Do you know there are important differences between pain relievers?

For people with special health conditions, such as high blood pressure, certain non-prescription pain medications may be more suitable for use than others.

Find out which pain reliever may be most appropriate for you:

Respiratory Illness • Asthma	Speak to Your Doctor or Pharmacist. Acetaminophen may be a suitable choice for people with asthma who are at increased risk of side effects when using pain relievers. ⁶	Speak to Your Doctor or Pharmacist before using naproxen sodium if you have or have had asthma. ^{2,4} Ibuprofen should not be used if you have been diagnosed with asthma. ^{1,3}
Kidney or Liver Disease • Cirrhosis • Alcoholism	Speak to Your Doctor or Pharmacist. Taking too much acetaminophen can increase the risk of serious or potential fatal liver damage. Do not use if you drink more than 3 alcoholic beverages a day or if you have liver disease.	Speak to Your Doctor or Pharmacist. Both ibuprofen and naproxen sodium should not be used if you have serious kidney or liver disease. 12.3.4
Are 55+ Years Old	Speak to Your Doctor or Pharmacist. Acetaminophen may be a suitable option for certain people at increased risk of side effects from use of pain relievers. This includes older individuals and people taking multiple prescriptions medications. ⁶	Speak to Your Doctor or Pharmacist. Both ibuprofen and naproxen sodium are to be used differently in elderly individuals. 12.3.4
Are on Multiple Medications	Speak to Your Doctor or Pharmacist Acetaminophen may be a suitable choice for certain people taking multiple prescription or non-prescription medications. ⁶	Speak to Your Doctor or Pharmacist before using ibuprofen or naproxen if you are on multiple prescription or non-prescription medications. 12.3.4
