Biases get in the way of people relating to each other authentically.


The Ladder of Inference tool helps us see how we move from the information that seems important to us when we encounter someone new all the way up to the actions we take.

Like Ezgi and Antonella with the dog, the information we pay attention to is driven by **beliefs** we already have about whole groups of people. If we can acknowledge the beliefs we have and where they came from, we can learn to become aware of how our biases shape what we pay attention to and recognize bias in ourselves and others. Then we can go looking for additional information that may challenge our beliefs and reduce our biases.

Biases show up in all aspects of society. Whether they are being carried out by an individual, an organization or business, or by an entire government, biases impact the way a society is structured. Often, these biases have implications for whether or not an individual or group of people can benefit from all that society has to offer.

Below are four (4) models of how societies can be structured. **Give an example, either from history or the present, that represents each model.**
