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Understanding the natural variation in Rift Cut White Oak

Rift Cut White Oak is designed to look different from traditional stains. More color variation, contrast, and movement in the wood are expected and part of the intended look.

Variations in tone, depth, and stain absorption are natural characteristics of the finish and are not manufacturing defects.





Flecking

White Oak naturally contains flecks within the wood grain. Flecking is when lighter streaks, specks, or ribbon-like markings become visible in the wood, creating natural contrast and movement. The amount and appearance of flecking will vary from piece to piece, giving each kitchen a unique look.

At Fabuwood, every finish is developed to meet our standards for quality, consistency, and craftsmanship while preserving the authentic beauty of real wood.

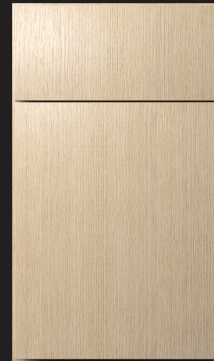
White Oak was intentionally designed to embrace bold tonal movement, pronounced grain character, and natural depth variation. Compared to many other stains and wood finishes, White Oak will display stronger visible variation throughout the product, making each kitchen uniquely distinctive.



Because natural wood absorbs stain differently across grain patterns, components, and lighting conditions, noticeable contrast and variation are expected characteristics of the finish and are not considered manufacturing defects.

Understanding the difference between natural wood variation and true finish defects helps ensure customers receive both a beautiful product and a consistent Fabuwood experience.
