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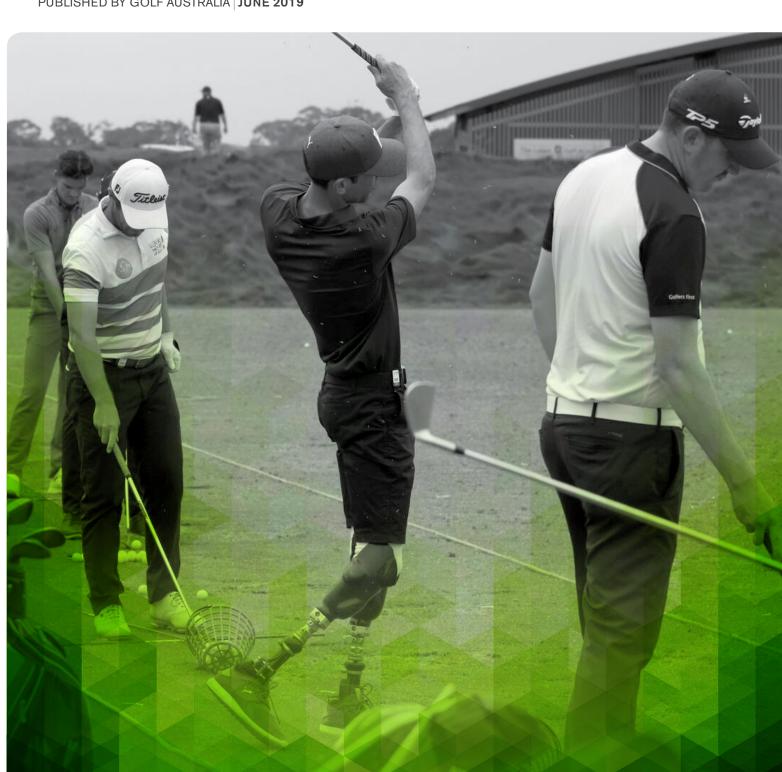

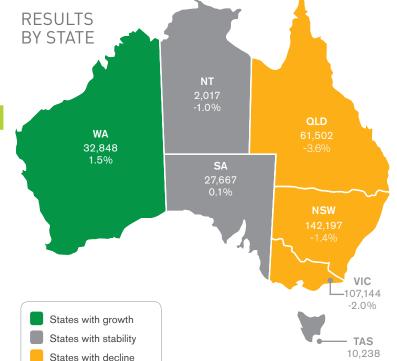

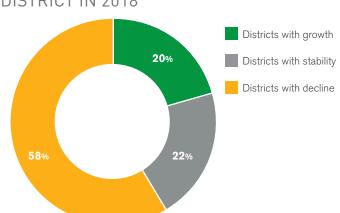

# O2 REPORT BACKGROUND



#### Introduction

## O 3 BROADER GOLF PARTICIPATION TRENDS

#### Introduction to AusPlay

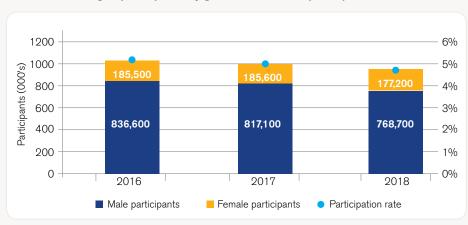
In 2016 the Australian Sports Commission (ASC) recommenced its reporting on sports participation in Australia. Titled AusPlay, this now annual release of participation data across all sports enables a broader perspective of golf participation outside of the membership model as well as the ability to compare trends of golf participation to those of other sports.

The latest AusPlay data (labelled here as 2018) and sourced from more than 20,000 interviews, relates to the 2018 fiscal year. 2016 and 2017 figures are included for comparison purposes.

#### Golf Participants According to AusPlay

An estimated 946,000 adults (15+ years old) participated in golf for 2018. This equates to 4.7% of the adult population, down from 5.2% in 2016. 81% of participants in 2018 are male and 19% female, a ratio similar to prior reporting periods. These outcomes are summarised in Chart 1.

