Depending on your lifestyle and budget, you will be able to find the right place to suit you. It all starts with knowing the options...



Shared Rooms

Price range: AUD\$150 - \$250 per week

Shared accommodation in Adelaide, Australia, offers an affordable option for students, professionals, and travellers. It typically involves renting a room in a shared house or flat with communal facilities.

Single Rooms

Price range: AUD\$200 - \$400 per week

Single-room accommodation in Adelaide offers private living space, ideal for those seeking independence. Options range from studios to private rooms in shared houses, with costs depending on location and amenities.

Studios

Price range: AUD\$300 - \$450 per week

Studio apartments in Adelaide provide selfcontained living with combined bedroom, kitchen, and living spaces. They offer privacy and convenience, ideal for individuals or couples.





Living On Campus

Price range: AUD\$200 - \$450 per week

Living on a university campus in Adelaide offers convenient, community-focused accommodation close to classes and facilities, ideal for students seeking a vibrant and supportive environment.

Private Rentals

Shared houses/apartments Price range: AUD\$200 - \$450 per week

One-bedroom apartments Price range: AUD\$300 - \$500 per week

Two-bedroom apartments Price range: AUD\$500 - \$700 per week

Homestays

Price range: AUD\$250 - \$400 per week

In a homestay arrangement, you'll live with an Australian family in their home. Utilities and internet are covered by the host family. In certain arrangements, meals are also covered. Those craving a genuine Australian experience will love this option, as it allows you to live with locals. You'll also enjoy the extra support you receive from your host family.

That said, there is no guarantee that your homestay will be close to your education provider, so you may have to manage a long commute. Have a look at public transport options to see what your journey to campus will be like.

Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)

Why do I need Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)? It helps cover you for medical expenses whilst you're studying in Australia, including:





GP/Doctor or Specialist visits (e.g X-rays and blood tests)



visits Emergency ambulance ests) services



Hospital visits



Some of the cost of prescription medicines

If you have a medical emergency

If you have a life-threatening medical emergency, go to your nearest public hospital emergency department or call 000 (Emergency Services) immediately for help. All public hospitals have a

24-hour emergency and casualty department, so you will always be able to get help.

If it's not an emergency, locate your nearest GP by visiting the official website of your OSHC provider, book an appointment with a doctor by phone or online. The doctor will treat you and determine if you need medicine or need to see a specialist. Alternatively, you can also visit your university's clinic.

1. Choose your bank

Australia offers various banks for international students to choose from









2. Choose an account

1. Everyday Account

The most common bank account type, used for day- to-day expenses.

2. Savings Account

This is where you can store money that you don't need to use straight away.







3. Opening a Bank Account

Take your passport into the bank, as well as your tax identification number from your home country (if you have one).

Often, there are discounts available for students, make sure you bring student ID and letter of enrolment when you visit the bank to access these

BPAY - Popular bill paying service allowing you to pay bills online

Getting Around

Adelaide offers a range of transportation options that make getting around the city and its suburbs convenient. The Adelaide Metro card can be used for all public transport, like buses, trams, and trains. Students can avail Adelaide Metro concession cards at discounted rates. Visit the <u>Adelaide Metro</u> <u>Metro</u> website for more information.

Here's an overview of the city-specific transportation details:

Buses

The primary public transport system in Adelaide, offering extensive bus routes throughout the city and suburbs. You can check routes, schedules, and fares on the Adelaide Metro website or app.

Free City Connector: A free bus service that operates on two loops (98A and 98C) around the central business district (CBD) and North Adelaide, making it easy to get around key areas of the city.



Glenelg Tram Line: Runs from the CBD to the beachside suburb of Glenelg. It passes through key locations such as the Adelaide Entertainment Centre, Rundle Mall, and Victoria Square. Travel within the city centre zone is free.



Adelaide Metro also operates a network of train lines connecting the CBD to the northern, southern, and eastern suburbs. Key train lines include the Gawler, Seaford, Outer Harbor, and Belair lines.

1. Barossa Valley

🚘 🚍 1.5 Hours Via Car / Bus

One of Australia's premier wine regions, the Barossa Valley is known for its worldclass wineries, gourmet food, and picturesque landscapes. Highlights: Wine tasting at renowned wineries like Penfolds and Jacob's Creek, gourmet dining, and exploring charming towns like Tanunda and Nuriootpa.

2. Kangaroo Island

🚘 1.5 Hours Via Car

A wildlife haven, Kangaroo Island is famous for its stunning beaches, diverse wildlife, and natural beauty.

Highlights: Seal Bay Conservation Park, Flinders Chase National Park, Remarkable Rocks, and Little Sahara sand dunes.





3. McLaren Vale

50 Mins Via Car

Another top wine region, McLaren Vale is known for its boutique wineries, stunning vineyards, and olive groves.

Highlights: Wine tasting at wineries like d'Arenberg and Wirra Wirra, dining at local restaurants, and exploring the Shiraz Trail.

4. Adelaide Hills

🚘 30 Mins Via Car

A scenic region just outside Adelaide, the Adelaide Hills offer rolling landscapes, charming villages, and a cooler climate.

Highlights: Visiting the German village of Hahndorf, exploring Mount Lofty Botanic Garden, Cleland Wildlife Park, and enjoying local produce and crafts.

Adelaide Fringe & Adelaide Festival

February - March

Adelaide hosts two major arts events: the Adelaide Fringe and the Adelaide Festival.

The Fringe is the largest open-access arts festival in the Southern Hemisphere, featuring diverse performances in comedy, theatre, music, and more. Simultaneously, the Adelaide Festival showcases world-class events in theatre, music, dance, literature, and visual arts, attracting international and local talent. These festivals together transform Adelaide into a vibrant hub of creativity and culture.



Tasting Australia

April - May

Tasting Australia is a culinary festival that celebrates South Australia's food and wine culture. It features masterclasses, food and wine tastings, and special dining events with top chefs. It's a must-attend event for food enthusiasts.



Adelaide 500

March

The Adelaide 500 is a major motor racing event held on the streets of Adelaide. It features the Supercars Championship and includes support races, concerts, and family-friendly activities, making it a thrilling event for motorsport enthusiasts.



OzAsia Festival

February - March

The OzAsia Festival is Australia's leading contemporary arts festival engaging with Asia. It includes theatre, dance, music, film, and visual arts from Asia and Australia. The Moon Lantern Parade and Lucky Dumpling Market are popular highlights.

- If you are a member of the family unit of a primary student visa holder, you must not work in Australia until they have started their course.
- You must not work in Australia before your course of study commences.
- Looking for a job in a new country can feel daunting, but don't hesitate to drop your resume and ask.
- The hospitality industry is a great place to start and many popular venues will welcome international students. Don't be afraid to drop your resume or ask directly at shops and restaurants.
