

How did you decide architecture was the career for you?

I delved into architecture during my A-level art studies, discovering a genuine interest through research

and work experience. My fascination with brutalist architecture ignited my interest in the field, inspiring my A-level artwork and prompting a deeper exploration of the architect's role. Understanding how the built environment impacts us captivated me, and I wanted to work on real projects.

Why did you choose the apprenticeship route?

The realisation that I preferred practical experience over a traditional academic path drew me to explore the apprenticeship route. Merging theoretical knowledge and applying practical hands-on learning opportunities aligns with my learning style, while ensuring the dual approach provides me with a comprehensive skill set, making an apprenticeship the ideal path for me.

What is a typical day like for you?

When I work in the office, I actively contribute to real-life architectural projects, encompassing tasks from drawing to model making, gaining valuable industry experience that distinguishes me from my peers.

How is your apprenticeship delivered?

My apprenticeship is delivered through London South Bank University. One day a week is dedicated to my university studies, complementing my four days of handson work. I study with full-time architecture students, concentrating on academic facets of architecture, allowing us to share insights and experiences.

How did you find your apprenticeship?

My proactive approach, coupled with a personal affinity for the industry, led me to secure my current apprenticeship. The limited availability prompted me to actively seek opportunities by carrying out my own independent research, checking websites like the government's Find an Apprenticeship platform, and reaching out directly to organisations.

Who is your inspiration?

My hardworking mother serves as my inspiration, encouraging me to strive for excellence. Ultimately, I aspire to qualify as an architect, learning firsthand from industry practitioners. My goals extend beyond architecture, focusing on my dedication to helping students discover diverse educational paths.

What advice would you give to a young person or their parents about apprenticeships?

I encourage embracing unconventional paths and exploring diverse educational options, as there's no onesize-fits-all in learning. Fearlessly consider apprenticeships. Understand that education comes in varied forms, and everyone learns uniquely. Apprenticeships offer practical experiences and a distinct learning approach that can pave the way for meaningful and fulfilling career journeys. Embrace the opportunity to learn by doing, breaking away from traditional norms, and discovering a personalised path to success.

Animal technologist		Carry out complex scientific procedures on animals in a range of organisations such as charities, universities, pharmaceutical companies, breeders, contract research organisations and biotechnology organisations. Work with a range of scientific equipment in complex environments, ensure high standards of scientific research and that the welfare of the animals is considered at all times.	Level 3		
Associate ambulance practitioner	₽Ŭ O	Respond to emergency and urgent calls and provide emergency care as part of an ambulance crew. Drive safely and progressively at high speed. Assess treat and manage service users at the scene, then refer to alternative care provisions or safely discharge on scene.			
Biomedical scientist		Carry out a range of laboratory and scientific tests in hospitals, laboratories, and research facilities, to support the diagnosis and treatment of disease. Investigate a range of medical conditions, including cancer, diabetes, blood disorders (e.g. anaemia), meningitis and hepatitis. Screen for hereditary and acquired diseases and monitor effects of medication and other treatments.			
Cleaning hygiene operative		Work independently and as part of a team in a range of workplaces where specialised cleaning techniques and skills are needed to maintain a safe and hygienic environment. Work in places where infection control and sanitisation are important for the wellbeing of service users.			
Doctor	R Pa	Apply the principles and procedures of medicine to assess, prevent, diagnose, care, and treat patients with illness, disease, and injury and to maintain physical and mental health.			
Personal Trainer		Coach and motivate clients towards their health and fitness goals through the design and provision of personalised exercise programmes and instruction, nutritional advice, and lifestyle management.			
Prosthetic and orthotic technician		Design and manufacture custom-made devices, for example artificial limbs, diabetic footwear or spinal braces. Use the specification/prescription provided to make devices that aid movement, correct deformity and relieve discomfort for adults and children.	Level 3


Celebrating women in apprenticeships

Apprenticeships in driving

Does your child want a career behind the wheel?

