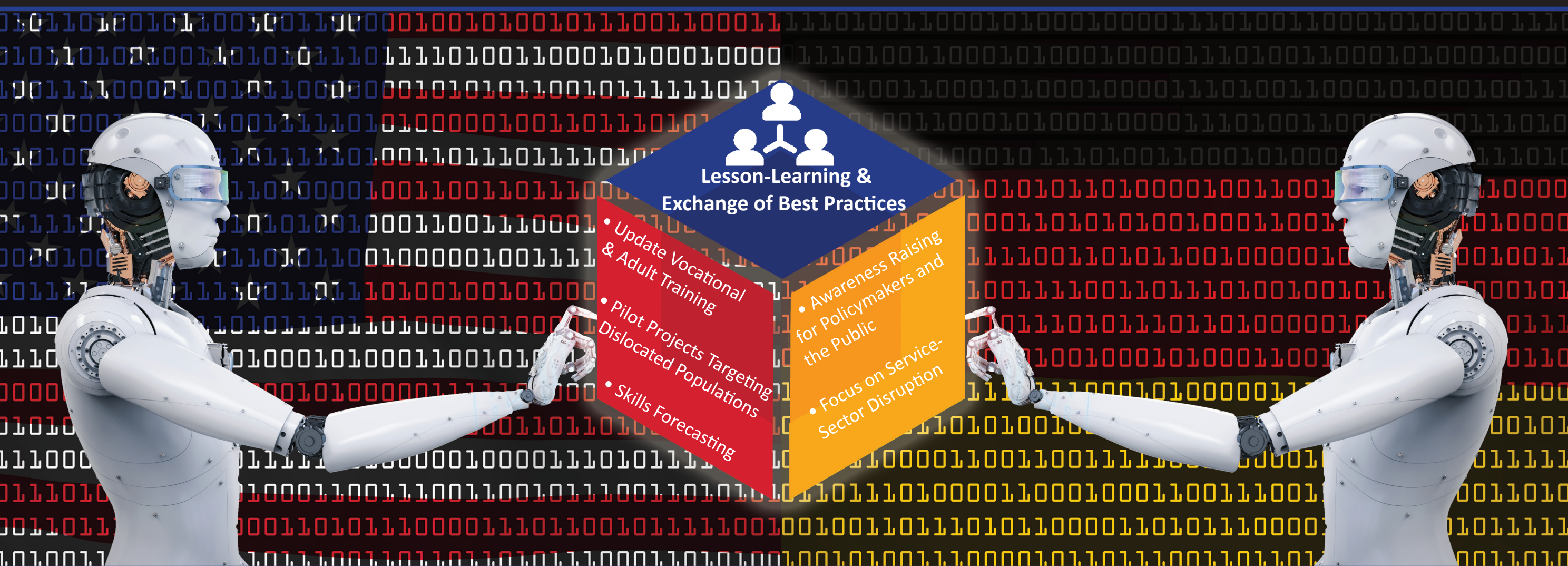


THE FUTURE OF WORK & THE TRANSATLANTIC ALLIANCE
