

THE FIRST READING

Numbers 11:4-6, 10-16, 24-29

Please be seated. Read by Jeff Agnew.

The rabble among them had a strong craving; and the Israelites also wept again, and said, "If only we had meat to eat! We remember the fish we used to eat in Egypt for nothing, the cucumbers, the melons, the leeks, the onions, and the garlic; but now our strength is dried up, and there is nothing at all but this manna to look at."

Moses heard the people weeping throughout their families, all at the entrances of their tents. Then the LORD became very angry, and Moses was displeased. So Moses said to the LORD, "Why have you treated your servant so badly? Why have I not found favor in your sight, that you lay the burden of all this people on me? Did I conceive all this people? Did I give birth to them, that you should say to me, 'Carry them in your bosom, as a nurse carries a sucking child,' to the land that you promised on oath to their ancestors?

Where am I to get meat to give to all this people? For they come weeping to me and say, 'Give us meat to eat!' I am not able to carry all this people alone, for they are too heavy for me. If this is the way you are going to treat me, put me to death at once—if I have found favor in your sight—and do not let me see my misery."

So the LORD said to Moses, "Gather for me seventy of the elders of Israel, whom you know to be the elders of the people and officers over them; bring them to the tent of meeting, and have them take their place there with you."

So Moses went out and told the people the words of the LORD; and he gathered seventy elders of the people, and placed them all around the tent. Then the LORD came down in the cloud and spoke to him, and took some of the spirit that was on him and put it on the seventy elders; and when the spirit rested upon them, they prophesied. But they did not do so again.

Two men remained in the camp, one named Eldad, and the other named Medad, and the spirit rested on them; they were among those registered, but they had not gone out to the tent, and so they prophesied in the camp. And a young man ran and told Moses, "Eldad and Medad are prophesying in the camp." And Joshua son of Nun, the assistant of Moses, one of his chosen men, said, "My lord Moses, stop them!" 

Mark 9:38-50

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

John said to him, "Teacher, we saw someone casting out demons in your name, and we tried to stop him, because he was not following us." But Jesus said, "Do not stop him; for no one who does a deed of power in my name will be able soon afterward to speak evil of me. Whoever is not against us is for us. For truly I tell you, whoever gives you a cup of water to drink because you bear the name of Christ will by no means lose the reward. If any of you put a stumbling block before one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better for you if a great millstone were hung around your neck and you were thrown into the sea. 

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Priest The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All persons, including children, are welcome to receive Holy Communion with us. Wait for an usher to call your pew to come forward. You will first be handed a wafer by a priest (gluten-free wafers are available by request) and then offered wine by a lay server. You may either sip the wine or dip your wafer into the wine. Receiving the bread alone is a valid way to share in the Eucharist. Parents may decide if their children receive the bread and/or wine. All may instead signal their desire to be blessed by the priest by crossing their arms over their chest.







MUSIC NOTES

Everything old is new again

In an essay titled "The Spirituality of Anglican Hymnody," Raymond Glover, editor of The Hymnal 1982, speaks eloquently about one of the ways that the music of worship impacts our personal faith:

Ideas conveyed by words that are sung root themselves in our hearts and minds much more tenaciously than those merely spoken, a phenomenon the secular world not only recognizes, but even exploits through countless commercial jingles. How often the words of a hymn will return to comfort, perturb, or enlighten us. The re-singing of a familiar hymn, or even the first singing of a new one, can be a remarkable occasion of spiritual insight. As William Cowper noted two centuries ago, "sometimes a light surprises."

Admittedly, we generally find it easier to embrace the familiar than to challenge ourselves with something new. On more than one occasion, a parishioner has sought me out after church to thank me for the music and to reaffirm their preference for the "old" hymns. I crack a wry smile knowing that they are often referring to some of the newer hymns in our book, namely those with tunes written in the late nineteenth or early twentieth century— *Love divine, For all the saints*, and the like. What they really mean is that they prefer to sing the hymns that they knew when they were young. I can relate. The truth is that our hymnal is a rich and complex marriage of ancient and modern. Texts reaching back to the third century are paired with tunes composed anywhere from the ninth century to the modern day. Again, Raymond Glover says it best:

For a fourth-century text to be joined with a twentieth-century tune or for our twentieth-century text to be yoked with a sixteenth-century tune provides eloquent testimony to a confidence that no single time or place or culture has a monopoly on God's favor.

We see the marriage of the ancient and modern in the music for today's service. Two of the most successful composers writing for the Anglican church today create modern settings of some of the oldest texts used in our Episcopal liturgy.



Grayston Ives started his musical life as a chorister at Ely Cathedral before joining the famous King's Singers and becoming organist and choir director at Magdalen College, Oxford. His Missa Brevis sets the traditional Latin text of the Eucharist in a distinctly late-twentieth-century fashion with syncopated rhythms and dense harmonies. It captures the spirit of the liturgy in the joyful dance of the Gloria, the solemn invoking of bells in the Sanctus and even in the paradoxically playful Agnus Dei.

Cecilia McDowall's *Jubilate Deo* was commissioned by Saint Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church in Dallas, Texas, and premiered at the Platinum Jubilee for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in 2022. It captures the joy of Psalm 100 in organ flourishes and dancing vocal melodies. When asked to characterize the work, our own choristers said that it feels youthful and innocent. They also said that it reminds them of a conversation between two entities that shifts between moments of calm and moments of energy. I expect that for many of us, that provides a fitting metaphor for a life of faith.



WELCOME!

At St. John's Church, we believe Christ is calling us to be a renewed church in a changing world. Empowered by the Spirit of God, we respond to Jesus' call as we deepen our bond with Christ through worship, become a community where all are accepted, and work together as laity and clergy to do God's work in the world.

St. John's was organized in 1815 to serve as a parish church for Episcopalians residing in the neighborhoods in the west end of the District of Columbia. Its cornerstone was laid on September 14, 1815, and it was consecrated on December 27, 1816. Beginning with James Madison, every person who has held the office of President of the United States has attended a service at the church. Several Presidents have been communicants. Thus, St. John's is often referred to as the "Church of the Presidents." Pew 54 is the President's Pew. The architect of the church was Benjamin Henry Latrobe, who assisted in the rebuilding of the U.S. Capitol and the White House after the War of 1812. Twenty-five of the stained glass windows in St. John's were designed and executed by artisans of the noted Lorin firm of Chartres, France.
