In the "The World Needs: Art Activism" video, our global peers shared about murals from their country or region that raised awareness about social issues important to them. These murals were a form of **artivism**.

The term "artivism" was introduced in the 1960s as a way of describing demonstrations in the United States against the Vietnam War. However, in every successful social movement, there have always been artists, especially from marginalized communities, who have combined art and activism to create a new vision for society.

Artivists use a variety of art mediums to raise social, environmental, political, or technological awareness. Artivism is different from **propaganda** because, instead of telling the recipient what to think and feel, artivism inspires the recipient to **think critically** and deepen their **empathy**.

Murals are an effective form of artivism because they can be used to raise awareness about global or national issues or to raise awareness about issues specific to local communities and neighborhoods. They are powerful because their size and color attract large audiences and then ask them to reflect on the social issue presented.
