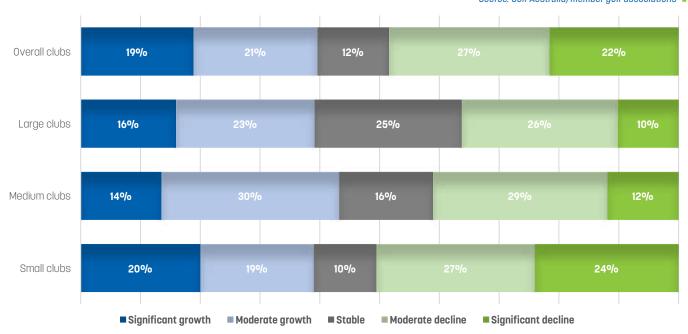

There are a total of 73 defined golf districts across Australia. For 2019, 32% of these districts experienced membership growth of more than 1% over 2018 with 50% experiencing a decline of more than 1%. These results are summarised in Chart 13.

Where female members of clubs may be classified in a different district to the male members of the same club, female membership numbers have been allocated to the male districts. Northern Territory is reported as one district.

■ Annual member attraction & attrition

Utilising data from GolfLink, annual national club (excluding social clubs) attraction and attrition rates can be reported. With a refreshed methodology that utilises active round counts, new member counts (defined as being a golf club member playing more than 1 round of golf) are assessed against closing member counts for the 2018 and 2019 years allowing for these rates to be accurately calculated.

Table 19 depicts the relevant attraction and attrition rates for metropolitan and regional clubs, as well as the overall result. With over 30,000 new members recorded for 2019, the analysed data indicates a resultant national new club

member attraction rate of 9% and a national member attrition rate of 11%. Attrition rates are generally higher at regional clubs.

Table 20 depicts the relevant attraction and attrition rates by Club size. Similar to the table above, attrition rates tend to be higher at the smaller clubs (<500 members). New member attraction rates tend to also be higher at these clubs.

These tables collectively illustrate that there is material new annual demand evident for golf club memberships in Australia. If attrition rates could be slowed to below 10%, national member numbers could begin to grow again.

