## Nutramigen® Mixing Instructions for 24 Calories per Ounce

Nutramigen<sup>®</sup> infant formula is mixed to provide 20 calories per ounce. Your infant needs higher calorie formula. Follow these instructions closely when mixing formula. Make sure you measure the infant formula powder and the water correctly. Please measure the water and powder separately.

## This formula must be PACKED into scoops

Measure Water Fluid Ounces		Formula Powder packed, level scoops added		Final Volume
5 ounces	+	3 scoops	=	5 ½ ounces
6 ½ ounces*	+	4 scoops	=	7 ½ ounces
13 ounces	+	8 scoops	=	15 ounces

<sup>\* 1/2</sup> ounce = 1 Tablespoon

Mixing Nutramigen® using measuring cups:

Measure Water Fluid Ounces		Formula Powder Added (packed)		Final Volume
20 ½ ounces*	+	1 cup	Ш	23 ounces
30 ½ ounces*	+	1 1/2 cups	=	34.5 ounces

<sup>\*1/2</sup> ounce = 1 Tablespoon

Put formula in fridge for 24 hours then discard.

Do not heat formula in a microwave oven.

Use clean bottle or tap water to make infant formula. Check with your local health department about the safety of your tap water supply. If your water supply comes from a well, have the water tested to make sure it's safe before using it for your baby. To make water safe, bring water to a rolling boil for 1 minute, cool quickly (no longer than 30 minutes) and prepare formula.
