PART 4 MOUNTAIN BIKE

Rules amendments applying on **01.01.2026**

Chapter I GENERAL RULES

§ 2 Age categories and participation

Cross-country Olympic – XCO

- 4.1.004** Except in the UCI World Championships, Continental Championships, **UCI Mountain Bike Continental Series** and, at the discretion of national federations, National Championships, under 23 men and women can ride the events for elite men and women respectively, even if a separate event is being run for under 23 riders.

Separate under 23 XCO UCI World Cup events are organised for men and women. The first 5 men under 23 and the first 5 women under 23 of the last UCI XCO individual ranking of the preceding year can decide whether they want to race the entire UCI World Cup season as elite or under 23. All other under 23 riders must race the UCI World Cup season in the under 23 category. **Riders benefitting from the injury status should decide whether they want to race the entire UCI World Cup season as elite or under 23 if they were amongst the top 5 men under 23 or top 5 women under 23 of the last UCI XCO individual ranking before injury.**

Separate under 23 XCO hors class and class 1 events may be organized for men and women, in this case separate results must be submitted for both categories. **A rider can only race in one category in the same competition.** During class 2 and class 3 XCO events under 23, men and women, will compete with the elite categories. As such no separate results must be submitted for the under 23 categories at class 2 and class 3 XCO events.

Cross-country marathon – XCM

- 4.1.005** Cross-country marathon events are open to all riders aged 19 or over and include masters categories. No separate results must be submitted for the under 23 category.

Masters categories shall be listed in a separate results.

Cross-country short track – XCC

Cross-country short circuit events are open to all riders aged 19 or over.

At the UCI World Championships, ~~(as from 2024) and~~ UCI World Cup **and Continental Championships**, separate under 23 events are organized for men and women.

For other events no separate results must be submitted for the under 23 or elite categories.

Cross-country eliminator – XCE

Cross-country eliminator events are open to all riders aged 17 or over. No separate results must be submitted for the junior, under 23 or elite categories.

Downhill – DH

4.1.006 Except for the UCI World Championships, UCI World Cup and **UCI Mountain Bike Continental Series**, downhill events are open to all riders aged 17 or over.

At the UCI World Championships, at the UCI World Cup and at the **UCI Mountain Bike Continental Series**, separate junior events must be organized for men and women (aged 17 and 18). **Separate results must be sent to the UCI.**

At the Continental Championships and at the National Championships, separate junior events may be organised for men and women (aged 17 and 18). In this case also, separate results must be sent to the UCI.

For all other downhill events on the international calendar, the UCI points are awarded in relation to the riders' time and not to their category. To ensure that this rule is correctly applied, only one combined result needs to be sent to the UCI.

~~*Comment: When a junior downhill rider would score the best time at the National Championships, (s)he must wear the elite jersey. The junior jersey is not awarded in this case.*~~

§ 3 Calendar

4.1.011 International mountain bike races are registered on the UCI international calendar in accordance with the following classification:

A. Olympic Games (OG) :

- No other international mountain bike event of cross-country (XC) may be organised during the mountain bike competition of the Olympic Games.

B. UCI World Championships (CM):

- No other international mountain bike event of the same format may be organised during the UCI World Championships.

C. UCI World Cup (CDM):

- No hors class, **UCI Mountain Bike Continental Series** or Class 1 event of the same format may be organised on the same continent on the same day as a UCI World Cup event.
- The Continental Championships (CC) and National Championships (CN) in a format may not be organised during a UCI World Cup event in the same format.

