Is this your first time visiting a Portland General Electric park?

We take care of fourteen different parks and help our partners like the U.S. Forest Service and Oregon State Parks take care of theirs, too!

Our Timber Park and Trojan Park are best known for their disc golf courses and large picnic shelters. Timothy Lake, Lake Harriet, Promontory, Pelton, Perry South and Monty parks all have great campgrounds with places for fishing, boating, paddling, or swimming.

You can look for wildlife at Faraday Lake and Trout Creek Ranch and enjoy the views at Round Butte and Balancing Rocks overlooks.

Earn your Junior Ranger badge!


Kids 5 years and older can earn a Junior Ranger badge while exploring PGE's parks. Use this activity book as your guide as you go!





What's going wrong at this park?




