This performance-installation is intended to be seen from all sides and angles. We invite you to walk around it and change your vantage point.

Two Person Operating System Type 2 continues a performanceinstallation series examining the intimate relationships between people and objects. Artist Martha Friedman and choreographer Susan Marshall seek to engage viewers to think about the sensory experience of inhabiting a body, and touching or navigating inanimate and animate bodies outside their own. Working with industrial objects and materials such as rubber and metal, dancers activate sculptures in complex patterns, probing preconceptions of physical boundaries.

The evolving patterns of action and design explore the tensions between work and product, danger and intimacy, absurdity and purpose, soft and hard, in and out. This serves to complicate expectations of clear, binary contrasts often raised in gendered conversations about physical bodies.

Two Person Operating System Type 2 premiered to Covid-limited audiences at Princeton University's Hurley Gallery in 2021; this is its NYC premiere. The first iteration of this project, *Two Person Operating System* (2016), premiered at NYU's Institute of Fine Arts, was shown at Andrea Rosen Gallery (NYC), Jessica Silverman Gallery (San Francisco), and a found warehouse in Brooklyn, and was written up in *Artforum* and *The New Yorker*, among others. Subsequent iterations of this evolving series of works will be performed at venues across the country.

ARTIST BIOS

Sculptor Martha Friedman (b. Detroit, MI) earned her BFA from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago and her MFA from Yale University School of Art. Solo exhibitions of her work have been held at The Moody Center for the Arts, Rice University, Houston, TX; Art@Bainbridge, Princeton University Art Museum, NJ; Henry Art Museum, Seattle, WA; Institute of Fine Arts New York University, NY; Locust Projects, Miami, FL; Museum of Contemporary Art Detroit, MI; DeCordova Museum and Sculpture Park, Lincoln, MA among others. Her work has been included in numerous group exhibitions, nationally and internationally. Select examples include The Yale Peabody Museum of Natural History / Artspace, New Haven, CT; Tang Museum, Saratoga Springs, NY; Barnard University, NY; Frieze New York Sculpture Park, NY; Museum of Contemporary Art Rome, IT; Public Art Fund, New York, NY. She frequently collaborates with choreographers Susan Marshall and Silas Riener, reflecting her interest in the intersection of sculpture and dance. Friedman is currently a senior lecturer in visual art at Princeton University, and lives and works in Brooklyn, NY. Friedman is represented by Broadway, New York and Jessica Silverman Gallery, San Francisco. Choreographer Susan Marshall has collaborated with visual artists, scientists and composers on theater productions and gallery installations. Employing modest means to resonant effect, her movement vocabularies often include everyday gestures distilled to near abstraction. Interdependency, freedom within constraints and humor are constants in her work and process. Her collaboration with set designer Mimi Lien-grounded in conversations with members of the neurodiverse community-led to the recent performanceinstallation, Rhythm Bath. She has received MacArthur and Guggenheim Fellowships and three "Bessie" Awards. Her company has performed worldwide and at Brooklyn Academy of Music, The Kitchen, New York Live Arts, Baryshnikov Arts Center, Andrea Rosen Gallery, Kennedy Center, UCLA, Krannert Center, Walker Art Center and Montclair State University among many others. Her work is in the repertories of Nederlands Dans Theatre, Hubbard Street Dance Chicago, Pacific Northwest Ballet and others, Marshall is a professor and the Director of Dance at Princeton University. studiosusanmarshall.org; @studiosusanmarshall