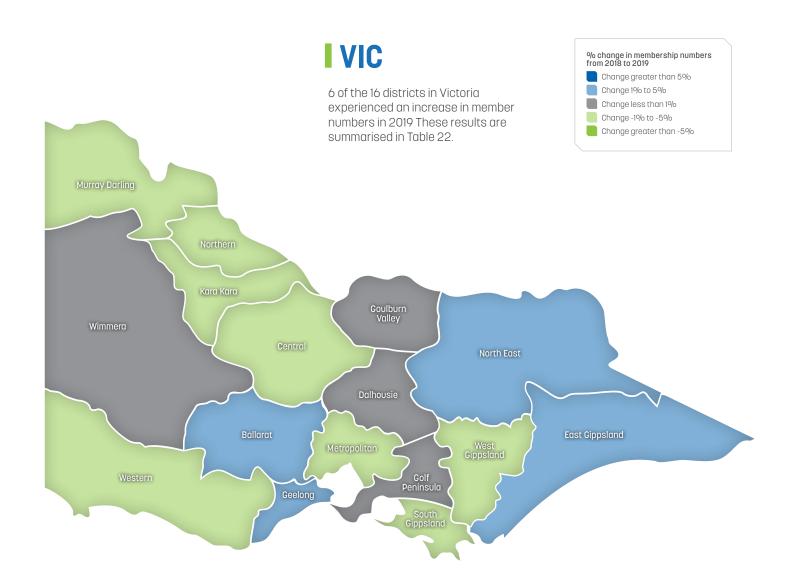

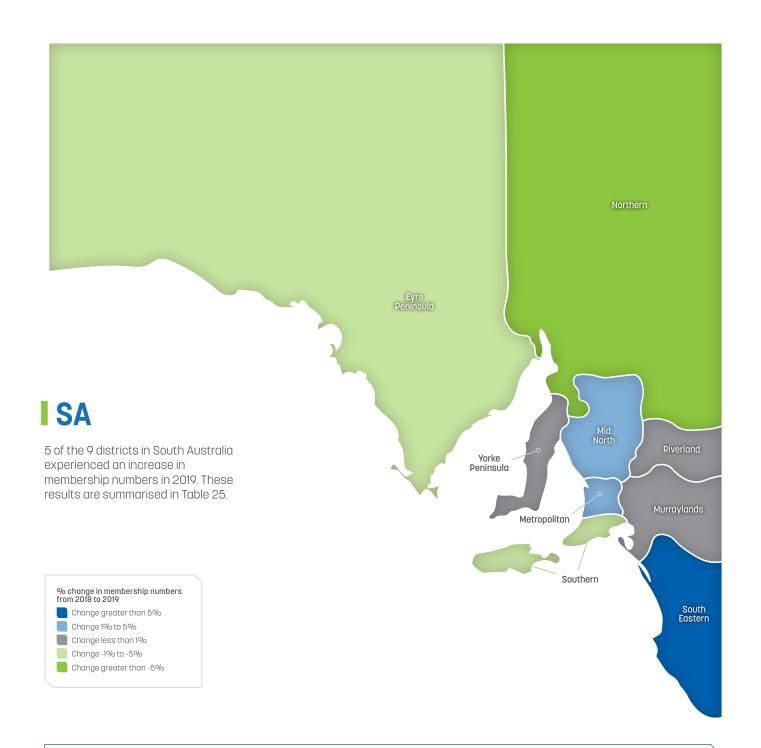

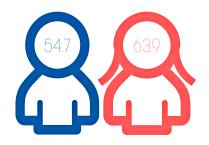

Average age

The average reported age of club members across Australia is 56.3 years. Little variation is evident across different states (with the exception of the Northern Territory). In terms of gender, the average age of male members is 54.7 years, nine years younger than the average female age of 63.9 years.



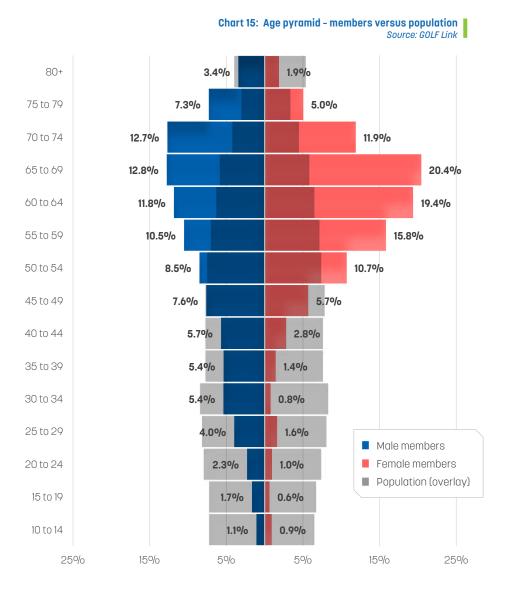


Average age reported for club members

Chart 15 illustrates the current mix of club members by gender compared to the broader national population above 10 years. Evidencing golf's appeal to the older age cohorts, it shows a material portion of club members in the 60 to 74 year cohort - 38% of male members and 55% of female members - versus a lower national population share of this cohort of only 17%o.

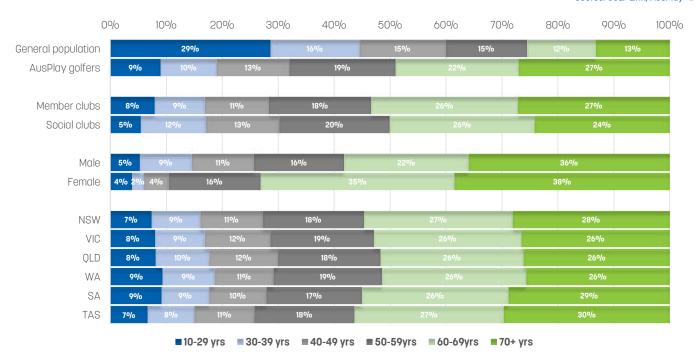
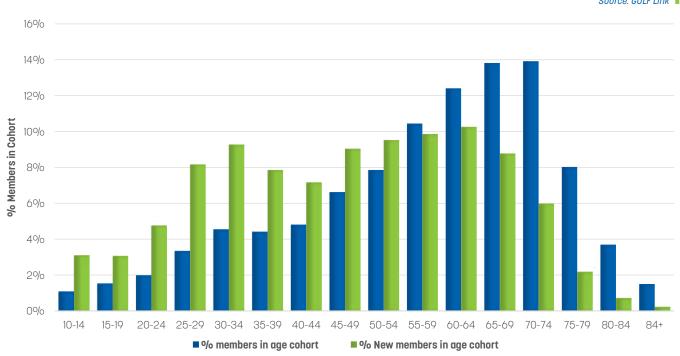