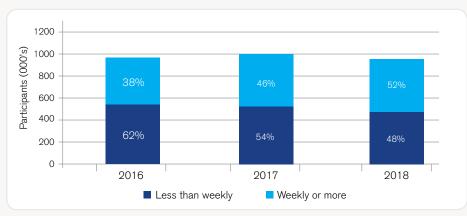
Chart 1 - Annual golf participants by gender and overall participation rate

Although overall participation is falling, AusPlay data indicates the frequency mix is shifting. In 2018, 52% of participants played golf on at least a weekly basis compared to 46% in 2017 and 38% in 2016. These results, which indicate a higher proportion of frequent participants in 2018 compared to prior years, are summarised in Chart 2.

Chart 2 - Annual golf participants by frequency



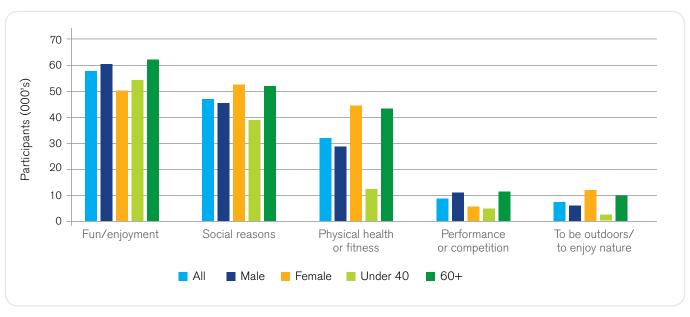

#### Motivations and Barriers to Participation

In addition to participation data, the AusPlay survey also collects data concerning motivations and barriers to participation. This data serves as a key reminder to the industry of what needs the sport is satisfying for participants, from the sport, guidance concerning industry marketing initiatives and challenges to be dealt with through on-going development of golf's consumer offer.

### Key findings concerning **motivations** for participation include:



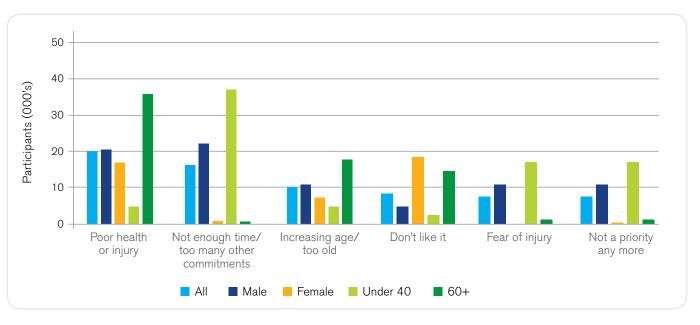
- The #1 motivating factor is fun/enjoyment, followed by the social nature (group participation pre/during/ post) of the sport.
- Social reasons and physical health or fitness are generally more important for female participants and participants aged 60+
- Less important for all markets are motivations concerning competition or performance.

### Key findings concerning **barriers** to participation are:

- The primary barrier to on-going participation is poor health or injury. This barrier is particularly prevalent for the 60+ year age group.
- The second barrier is time and other competing activities. This barrier is particularly prevalent for the under 40 year age group. This barrier is one that can be somewhat addressed by providing alternative forms of participation that require less time.

#### Member Golf Association Reporting

Club golfer numbers are reported annually each year by the seven respective state and territory member golf association (MGA) bodies. The reported numbers reflect those members who pay a capitation fee to their respective body, generally defined as those classified as 'having a class of membership that provides regular golf course access. The respective reporting periods and the respective membership timing they represent are summarised in Table 1.

Given the different collection and reporting periods, the reported numbers for each state are not for the same comparable 12-month period. With data provided by individual club by gender for all national regions and clubs, the MGA reports are the most accurate source of member data available. In order for annual trends to be determined, the most recently published (or to be published) state numbers have been aggregated and classified as belonging to 2018

Throughout the report, Golf Clubs will refer to all metropolitan and regional clubs that are based at a golf course and are typically responsible for the operation of that facility. Social Clubs will refer to clubs with either sem-permanent access rights to a public golf course (e.g. Victorian Golf League) or a club that utilise Golflink for handicapping purposes in the events they deliver to their members.



#### Profile of Australian Clubs

1,654 clubs reported membership numbers for 2018. Summarised below in Table 2 is the size profile of these golf clubs, classified by general geographic location and club size.

