THE HOUSING SYSTEM IS UNFAIR, UNFIT & UNAFFORDABLE

Here are our findings

17% of people in the West Midlands are worried about finding a suitable home in the future.

12% have had to compromise their safety, security or comfort to find a home they can afford.

13% can't keep their homes warm during winter. They have to put up with freezing conditions for months on end.

13% are living with toxic mould, damp or condensation – which could seriously affect their breathing.

1 in 20 people are often denied a safe home because of their race, sexuality or disability.

We can end this.

Up and down the West Midlands, in our communities and across all political divides, we can work together to build more social housing, make renting fairer for everyone – and put this right. So let's fight for home. Together.
