



THE FIFTH LESSON

The Angel Gabriel salutes the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Luke 1:26-35; 38

In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, "Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you." But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. The angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David. He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end." Mary said to the angel, "How can this be, since I am a virgin?" The angel said to her, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be holy; he will be called Son of God." Then Mary said, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her.

To this the noble virgin replied, saying to him: "I am the humble handmaid of almighty God. To you, heavenly messenger, who knows so great a secret, I give my assent, and desiring to see accomplished what I hear, I am ready to obey God's decision."

Luke 2:1; 3-7


Read by Kevin Cordova-Brookey, Leadership for the Angel Tree Gift Drive.

THE EIGHTH LESSON

Matthew 2:1-12

The wise men are led by the star to Jesus.

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel." Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. John 1:1-14



THE ORIGIN OF LESSONS AND CAROLS

The traditional service of Lessons and Carols was popularized in the Chapel of King's College, Cambridge, where it was first observed on Christmas Eve in 1918. The Armistice agreement that ended World War I had been signed just a month earlier, and England was gradually emerging from the trauma of that long conflict. The newly appointed Dean of King's College, Eric Milner-White, had served as an army chaplain during the war and sought to lift the spirits of his parishioners by offering a new worship service for Christmas Eve. He borrowed from an older service that had been created by Bishop E.W. Benson for Truro Cathedral in 1880. The service alternated scripture with carols and told the story of our salvation from humankind's fall from grace in the Garden of Eden to our redemption in the birth of Jesus Christ. The service was first broadcast from King's College on Christmas Eve in 1929 and, with the exception of 1930, it has been broadcast annually, even during the Second World War, when the ancient glass (and also all heat) had been removed from the Chapel.

Sometime in the early 1930s, the BBC began broadcasting the service on overseas radio programs, capturing the imagination of millions of listeners around the world. One correspondent reported listening to the service from a tent on the foothills of Mt. Everest; another, in the desert. Since the first broadcast, churches, cathedrals, and schools around the world have joined in the tradition of presenting this special liturgy during the Advent and Christmas seasons. So it is that we at St. John's join the throngs of pilgrims on our journey to the manger as we prepare again for the coming of the Messiah through the reading of scripture and the singing of carols.




THE 1816 SOCIETY

At St. John's Church, we believe Christ is calling us to be a renewed church in a changing world. Empowered by the Spirit of God, we respond to Jesus' call as we deepen our bond with Christ through worship, become a community where all are accepted, and work together as laity and clergy to do God's work in the world.

St. John's was organized in 1815 to serve as a parish church for Episcopalians residing in the neighborhoods in the west end of the District of Columbia. Its cornerstone was laid on September 14, 1815, and it was consecrated on December 27, 1816. Beginning with James Madison, every person who has held the office of President of the United States has attended a service at the church. Several Presidents have been communicants. Thus, St. John's is often referred to as the "Church of the Presidents." Pew 54 is the President's Pew. The architect of the church was Benjamin Henry Latrobe, who assisted in the rebuilding of the U.S. Capitol and the White House after the War of 1812. Twenty-five of the stained glass windows in St. John's were designed and executed by artisans of the noted Lorin firm of Chartres, France.