D. UCI Masters World Championships (CMM):

E. Continental Championships (CC):

- No hors class, **UCI Mountain Bike Continental Series** or Class 1 event of the same format may be organised on the same continent on the same day as a Continental Championships.
- F. **UCI Mountain Bike Continental Series (CS):**
- Upon consultation with the respective Continental Confederation, the UCI will appoint a certain number of events to be part of each **UCI Mountain Bike Continental Series** in accordance with the dedicated document published by the UCI.
 - **The competition name must be UCI Mountain Bike Continental Series followed by the event name.**
 - **No UCI Mountain Bike Continental Series may be organised during the UCI Mountain Bike World Championships, the UCI Mountain Bike World Cup or the Continental Championships of the same format on the same continent.**
- G. Stage races:
- Class: Hors Class (SHC) / Class 1 (S1) / Class 2 (S2);
 - No stage race Hors Class may be organised during the mountain bike competition of the Olympic Games, or the UCI World Championships cross-country (XC) or marathon, ~~UCI World Cup events~~ in the concerned continent.
 - No stage race, in HC or C1, may be organised during the Continental Championships **of the same format** on the same day(s) ~~as any cross-country (XC) race~~, on the concerned continent.
- H. One day races:
- Class: Hors Class (HC) / Class 1 (C1) / Class 2 (C2) / Class 3 (C3)
- I. UCI XCO junior series:
- The UCI will appoint a certain number of UCI XCO junior series events every year in accordance with the dedicated document published by the UCI.
- J. National Championships:
- National Championships cannot be run during the mountain bike competition at the Olympic Games, UCI World Championships or UCI World Cup of the same format and cannot be run during Continental Championships of the same format on the concerned continent.
 - Cross-country Olympic (XCO) or cross-country short track (XCC) National Championships cannot be run during an international mountain bike race. For all other formats, in the event a national championship is incorporated in an international mountain bike race, a rider can only receive points once. The riders with the sporting nationality of the national federation will receive the National Championships points according to their rank in the race (i.e. including all riders regardless of their sporting nationality) and other riders will receive the class event points according to their rank in the race.
- K. Regional Games (JR).

The events status for stage races and one-day races are allocated to each event annually by the UCI on the basis of the commissaires race report from the preceding year and any other information at disposal of the UCI. A new event may only be given class 2 or 3 status in its first year.

HC status can only be given with the following cumulative conditions:

- event registered for at least the last three years as C1 on the UCI International Calendar;
- a separate under 23 race registered for both genders for XCO;
- at least eight riders from the top 50 of the UCI ranking for both gender;
- at least ten nations represented in the last edition of the event;
- a high level tv production for the Elite categories taking into account the sporting aspect.

Under exceptional circumstances and justified reasons related to development, the UCI can grant derogations awarding HC status to events which do not meet the criteria above.

A detailed technical guide ~~for HC events, stage races and new events~~ must be presented to UCI during the calendar registration process. A template for such technical guide is provided by UCI upon request. All events registered on the UCI international calendar must respect the UCI financial obligations (in particular calendar fee, prize money) approved by the UCI and published on the UCI website.

Race entry fees, ~~including uplift facilities for downhill and enduro~~, for events on the international calendar are waived for any rider belonging to a UCI MTB WORLD SERIES TEAM. This applies only to the format in which the team has UCI MTB WORLD SERIES TEAM status and does not apply to stage races, eliminator and enduro events.

§ 6 Event procedure

- 4.1.036** The riders ~~must undertake to~~ respect nature ~~and the environment throughout the course~~ and ~~must make sure that they do not~~ pollute the ~~course venue site~~. If a ~~littering drop~~ zone is implemented on the course, riders must use it and must abide by any instructions given in this respect.

§ 10 UCI International Elite Number System

- 4.1.049** Riders who have won an Elite UCI World Cup race (XCO, DHI, ~~EDR~~) will be asked to select a unique career number (2-999) ~~for the UCI Mountain Bike World Cup (XCO, DHI, EDR)~~.

Upon retirement being confirmed to the UCI or communicated publicly, a rider's unique career number will be made available for allocation to other riders.

Elite riders will be asked to select their number in descending order starting with the rider who currently has the highest number of UCI World Cup wins.

For the UCI World Cup, the current UCI World Cup leader will race with number 1, superseding his unique career number.

Chapter II CROSS-COUNTRY EVENTS

§ 1 Race characteristics

Cross-country eliminator – XCE

4.2.010 Course

The course for a cross-country eliminator race must be between 500m and ~~1000~~ 1200m and include natural and/or artificial obstacles, in conformity with article 4.2.009. The whole course must be 100% rideable, single track sections normally are avoided and where possible the course normally has not more than one 180° turn. The start and finish area must be separated in order to allow short race program.