Chart 17: New member age profile compared to members generally

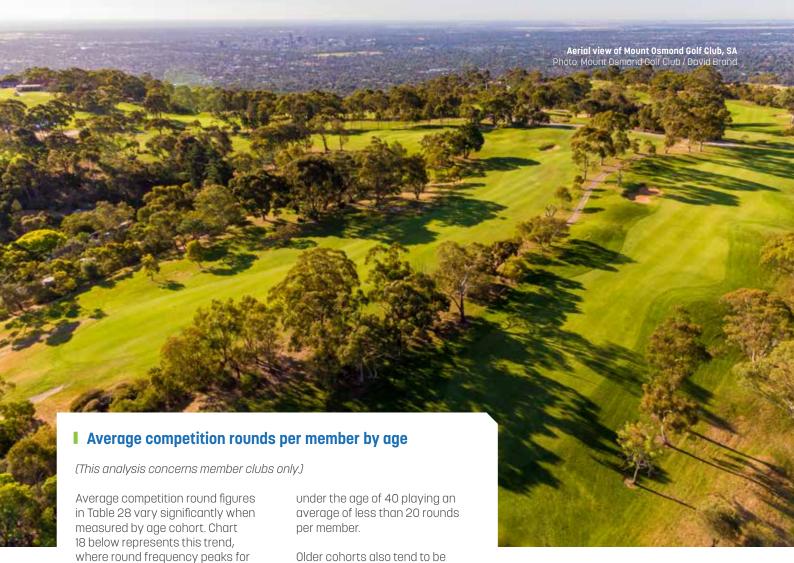

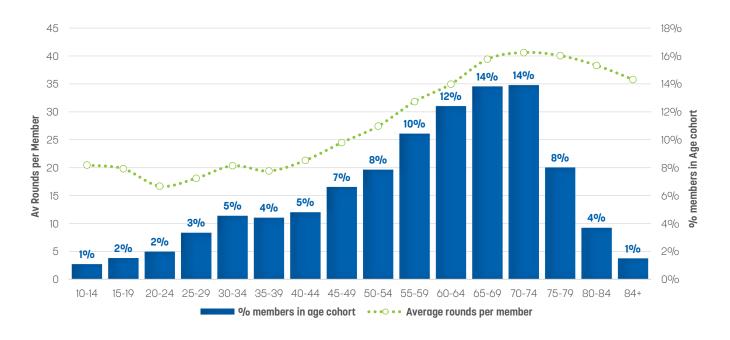

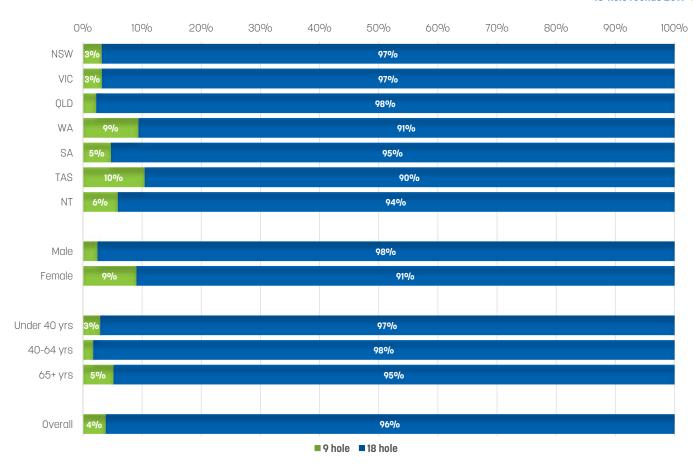
Younger members by contrast

9-hole competition rounds

Addressing the changing environment in which golf is operating in and following a global initiative by the R&A, the promotion of increased 9-hole rounds has been a focus of Golf Australia.

Changes to the handicapping system were instigated to allow for such rounds to be played and to be attributable to handicap movement. Key 2019 outcomes are represented in Chart 19.