#### Key observations noted from the size profile data outlined above include:



- 66% of Golf Clubs in Australia have 250 or less members, with 81% having 500 or less members.
- 85% of Golf Clubs in Australia are located in a regional area, 76% of these clubs containing less than 250 members.
- While Golf Clubs of over 1,000 members account for only 5% of all Golf Clubs across Australia, they accommodate 26% of total Golf Club members.
- There are 328 Social Clubs, which account for 20% of total clubs.

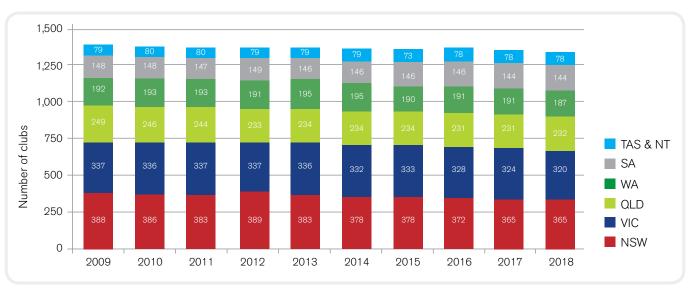

#### Golf Club Count

There are currently 1,326 Golf Clubs in Australia. There has been a steady decline in clubs over the past 10-year period, from a high of 1,393 in 2009. In 2018, four fewer clubs were reported in Victoria and Western Australia. All these clubs were in regional areas.

#### Playing Members - Results and Trends

#### 2018 national total

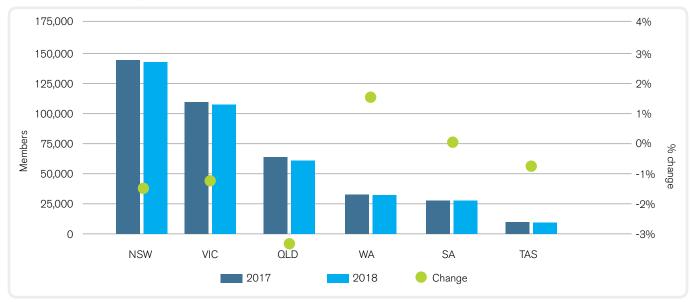
National membership numbers across Australia are reported as 383,613. This result represents a 1.6% net decline from 2017.

Western Australia and South Australia experienced a net gain in membership numbers for the period of 1.5% and 0.1% respectively. The three eastern states of New South Wales, Victoria and Queensland, accounting for 78% of total membership numbers, saw declines in member numbers of 1.4%, 1.1% and 3.6% respectively.

Member numbers for 2018 compared to 2017 and the percentage change for each state are summarised in Chart 6.

In aggregating all golf districts reported across the six states, a total of 74 markets emerge. 20% of these districts experienced membership growth over 2017, 22% reported stable outcomes and 58% reported declines.

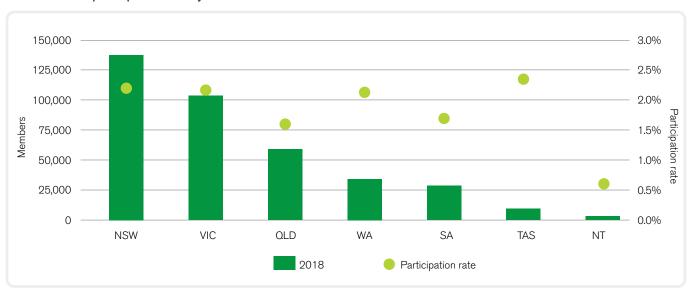
Chart 7 - Change in members by district in 2018



#### Adult participation rate

Charts 8 and 9 illustrate registered golfers by state and region as a percentage of each state or region's total population. The participation rate for adults (18 years and above) across Australia is 1.9%. Participation rates above the national average were recorded in New South Wales, Victoria, Western Australia and Tasmania.