Obstacles such as trees, stairs (up/down), drops, bridges or wooden constructions can create a dynamic short race.

The course must be marked according to articles 4.2.020 to 4.2.029. The start/finish zones must be respected as per articles 4.2.030 to 4.2.034

Apart from XCE UCI World Championships and XCE UCI World Cup, all other XCE events will be considered as Class 3 events.

§ 5 Feed/Technical Assistance zone

4.2.036 Each feed/technical assistance zone must be located on flat or uphill sections which are slow and wide enough for the purpose. The zones must be long enough and reasonably evenly spaced around the course. Double feed/technical assistance zones are recommended.

For cross-country short track (XCC) events, a feed/technical assistance zone is not allowed.

For Olympic format cross-country events (XCO) at least 1 single feed/technical assistance zone shall be set up. For marathon format cross-country events (XCM) at least 3 feed/technical assistance zones shall be set up. Organisers must anticipate on the team staff access possibilities during cross-country marathon events.

For the cross-country team relay event during the UCI World Championships and, if applicable, during the Continental Championships, a feed/technical assistance zone can be set up for technical support only, at the discretion of the president of the commissaires' panel. For the sake of clarity, feeding from the feed/technical zone is not permitted for the cross-country team relay events.

4.2.038 The feed/technical assistance zones must be wide and long enough to allow the passing of riders not stopping in the zone.

In case a pit lane is implemented, the riders are not allowed to use it to gain advantage in the race. Should the riders take the pit lane for no valid reason, the commissaires may disqualify them.

For UCI World Cup events they must furthermore include the following ~~four~~ two areas:

- one part for UCI MTB WORLD SERIES TEAMS;
- one part for all other groups respecting the order, UCI MTB Teams, National Federations, all others;
- ~~one part for UCI MTB TEAMS;~~
- ~~one area for national teams;~~
- ~~another area for individual riders or members of teams not registered with the UCI (who are treated as individual riders).~~

Staff working for riders must wear readily identifiable team clothing.

- 4.2.040** For the Olympic Games, UCI World Championships, UCI World Cup events and Continental Championships nobody may enter a feed/technical assistance zone without accreditation. This rule does not apply for the marathon UCI World Championships.

For the Olympic Games, UCI World Championships and Continental Championships, accreditations are issued by the commissaires' panel.

For UCI World Cup events season long accreditations are issued to the UCI MTB WORLD SERIES TEAMS ~~and UCI MTB TEAMS~~ by the UCI. For the national federations or individual riders passes are prepared by the organiser and handed out at registration: they obtain 1 accreditation per registered rider per zone. Note that for a double feed/technical assistance zone they only obtain 1 accreditation per registered rider.

- 4.2.042** The spraying of water on riders or bicycles by the feeders or mechanics is forbidden.

High pressure washers are forbidden in the feed/technical assistance zone.

§ 7 Safety

- 4.2.059** The organiser must provide for cross-country marathon events a motorcycle to mark the front of the race ("lead bike"), and a motorcycle to mark the rear of the race ("sweep bike"). ~~For Olympic format events, only a lead bike must be provided and display on its front the number of laps remaining in the race.~~