Key Observations

Key outcomes for 2019 compared to 2018 are noted below:



- A total of 392,114 9-hole rounds were played in 2019, an increase of 33% over 9-hole rounds played in 2018.
- In 2019 9-hole rounds accounted for 4% of total rounds played.
- Of those clubs playing 9-hole rounds (64% of clubs), 9-hole rounds accounted for 9% of total rounds played
- For those clubs recording 9-hole rounds in both 2018 & 2019, on a per member basis, average 9-hole rounds played increased from 1.4 to 1.9 per member
- The largest increases in 9-hole play were seen in WA (4% to 9%) and Tasmania (3% to 10%)
- The 65 yr + age cohort played the highest proportion of 9-hole rounds, reflecting 5% of overall rounds played. This grows to an







Community Instructor Program

The Community Instructor Program provides online training and accreditation, equipping golfers and non-golfers with the skills and knowledge to deliver Golf Australia's national participation programs in local golf clubs and schools primarily through voluntary means. These accredited Community Instructors play an integral role in attracting and introducing new people to golf and providing a pathway to increasing community involvement in the sport.

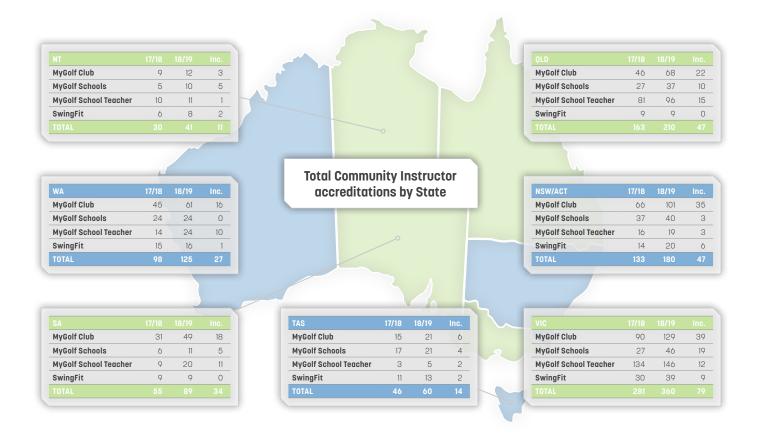
The program has seen progressive growth over the past four years since its launch in 2015. By the end of the 2018/19 year, there were 1,065 accredited Community Instructors, a growth of 259 accreditations on the previous year. Total accreditations are summarised in Table 29.

Whilst further recruitment of volunteers into the program remains

a key focus, strategies to actively engage the workforce already accredited, in the delivery of club and school-based programs were employed throughout the year. The specialised MyGolf Schools Teacher Accreditation was also strongly promoted to upskill teachers to deliver programs in their schools and create an all-important avenue of promotion and transition to MyGolf programs at local facilities.

Disability Inclusion Program

Leadership and governance

2018/19 has seen significant growth globally in the development of pathways for people with disability to participate in the game of golf. Golf Australia through its collaboration with EDGA, the IGF and R&A have assisted in developing the World Rankings for Golfers with Disability through WAGR. Since January 2019, ranking events for golfers with disability have more than doubled to an annual calendar of 40+ events, twelve of these events being held in Australia, making Golf Australia the most active federation in the world for events for golfers with a disability.

The Australian All Abilities Championship

The Australian All Abilities Championship held within the Emirates Australian Open attracted the attention of the golfing world. The leading 12 players with a disability played the 54-hole championship within the field of the Australian Open. An overwhelming success, the inaugural AAAC was won by Sweden's Johan Kammerstad which included a final round 73, a performance not matched by seasoned PGA Tour Members. The format has inspired other tours around the world with the European Tour and PGA Tour mirroring Golf Australia's format.

In addition to the Australian All Abilities Championship, the ISPS Handa Disabled Golf Cup was played within the ISPS Handa World Cup of Golf, the first teams' competition of its kind for people with disability during a PGA Tour event.

Education and workforce development

The PGA All Abilities Coach program in partnership with the PGA of Australia delivered its 100th PGA All Abilities Coach to the program during the 2018/19 year. The further development of the PGA All Abilities Coach program has also seen the opportunity for these coaches to engage in the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS), integrate people with disability into existing club and program offerings and be the driving force behind growing participation for people with disability in the game across all levels. PGA All Abilities Coaches are continuing to build strong partnerships with local organisations, opening facilities to a wider proportion of their communities.

Participation

Total participants in these programs continued to show an upward trajectory in 2019. Inclusive of other disability organisations, total participant numbers increased to 10,629. Programs delivered by Golf Australia grew by 24%, increasing from 3,743 in 2018 to 4,623 in 2019.



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
