



THE FIRST READING

1 Corinthians 15:35-38, 42-50

Please be seated.

Someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body.

So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. Thus it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. As was the man of dust, so are those who are of the dust; and as is the man of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we will also bear the image of the man of heaven.

What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.

because they seek refuge in him.



Jesus said, "I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. 

In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."



INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Priest The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All persons, including children, are welcome to receive Holy Communion with us. Wait for an usher to call your pew to come forward. You will first be handed a wafer by a priest (gluten-free wafers are available by request) and then offered wine by a lay server. You may either sip the wine or dip your wafer into the wine. Receiving the bread alone is a valid way to share in the Eucharist. Parents may decide if their children receive the bread and/or wine. All may instead signal their desire to be blessed by the priest by crossing their arms over their chest.





Notes from the Composer

Cantata "Ubuntu" is a work that pays homage to the legacy of Archbishop Desmond Tutu, a global champion of justice, peace, and reconciliation. Commissioned by St. John's Church, Lafayette Square—familiarly known as the "Church of the Presidents"—this composition reflects the church's deep connection to national reflection and moral discourse. St. John's, standing at the heart of Washington, D.C., has served as a beacon of hope and sanctuary in times of political and social turmoil, notably during the George Floyd protests of May 2020.

During these protests, a fire was started in the parish house of St. John's Church, and in response, a mural of Archbishop Desmond Tutu was painted on the church's barricaded doors by local artist Levi Robinson. This image stood as a powerful symbol of *ubuntu*—the profound interconnectedness of all people—a principle at the core of Tutu's teachings. *Ubuntu*, a concept from Tutu's native South Africa, expresses the idea that "I am because we are" and calls for peace, love, and justice as integral parts of our shared humanity.

In the wake of the mural, *Cantata "Ubuntu"* emerges as a reflection of Tutu's life and message, blending South African sacred traditions with Latin and Western influences. It draws inspiration from the re-setting of an old 19th-century Xhosa hymn text, along with Biblical and sacred texts, uniting cultures and languages in a harmonious whole.

FINAL THOUGHTS FROM THE COMPOSER

Cantata "Ubuntu" reflects the values shared by St. John's Church and Archbishop Tutu: justice, peace, and unity. The church, having been a place of refuge and a symbol of resilience during times of protest and division, serves as an ideal setting for this composition. The connection between the mural of Desmond Tutu, painted on the church's barricaded doors, and the message of ubuntu—that all lives are interconnected—is reflected in the music, which brings together different cultures and sacred traditions in a harmonious whole.

By setting Tutu's native Xhosa prayers, Latin scripture, and English chorale texts to music, this composition encapsulates his belief that all humanity is bound together by love and hope. As Tutu himself said, "Goodness is stronger than evil; love is stronger than hate; light is stronger than darkness; life is stronger than death." This work stands as a musical manifestation of that enduring message.

ABOUT THE COMPOSER

Franco Prinsloo, an internationally acclaimed composer and conductor hailing from Pretoria, South Africa, has garnered acclaim for his award-winning contributions to contemporary classical music globally. In addition to his various creative pursuits, Prinsloo is the founder and conductor of the Vox Chamber Choir, an internationally acclaimed ensemble based in Pretoria, South Africa. Dedicated to bringing his music to life, this choir is committed to producing professional recordings and performances of Prinsloo's choral works and further developing South African choral music within the broader classical music scene nationally and internationally. In 2019, Prinsloo earned the prestigious ImpACT Award for Young Professionals from the Arts & Culture Trust (act.org.za) in recognition of his outstanding composition skills. Further solidifying his status in the artistic community, he was honoured in 2023 with the Medal of Honour for Art by the South African Academy of Science and Art.