Chapter III DOWNHILL EVENTS

§ 2 Course

4.3.006 The length of the course and the duration of the event are determined as follows:

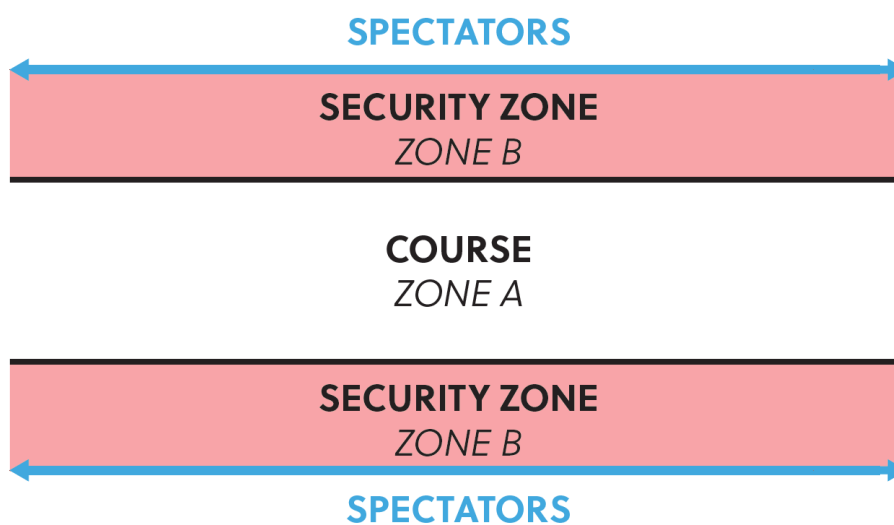

4.3.007 The entire downhill course must be marked and protected with safe and visible course markers that present no safety risks to riders.

In very fast and dangerous sections, where the riders line is close to the course boundary, B zones must be installed as per diagram:



B zones must be cleaned to avoid any hidden obstacles and to be safe.

No equipment outside the official Host Broadcaster or Timing Company's equipment can be installed in the B zones by anybody.

§ 4 Marshals

4.3.019 Riders observing a waving red flag during the race must stop immediately.

A stopped rider must continue calmly to the finish and request a re-start from the finish line commissaire and wait for further instruction.

The re-run should take place before the end of the stopped rider's category, when possible.

§ 6 Training

4.3.021 The following training sessions must be organised:

- an on-foot inspection of the course must be organised before the first training session. No bikes are allowed on the course during the on foot downhill course inspection. The on-foot inspection is reserved exclusively for riders, the team managers and the coaches who must hold a valid license. Other team staff are not allowed to attend the on-foot inspection.
- a training session, the day before competition.
- a training session on the morning of the race day.

No training is permitted whilst a race is in progress.

Chapter V ENDURO EVENTS

(chapter reviewed on 01.01.26)

§ 1 Race characteristics

4.5.001 The race includes several liaison stages and timed stages.

The times achieved in all timed stage will be accumulated to a total time.

An enduro course comprises varied off-road terrain. The track should include a mixture of narrow and wide, slow and fast paths and tracks over a mixture of off-road surfaces. Each timed stage must be predominantly descending but small pedalling or uphill sections are acceptable. Stages must focus on testing the rider's technical skills.

Liaison stages can include either mechanical uplift (e.g. chairlift), pedal powered climbs or a mixture of both. The emphasis of the track must be on rider enjoyment, technical and physical ability.

Any other system may be acceptable only under exceptional circumstances and subject to prior authorisation from the UCI.

§ 2 Technical assistance

- 4.5.002** A technical assistance zone can be provided by the organizer.
Riders are allowed to collect and drop equipment or food in the technical assistance zone.

Outside technical assistance is only allowed in this area.

Riders may access technical assistance whenever the official course route passes through the technical assistance zone.

Riders seeking to leave the official course to return to the technical assistance zone for assistance must first seek approval from the race officials. This will incur a 3-minute penalty.

Riders must then return to the racecourse at the point where they left.

- 4.5.003** Only one frame, one front fork and one pair of wheels can be used by a competitor during a competition. Frame, fork and wheels will be individually marked by the officials before the start of the race and checked at the finish. Broken parts ~~can eventually may be replaced upon approval with a 5 min penalty if approved by race official~~ may be replaced after first seeking approval from the PCP or race director with the application of a 3-minute penalty if approved by race official.

§ 3 Equipment

- 4.5.004** Riders must wear a full-face helmet at all times during competition. This includes during both Liaison and Special Stages. If a rider dismounts and pushes their bike on a Liaison, they may remove the helmet. Whilst riding, the helmet must always be worn correctly with straps fastened. ~~In very technical terrain or on courses that feature steep mountainsides or very high-speed trails, the organiser can specify in his particular rules that competitors must wear a full-face helmet (either fixed or detachable).~~

In addition to the above, the UCI strongly recommends that riders wear the protections as indicated in art. 4.3.013.