Large goods vehicle (LGV) driver C + E – level 2

Lorry drivers make sure everything we use at home, at work, in the health service, manufacturing, education, defence and more, reaches the people who need it. There are lots of vans and smaller, more eco-friendly vehicles in cities, but Large Goods Vehicles (LGV) (or Heavy Goods Vehicles (HGV)) are an important part of logistics. Logistics is the movement of goods from A to B and truck drivers are a vital part of this. Demand for quality drivers is greater than ever before.

Urban driver – level 2

The Urban driver apprenticeship is typically linked to job roles like Customer Delivery Driver or Delivery Driver. It involves city driving in a variety of complex driving situations, for example dealing with lots of cars, cyclists, pedestrians, buses and one-way streets. The Urban Driver Apprenticeship Standard develops the skills required to transport goods by road to an agreed destination, guality and time standard, and contribute to their organisation's contracts or services. Staff learn how to ensure a vehicle is correctly loaded, adapt their driving style, plan delivery routes, complete reports, resolve complaints, and comply with laws, regulations and procedures.

Does your child want a career behind the wheel?

Train driver – level 3

Train drivers are responsible for driving trains in a safe, punctual, economic manner over various routes in accordance with rail rules, regulations and procedures. A Train driver could work in a number of rail environments, such as high speed, passenger, freight, underground, metro, suburban, cross border, depots, sidings or maintenance sheds; moving passengers, goods, empty coaching stock or driving on-track machines to perform infrastructure maintenance work.



There are both large and small organisations providing essential transport for the millions of people who travel on buses, coaches, and trams every day. There is a wide variety of services within this sector. For example, inner city buses, country wide coach travel, private hire for holiday travel, daily school transport and tram travel on differing networks.

The Health Adjustment Passport


Support to identify what help and changes are available

The **Health Adjustment Passport** is a form that can be used if your child has a disability or health condition that makes it harder for them to move into or stay in an apprenticeship (or any work, including a job, self-employment, work experience or a supported internship).


Your child can use it to:

- support them to identify what support and changes (known as **reasonable adjustments**) they may need when they are in work or moving into work.
- apply for support from **Access to Work**. This could include funding for specialist equipment to support them to do their job, support getting to and from work or support when they are in work, such as job coaching.
- help them talk to employers about adjustments and in-work support that they may need.

There are two versions of the Health Adjustment Passport, one of which is an Easy Read document where the text is presented in an accessible and easy to understand format.


T Levels A new guide for parents and carers



If your child is looking at their post-16 options and is interested in a technical qualification, a T Level could be a fantastic choice for them.

T Levels are post-16 technical qualifications taken after GCSEs as an alternative to A-levels, apprenticeships and other post-16 options. T Levels are designed and backed by employers to give students the knowledge and skills businesses need and give them a head start in their careers. T Level courses are high quality – with longer teaching hours than most current technical qualifications. One T Level is roughly equivalent in size to 3 A-levels.

There is lots of information out there to support you to support your child, including this guide for parents and carers, produced by Amazing Apprenticeships on behalf of the Department for Education T Levels team.

Higher Technical Qualifications (HTQs)

Meet Harrison, who is currently studying a Digital HTQ

Tell us about your HTQ course and what it involves.

The HTQ I'm currently doing is a Higher National Certificate in Computing, which leads to me going on to do a Higher National Diploma in September. In the second year you specialise more and my specialism will most likely be cyber security.

Why did you choose to do your course?

I chose this course because I want a career in cyber security, and felt that an HTQ offered me the flexibility and right balance of application and theory.

What skills have you gained?

I have developed skills such as networking, creating & managing databases, and programming.

Why are HTQs a good choice?

HTQs are a great alternative to apprenticeships; if you want to work in a skill-focussed industry/role, HTQs are the perfect route to go down if you don't want to do an apprenticeship or haven't found the right one yet.

What do you hope to do next?

I hope to continue advancing in the industry, potentially working my way to a higher degree in the future.

How do you think your HTQ has prepared you for your next steps and future career?

My HTQ has provide me with a strong understanding of the industry and my options after the course, this has helped to reaffirm that my choices are the best for me.