BUILDING UP THE BELOVED COMMUNITY: THE ENDURING LEGACY OF DESMOND TUTU

Desmond Tutu began his ministry amidst South Africa's struggle against apartheid, a system of legalized racial segregation. He rose through the ranks of the Anglican Church in South Africa, being elected in 1976 as Bishop of Lesotho, and in 1985 as Bishop of Johannesburg. In 1986 he was consecrated Archbishop of Cape Town and Primate of the Anglican Church of Southern Africa.

The idea of *ubuntu*, that "I am because we are," was central to his ministry. He observed that "we can be human only in fellowship, in community, in *koinonia*, in peace." And he noted that a "person who is compassionate and gentle, who treats others as what they are, human beings, has *ubuntu*."

Tutu was awarded the 1984 Nobel Peace Prize "for his role as a unifying figure in the non-violent campaign to resolve the problem of apartheid in South Africa," and at his funeral in 2021, he was eulogized by South Africa's President as "our moral compass and national conscience."

Archbishop Tutu was also a voice for justice and peace here in Washington, D.C. He became close friends with Bishop John T. Walker, the sixth Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Washington. In 1985 Bishop Walker was arrested outside the South African Embassy along with 77 other apartheid protesters, about half of them Episcopal priests. Archbishop Tutu later supported Bishop Walker by becoming Honorary Chairman of the Advisory Board of the Bishop John T. Walker School for Boys in Anacostia.

St. John's partnership with Kwasa College, a pre-primary and primary school in South Africa, was inspired by the conviction of Archbishop Tutu and Bishop Walker that the Episcopal Diocese of Washington could help to build up the beloved community in South Africa. Our longstanding Kwasa partnership continues to be a central focus of St. John's outreach ministry, providing regular opportunities for cultural exchange. This past summer, a group of parishioners traveled to South Africa to meet with students and teachers at Kwasa College. Together, they planted trees on the school campus in memory of Archbishop Tutu and Bishop Walker.

CELEBRATING DESMOND TUTU'S LEGACY Today at 11 a.m.

Today we celebrate the legacy of Archbishop Desmond Tutu during a service that includes special music and a **sermon** by the Rt. Rev. Eugene Sutton, recently retired Bishop of Maryland. Archbishop Tutu was formerly primate of the Anglican Church of Southern Africa, a Nobel Peace Prize recipient for his leadership in the struggle against apartheid in South Africa, and a good friend of the Episcopal Church in Washington.

The service includes the world premiere of a newly commissioned work of sacred choral music titled *Cantata* "*Ubuntu*" and composed by award-winning South African composer Franco Prinsloo. The **Speaker Series** presentation preceding today's 11 a.m. service includes a Q&A with the composer, joining us live via video from South Africa.

The cantata reflects the values shared by St. John's Church and Archbishop Tutu: justice, peace, and unity. It draws inspiration from the painting of Archbishop Tutu that protected St. John's historic Parish House after the protests around the murder of George Floyd in 2020, shown above. Plans are underway for the Smithsonian Museum of African American History and Culture to accession several of the paintings that protected our buildings. The painting of Archbishop Tutu is on display at St. John's today as we premiere the musical work that it inspired.



WELCOME!

At St. John's Church, we believe Christ is calling us to be a renewed church in a changing world. Empowered by the Spirit of God, we respond to Jesus' call as we deepen our bond with Christ through worship, become a community where all are accepted, and work together as laity and clergy to do God's work in the world.

St. John's was organized in 1815 to serve as a parish church for Episcopalians residing in the neighborhoods in the west end of the District of Columbia. Its cornerstone was laid on September 14, 1815, and it was consecrated on December 27, 1816. Beginning with James Madison, every person who has held the office of President of the United States has attended a service at the church. Several Presidents have been communicants. Thus, St. John's is often referred to as the "Church of the Presidents." Pew 54 is the President's Pew. The architect of the church was Benjamin Henry Latrobe, who assisted in the rebuilding of the U.S. Capitol and the White House after the War of 1812. Twenty-five of the stained glass windows in St. John's were designed and executed by artisans of the noted Lorin firm of Chartres, France.