Furthermore, it is strongly recommended that all riders carry:

- suitable backpack;
- waterproof jacket;
- emergency blanket;
- tube / puncture repair kit;
- multi tool;
- basic, well maintained first aid kit;
- course map;
- food and fluids;
- eye protection (glasses or goggles);
- emergency contacts supplied by the organiser;
- whistle.

Only one frame, fork and one set of wheels can be used by a rider during a race. A rider may use different/unmarked equipment during Official Training.

Equipment Marking Stickers must be applied on the rider's right-hand side of the bike.

- fork crown;
- swingarm / rear triangle;
- front triangle;
- both wheel rims.

§ 5 Course marking

4.5.006 The entire enduro courses must be marked and protected with safe and visible course markers that present no safety risks to riders.

Course markers installed on opposite sides of the course will create a gate, which riders must pass between. Gates can be used to clearly mark sections of the course that a rider must pass through. Missing a gate will be deemed as course cutting.

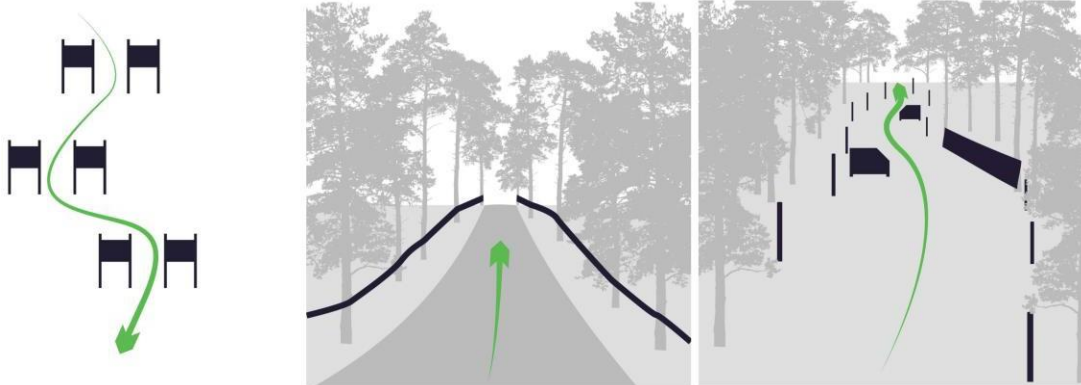
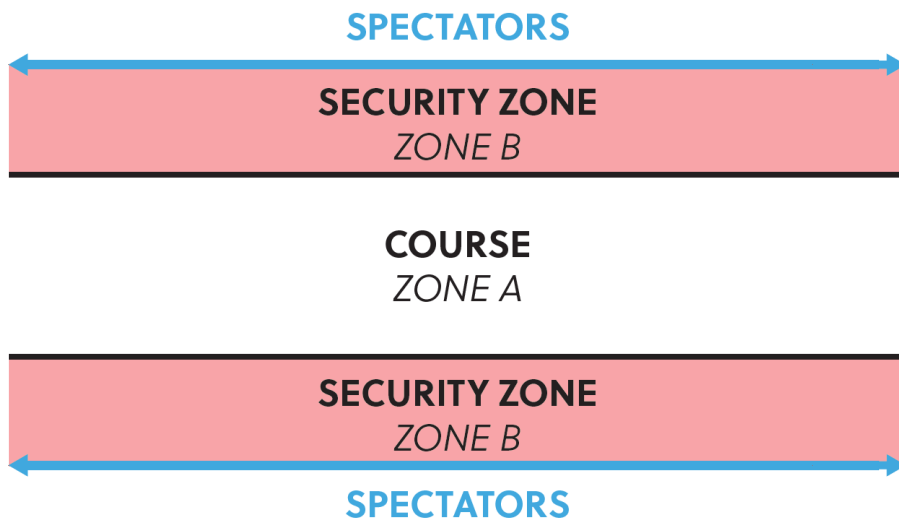


Figure 1: Examples of installed gates,

In very fast and dangerous sections, where the riders' line is close to the course boundary, B zones must be installed as per diagram:

- 4.5.007** Extra care must be taken by the organiser to make sure that the course is clearly marked and no shortcuts are possible.