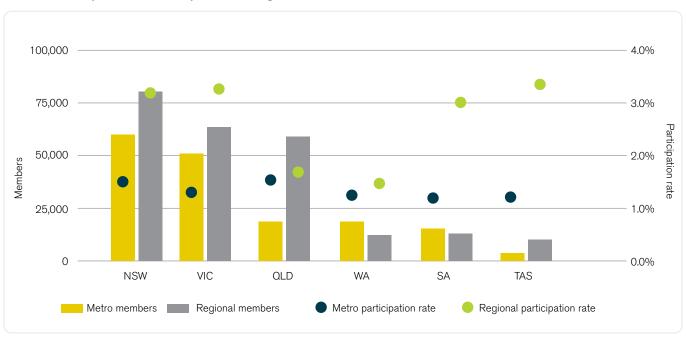
Chart 8 - Adult participation rate by state

The average participation rate within regional areas is 2.4%, materially higher than the average 1.4% recorded for metropolitan areas (including social club members). Regional participation rates of over 3% are evident in New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania.

Chart 9 - Participation rate, metropolitan and regional

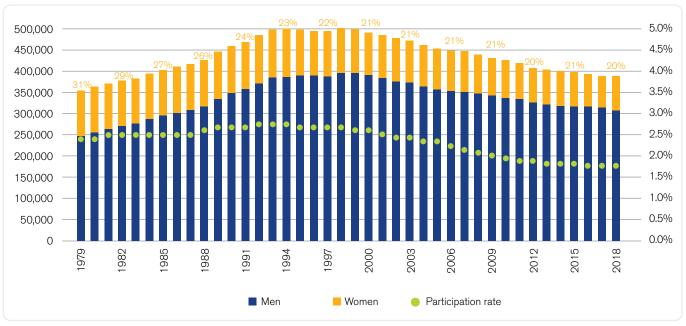

#### Historical trends

History shows that club membership numbers peaked in Australia in 1998 at approximately 500,000 golfers. Since then, a steady decline has materialised averaging 1.3% per annum over the period. There has also been a decline in the proportion of female members, from a high of 31% in 1979 down to the current level at 20% in 2018.

In the more recent five-year period, there has been an average annual decline of 0.8% in club membership demand. While there was an average annual increase of 1.3% in South Australia over this period, a decline was evident in other states ranging from 0.5% in Western Australia to 1.9% for the Northern Territory.

#### Metropolitan Golf Clubs

The overall national movement for metropolitan clubs was a decline of 0.8%, slightly higher than the average annual decline of 0.7% recorded over the past five years. Western Australia was the only state to record an increase in metropolitan member numbers (1.8%), with all other states experiencing a declines ranging from -0.3% (NSW) to -4.1% (SA).

#### Regional Golf Clubs

The overall national movement for regional clubs was a decline of 2.1%, more than double the decline recorded in metropolitan markets and twice the average annual decline over the past five years. Western Australia was the only state to record an increase in regional member numbers (0.3%), with all other states experiencing a declines ranging from 1.0% (NT) to 3.6% (QLD).

#### Social Clubs

There was a small decline in social club members of 0.6%. There has been steady growth over the past five-year period, representing an average annual increase of 2.3%. Given this growth, and the declines recorded in traditional clubs, social club members now account for 5.8% of total club members across Australia, up from 4.9% in 2014.

#### Male members

Reported male members declined by 1.8%, representing almost the entire total annual result. Over the past five years, the average annual decline was slightly lower at 0.7%. Declines of 0.7% and 2.6% respectively were reported in male numbers in metropolitan and regional clubs. Western Australia and South Australia were the only states to report an increase in male member numbers (1.2% and 1.0% respectively).

#### Female members

Female member numbers declined by 0.3%, the smallest annual decline recorded since 2010. Queensland (+3.6%), Western Australia and Northern Territory all experienced a net increase in member numbers for 2018.

#### Female members (cont)

While there was minimal movement in female numbers, the gender mix in 2018 stays as it was in 2017 - 80% male, 20% female. Western Australia has the highest percentage of female members at 22%, and Tasmania the lowest at 17%.

#### Junior members

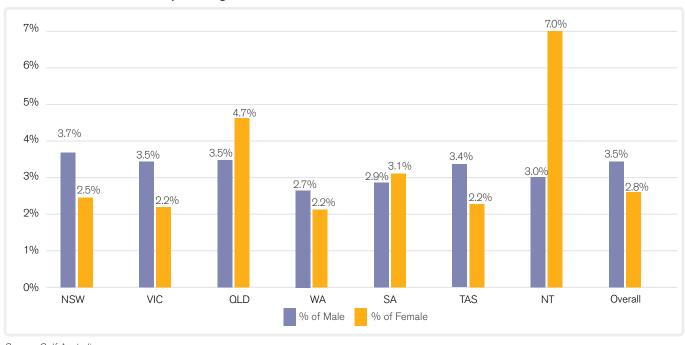
Junior members (under the age of 18) totalled 12,778, representing a decline of 5.5% over 2017. Similar levels of decline were evident for metropolitan and regional clubs. By gender, junior male and female numbers declined by 7.7% and 6.9% respectively.

