

**Similac Pro-Advance™, Similac Pro-Sensitive™, Similac® for Spit-Up,
Similac® Soy Isomil® & Similac Total Comfort™
Mixing Instructions for 24 Calories per Ounce**

Similac® infant formula is mixed to provide 19 calories per ounce. Your infant needs a higher calorie formula, so you should follow these instructions closely. Make sure you measure the infant formula powder and the water correctly. Please measure the water and powder separately.

Measure Water Fluid Ounces		Formula Powder unpacked, level scoops added		Final Volume
4 ½ ounces*	+	3 scoops	=	5 ounces
6 ounces	+	4 scoops	=	7 ounces
10 ½ ounces*	+	7 scoops	=	12 ounces

***1/2 ounce = 1 Tablespoon**

Mixing Similac® Infant Formula Using Measuring Cups

Measure Water Fluid Ounces		Formula Powder Added		Final Volume
18 ½ ounces*	+	1 cup	=	21 ounces
28 ounces	+	1 ½ cups	=	32 ounces

***1/2 ounce = 1 Tablespoon**

Put formula in fridge for 24 hours then throw away.

Do not heat formula in a microwave.

Use clean bottle or tap water to make infant formula. Check with your local health department about the safety of your tap water supply. If your water supply comes from a well, have the water tested to make sure it's safe before using it for your baby. To make water safe, bring water to a rolling boil for 1 minute, cool quickly (no longer than 30 minutes) and prepare formula.