Taking shortcuts on course to gain an advantage can damage both the environment and bring the sport of enduro mountain bike racing into disrepute. Where no defined trail exists, the organiser should mark the course to keep the riders on the intended racecourse. If a clear and defined trail exists, the organiser may choose to create gates. In this instance riders must ride the existing defined trail between gates and not look to leave the trail to take a short cut and gain an unfair advantage.

Therefore, any rider trying to save time by intentionally choosing a line that lies outside of the marked, defined racecourse will be disqualified (DSQ).

Any rider found damaging the course or altering a Special Stage without the UCI approval will be subject to a penalty including DSQ.

- 4.5.009** Road crossing and dangerous area must be marked on both sides.

All wooden features (e.g. wall-rides or large bridges), especially those that are situated in compressions, turns or braking zones, should be covered adequately with an anti-slip surface material (e.g. Wire mesh & or anti slip paint).

§ 6 Organisation of competition

- 4.5.010** Official training must be scheduled by the organiser on all Special Stages before timed competition begins. Training on all Special Stages is strongly recommended but not mandatory.

Following the official course release, all Special Stages are closed to riders until official training commences.

Any rider found riding on a Special Stage outside of official training will be subject to penalty.

Only competing riders with a number plate issued for that specific race attached to their bike will be allowed on course during official training. In addition, officials, team staff and media will also be allowed access providing they display the relevant officially issued plates.

A maximum of one training run is allowed per Special Stage.

Unless otherwise agreed, official training should not take place more than two days prior to the start of the race.

During official training times, riders must only access a Special Stage from the start and are not permitted to push up within the course or create congestion.

Any rider found to be riding upwards against the direction of travel will be penalised. Riders may push up outside of the course marking.

4.5.011 The organiser must provide the start times for each timed stage.

(text modified on 01.01.26)

4.5.012 Each rider takes an individual start, the start interval between the riders must be of 10 seconds at least.

Riders must present themselves at the start line in time for their preassigned stage start time.

All Special Stages will have a check-in point close to, but before the Special Stage start line. Riders must pass through this check-in point to record a check-in time. The check-in time may be used by Race Control to provide additional evidence of a rider's arrival time at a Special Stage start in case of any delay or dispute around stage start time.

All late riders must start only under instructions from the official starter, who will determine a suitable gap in the start order. No fixed start interval will be applied between late starters as the goal is to keep late riders in the competition, without affecting other riders.

In cases where the late starter is delayed further due to insufficient gaps in the start order, penalties will be calculated based on a rider's check-in time. If a rider fails to check-in, the penalty will be based on their Special Stage start time.

Late starters will receive a fixed penalty:

- up to 5 minutes late = 1-minute penalty;
- 5+ minutes late = 5-minute penalty;
- 30+ minutes late = DNF.

Any rider arriving at the start of a Special Stage later than 30 minutes after their specified start time will be assigned a DNF for the race and will not be allowed to continue.

Start Penalties

Riders must start from a stationary position with their front wheel on the start line. Run up starts are not permitted.

Any rider starting before the starter's orders may be subject to a penalty. Other Start Violations (example: pushing into queue, delaying start, jumping start etc.) may also be subject to penalty.

Delays

Any delay applied to Special Stage start times must be maintained throughout that day of racing. Commissaires must not attempt to catch up on delays while racing is underway.

Example. If there is a 10-minute course hold on Special Stage 1, 10 minutes must be added to the start times of all remaining Special Stages, for all riders effected by the hold, for the remainder of the race.

Disrupted race stage.

In the event of a rider being delayed on a Special Stage due to assisting another rider in a medical emergency or due to some other circumstance outside of their control, such as a race hold on that Special Stage, **and only** if Race Control decide it is appropriate, a rider may be offered a re-run on that Special Stage.

If Race Control deem that a re-run of the Special Stage in question is not possible then at the end of the race the rider will be allocated an "average" Special Stage position and time. This will be calculated as follows:

Race control will take the rider's actual finishing position across all Special Stages completed, minus his worst stage result and using this calculate their average stage finishing position. This average Special Stage position will then be awarded for the incomplete stage.

