Coastal beach cleans are a part of our programme to help our rangatahi have an understanding of where and what types of things, discarded by humans have made their way through the marine eco-system to end up on a beach. We collect and remove the rubbish, but the most important part of this activity is the learning and recognition of our human impact on the marine environment.

OUR ENDURING SUCCESS IS BECAUSE OF OUR PEOPLE

Whilst our wonderfully qualified and inspirational permanent staff, both afloat and ashore, ably led by CEO Bruce Pilbrow, are the backbone of the "Spirit" organisation, our volunteers remain the life blood. We are so reliant on our volunteer network and indeed fortunate to have such loyal and dedicated people from throughout the country serving in differing roles from crew to financial partners, from port contacts to board members, from refit supporters to secondary schools.

As we emerge from the "Covid" years it is appropriate to reflect on the effect to the "Spirit" overall. Through sound management and much support, both inside and outside of Auckland, the hatches were battened down for only a handful of voyages which were cancelled or recalled early. We were fortunate that, for the 2021 lockdown, the ship was outside the lockdown territory and could remain sailing with valuable assistance from Opua to the Port of Tauranga. Meanwhile the office team worked tirelessly rescheduling the ship, the crew and the trainees. Whilst the finances took a knock, our rainy-day reserves and some loyal supporters, along with government subsidies, carried us through.

Board meetings have been maintained either in person, virtually or by interim CEO reporting and updates. Chris Jewell joined the Trust Board in February this year, well qualified having been a past trainee, parent of a recent trainee and CFO of Lodestone Energy, a business leading the way in New Zealand solar technology. We also record the passing of Gill Hubble, past Trustee, Educationalist.

On behalf of the wider "Spirit" family, I congratulate the Awardees who have gone 'on and beyond', Nic Charrington and Simon Graves for winning the Top Gallant Award and Phoebe Whittam for winning the Top Sail Award. This year has seen a raft of extremely worthy nominees which has made the choices very special.



We are so reliant on our volunteer network and indeed fortunate to have such dedicated people. As we move toward commemorating, next year, 50 years of delivering personal development opportunities at sea for the youth of the country, the board and senior management are considering our strategic direction which will set the modus operandi for the foreseeable future. The hub and focus will be centered on "the Trainee", their voyage to, on and beyond the programme and the Trusts delivery.

I am personally delighted that education around a pathway to better understanding the environment and the necessity for conservation is becoming an integral part of the Youth Development programme aboard.

We can all be proud to be part of the "Spirit" legacy encapsulated here by the words of recent Trainees:

"I've gained a lot of life lessons, including the need to constantly believe in myself. I have been able to develop my confidence and interact socially more with others."

SAILING ON DESPITE A CHALLENGING YEAR

I think it is appropriate to start this with "what a year". We are not the only organisation saying this. It has been a year of challenges, changes, continuous pivots, thinking outside the box and constantly trying to be ahead of Covid. Did we succeed? In effect yes.

One key move we did during the long lockdown later in 2021 was move the Spirit of New Zealand to Tauranga. The Port of Tauranga made this possible by hosting us for three months at no charge. This generosity led us to continue the life changing work we do with rangatahi, empowering them to reach their full potential through the challenge of the sea. We love what we do and next year as we hit 50 years and over 82,000 rangatahi being positively impacted by the spirit, the heritage, story, change and social return has been astounding. To us it feels like every person you bump into has a spirit story to share.

In July I was lucky to do my second 10-day voyage. This was with another of our wonderfully talented crews and volunteers. Rugging up to take on the elements was a highlight for me, but like the trainees, I found 6.30am winter swims were a true test! What this voyage and many other voyages remind me of is how honored I am to lead and be part of an incredible team of dedicated crew, both shore and sea, and the many hundreds of volunteers who give their time to serve. Our volunteer hours for 2021/22 is 20,656 hours which equates to \$464,775!

Throughout covid looking after our people has been paramount. Keeping them safe, working and supported has been a leadership focus. The team's ability to shift their thinking and adapt has been a real testimony to their resilience. One key attribute we work with our trainees on is resilience. When the team lead with this it positively influences our trainees.



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It is important to acknowledge our partners in particular the Ministry of Youth Development, our corporate partners Hyundai New Zealand and their incredible Pinnacle Programme, JED's coffee for backing us and keeping the caffeine flowing, PwC for our annual audit and Russell McVeagh for their legal support. There are many other community organisations to thank who are highlighted later in this report all of whom continue to support the work we do – we are very thankful.

With the responsibilities of running a youth development organisation, the complexity of our health and safety and the financial rigor that is required in the not-for-profit sector our success has been made possible with the quality governance we have. The guidance, input and dedication of our board has been so appreciated.

So where to from the year we have had? There is so much to do especially helping our rangatahi move forward with confidence, selfworth, and hope as we leave the last two years behind us. We are reminded every day that the work we do is needed more than ever.

CAREFUL FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT THE KEY TO SURVIVAL



As per the 2020/21 year you can clearly see the income being impacted. We lost over \$600k in income due to the impact of Covid. Thankfully the financial impact has been limited due to the Government wage subsidy and care around our expenditure. The (\$229,043) impact does include a non-cash component of \$175k in depreciation.

We were pleased to get through the longest lockdown by still sailing out of Tauranga and even though the ship was not full, the experiences were still rich. Through this period our focus on our people was at the forefront and due to careful planning, no one had their remuneration negatively impacted.



As we move into the 2022/23 year our focus is to rebuild and continue towards operational sustainability. Like many it will take a couple of years to get back to where we were prior to Covid.

Our dream for 2022 and beyond is that we continue to drop the barriers to entry and offer more scholarships to rangatahi to experience our life changing work. Our KPI is bold with the commitment to support more than 30% of our prospective trainees in the 2022/23 year with some form of scholarship. Post-Covid and with the increase to the of cost of living, more young people and families need our support. With the help of MYD, businesses and community organisations, corporate sponsors, trusts and individuals we believe we can do this.

I would like to acknowledge the team at PwC, namely Troy Florence, Clara Loo, Fei Lan, Kalvin Yap and Darci Finnigan for their always professional and robust audit process.
