

# Health Facts for you

## **Medicine Disposal**

This handout describes the risks of keeping unused or unwanted medicines or throwing them away in the trash. Safe disposal options are included.

#### **Risks**

When a prescription changes, you may have leftover pills, creams or gels. Some of these medicines can put children, teens, or other adults at risk. Prescription medicines are the second most abused drug by children and teens. Keeping left over medicine around raises the risk of someone else using them.

Some people throw away medicines in their trash. By doing this, there is still risk that someone else may use them. There is also risk that they will get into the water system causing problems for wildlife and humans.

#### Safe Medicine Disposal

The best option is to use a MedDrop box. Many of them are at local police stations. To find safe drop off sites, go to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration website: https://www.fda.gov/drugs/disposal-unused-medicines-what-you-should-know/drug-disposal-drug-take-back-locations

Another option is to drop them off at a local "Prescription Drug Take Back Days." These events happen about twice a year. Call your local public health office for details about the next event.

#### **Medicines Accepted**

- Lotions/creams
- Prescription pills
- Over the counter pills
- Vitamins
- Nebulizer solutions
- Medicine samples

### **Medicines Not Accepted**

- Sharps, Epi-pens or anything with a needle or lancet
- Large volume fluids such as IV bags or dialysis fluids
- Oxygen tanks
- Nebulizer machines
- Thermometers

## **Drop Off Process for MedDrop Boxes**

- Empty pill bottles into a Ziplock or other bag with a seal. Recycle the empty pill bottles after removing or blacking out the prescription label.
- Leave liquids, gels, or creams in the containers and place in a separate bag.

- Prescription pills
- Over the counter pills
- Capsules

## **Medicines Not Accepted**

- Lotions/creams
- Liquids
- Illegal drugs
- Sharps, Epi-pens or anything with a needle or lancet
- Aerosols
- Cans
- Thermometers

## **Drop Off Process for Take Back Bins**

Remove medicines from the container. Empty the loose pills/capsules in the bins. Recycle the empty pill bottles after removing or blacking out the prescription label.

#### **Options If No Drop Box Available**

You may also buy a Deterra® Drug Deactivation System. It is easy to use and safe for the environment. You can buy it from local pharmacies. If you think you will need this, ask about it when picking up your medicine.

If there is no drop box in your area, mix the pills with either kitty litter or coffee grounds. Seal in a plastic bag and throw in the trash.