- 4.5.013** A minimum of 3 and a maximum of 10 timed stages must be raced over one or two days. The total time for each rider shall correspond to a minimum of 10 minutes.

- 4.5.014** A minimum of 2 different courses for the timed stages must be used. Under unforeseen and exceptional circumstances (e.g. weather), the UCI commissaire may, after consulting the organiser, cancel a stage or remove it from the general classification.

- 4.5.015** There are no restrictions on the nature of liaison stages. Uplift of riders can be either by mechanical means (chairlift, truck etc) or by pedalling or a mixture of both.

- 4.5.016** Adequate training must be provided by the organiser for all timed stages.

(text modified on 01.01.26)

- 4.5.017** The transport of riders between Special Stages by private/team transport (shuttling) is strictly limited to official training and may be used only when an official rider shuttle provided by the organiser operates on the same route. Any rider found using a private or team vehicle at any other time or on any other route may be subject to penalties.

Any venue specific details or restrictions on shuttling will be outlined in the Race Book and the official training schedule.

During the race, no private/team transport can be used at any time.

§ 7 Results

4.5.018 The events General Classification will be calculated by adding all Special Stage times together for each rider.

In the event of a tie in the General Classification, the highest placed rider on the final Special Stage will be awarded the higher final placing.

A rider not finishing a Special Stage will not be allowed to rejoin the race at any time.

§ 6 Infringements

4.5.019 A rider must act in a sporting manner at all times and must permit any faster rider to overtake without obstructing.

4.5.020 The president of the commissaries' panel can consider a rule violation that has not been witnessed by a race official if it has been reported by at least two riders who are part of two different teams (e.g. rider getting assistance outside technical assistance zone, rider cutting course)

§ 9 Marshals

4.5.021 For marshals, refer to the articles 4.1.017 to 4.1.021.

A small number of special trained marshals or commissaires should move around the course during competition to undisclosed points. Quad bike can be used to check rules infringements.

§ 10 Medical service

4.5.022 For first aid (minimum requirements), refer to the articles 4.2.052 to 4.2.059. The organizer must set up an adequate medical service. The organizer must supply each competitor with emergency contact details.

Chapter VII SNOW BIKE

Clothing and protective accessories

- 4.7.004** The protective accessories are **recommended mandatory** to all competitors according to articles 4.3.012 and 4.3.013.

Chapter X UCI MOUNTAIN BIKE CROSS-COUNTRY WORLD CUP

Participation

- 4.10.001** UCI Cross-country World Cup events (XCO and XCC) are open to riders meeting the following categories and criteria:

- UCI 4X individual ranking.

A UCI gravity team ranking is calculated using by adding the point of the 4 highest scored points of each team without making a distinction between men elite, men junior, women elite and women junior. Only the results of the finals are taken into account.

A UCI enduro team ranking is calculated by adding the point of the 4 highest scored points of each team without making a distinction between men elite, men junior, women elite and women junior.

Tied teams have their relative positions determined by the place of their best rider on the individual ranking.

 - minimum 3 riders, maximum 10 riders for downhill or enduro (gravity);
 - minimum 3 riders, maximum 10 riders for mixed teams.

They are employed and/or sponsored by the same entity, for the purpose to take part in mountain bike events on the International UCI calendar.

Development Team

A UCI MTB WORLD SERIES TEAM can link with a UCI MTB Team, to be defined as their “development team” and shall report such information to the UCI. The UCI may

require the production of documents to verify the nature of such link. UCI MTB WORLD SERIES TEAMS can select one rider **per UCI World Cup event** from their development team to compete ~~at a UCI World Cup~~, within the maximum of 4 riders per race per category.

Guest rider

In addition, a UCI MTB WORLD SERIES TEAM will have the opportunity to request to the UCI for 1 rider to be able to race at two UCI World Cup events within the season in either Elite, Junior or under 23 categories, **within the maximum of 4 riders per race per category**. This can be done outside the transfer period.