Junior members represent 3.3% of total members. By gender, male juniors represent a slightly higher proportion of total males than junior females do of total females; 3.5% compared to 2.8%.

Chart 12 - Junior members as percentage of total members

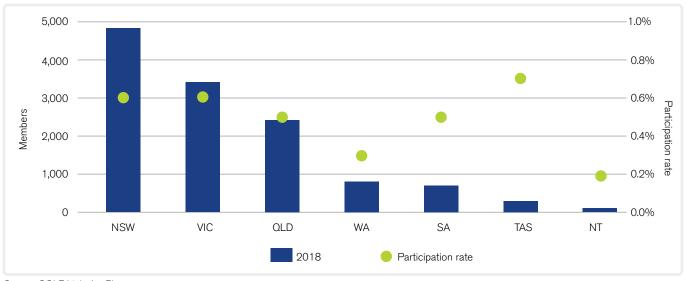

#### Junior participation rate

The participation rate for juniors across Australia is 0.5%, significantly lower than the 1.9% for adults. Participation rates above the national average were recorded in New South Wales, Victoria and Tasmania.

#### MyGolf

MyGolf is Australia's national junior introductory program to develop and promote participation in golf. The MyGolf program is designed for 5 to 12 year olds and is the major driver of junior golf participation in Australia. MyGolf participation numbers for the past five years are summarised in Table 11.

#### Level of membership movement

35% of clubs experienced a net increase in membership numbers with 24% experiencing growth in excess of 5%. This compares to 48% experiencing some decline in numbers and 36% having a decline of greater than 5%. 16% of clubs had stable numbers in 2018.



Stable clubs are defined subject to size. For clubs with 500 members or less, stable is defined as experiencing a change in member numbers of less than +/-2% from the prior year. For clubs with between 500 and 750, +/-1.5% movement is considered stable. For clubs with over 1,000 members +/-1% movement is considered stable. "Significant growth / decline" is defined as greater than 5% for all clubs.

#### Playing Member Age Profile

#### Average age

The average reported age of club members across Australia is 57 years. Little variation is evident across different states (with the exception of the Northern Territory). In terms of gender, the average age of male members is 56 years, eight years younger than the average female age of 64 years.

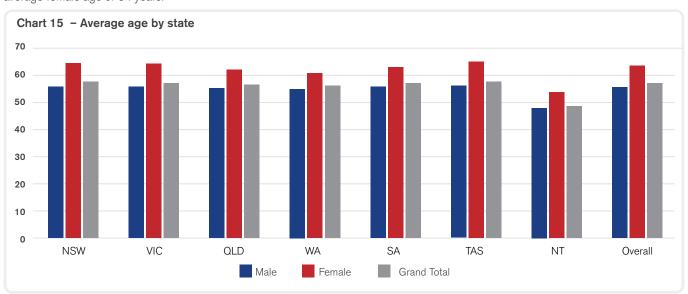


Chart 16 - Age distribution by gender

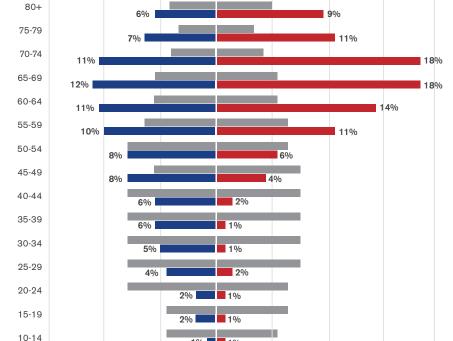

#### Age distribution

The following chart illustrates the current mix of club members compared to the broader national population above 10 years. Evidencing golf's appeal to the older age cohorts, it shows a material portion of club members in the 60 to 74 year cohort - 34% of male members and 50% of female members - versus a lower national population share of this cohort of only 17%.

