

## 2005

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- Five Northwest Tribes with treaty-based rights to fish at Willamette Falls enter compromise plan for cultural access to PGE’s property as part of PGE’s relicensing efforts with Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC).
- FERC grants PGE’s current license to operate the T.W. Sullivan Hydroelectric Plant to 2035, confirms FERC boundary.

## 2016

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Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) permit authorizes Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde to catch 15 salmon a year for ceremonial purposes; does not include access to PGE property.

### 2016 – 2017

Oregon Department of State Lands (ODSL) and Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde assert that PGE owns fishing platform site.

## 2017

## 2018

### May

As owner, PGE licenses Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde access to conduct ceremonial activities and to assess PGE property for the purposes of evaluating potential placement of a fishing platform. The agreement explicitly prohibits any construction.

### August

- Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde seeks a permit from ODSL for access to site, asserting ODSL ownership.
- ODSL grants a “Waterway Registration” permit to Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde, allowing them to erect a fishing platform.

### September

- PGE revokes access license agreement to Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde.
- PGE, Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs, the Umatilla Indian Reservation and Yakama Nation submit letters to ODSL opposing the fishing platform erected by the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde.

### November

ODSL Director issues an order affirming the Waterway Registration permit to Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde.

### December

PGE, Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs, the Umatilla Indian Reservation, Yakama Nation and Siletz Tribes appeal the ODSL’s authority to issue the Waterway Registration permit; an administrative legal “contested case” proceeding begins.

## 2019

### November

First mediation effort begins with assistance of federal judges.

## 2021

### April

- Second mediation effort begins with assistance of federal judges.
- Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde withdraw from mediation.
- PGE files required application for “Non-Project Use of Project Lands” with FERC, seeking approval for a perpetual cultural practices easement to allow all federally recognized Northwest Tribes, including Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde, access to PGE property for cultural practices.

### May

Administrative law proceeding resumes on issues not related to ownership of the area where Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde’s fishing platform is located.

### December

PGE and the State of Oregon begin discussions about alternative resolution of the property dispute.

## 2022

### May

Administrative law hearing set for contested case.