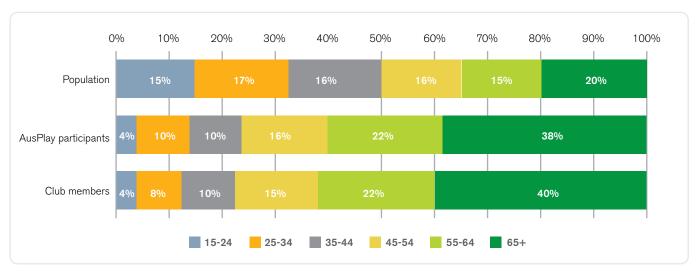

#### Age distribution (cont)

To provide context for the data in Chart 16, below data from AusPlay is reintroduced to compare the age distribution of club golfers to golfers who participated at least once in the 12-month period. A similar age profile is evident for club members and more general golf participants, with a slightly greater share in the 65+ age category for club members (40%) than more general participants (38%).

Chart 17 - Age distribution for population, general golf participants and club members

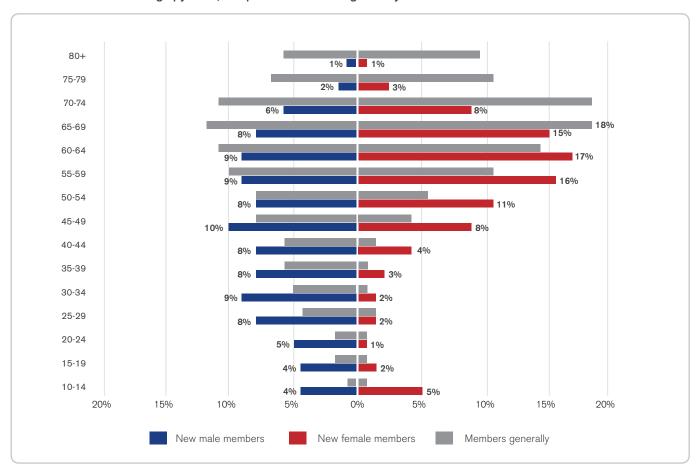

#### New member age profile

New members to club golf show a younger age profile than is evident for club members generally. In 2018 56% of new males and 28% of new females were under the age of 50 compared to 35% and 13% respectively across all members.

# 5 STATE MEMBERSHIP OUTCOMES

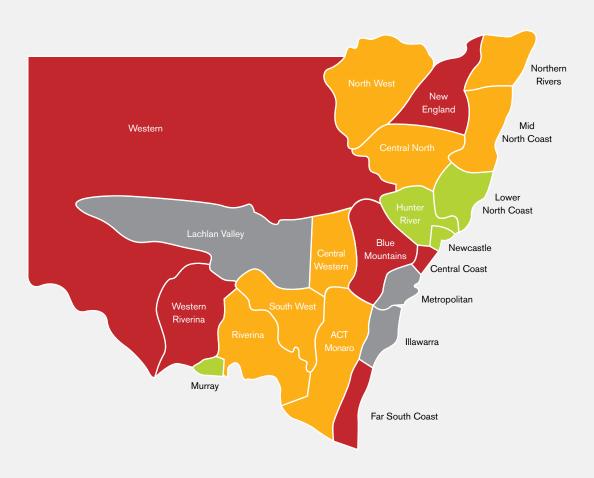
#### New South Wales

5 of the 21 districts in NSW experienced a net increase in membership numbers. The greatest gains were evident for the Lower North Coast at 3.2% and the Hunter River at 2.0%. Losses of greater than 5% were evident in Far South Coast, Blue Mountains, New England, Western and Western Riverina. A loss of over 10.4% was experienced in the Central Coast.

Given an increase in total rounds played and a reported decline in membership numbers, average annual rounds played on a per member thus increased in 2018 from 26.1 to 26.9 rounds.

On a state basis, average playing frequency is greatest in Western Australia and South Australia, both with over 30 rounds per member annually. Average frequency is slightly higher for metropolitan clubs at 29.3 rounds compared to regional clubs at 26.3 rounds per annum. 5-year average rounds data from GOLF Link in summarised in Table 19.
