ALL TESTS WILL BE COMPLETED AT HOME. Please make sure you bring your book to your lesson the week after a test has been completed, for marking and review.

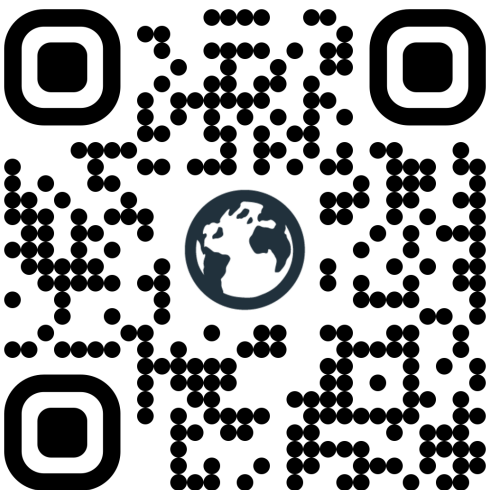

There is dedicated time within each course planner to mark and review each test. **If you would like access to the answers for each of the tests within this book, please scan the QR code below.**

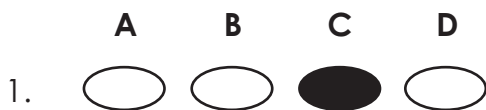

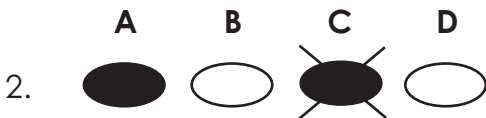

Please do **NOT** use a horizontal line or vertical line. The oval needs to be shaded.

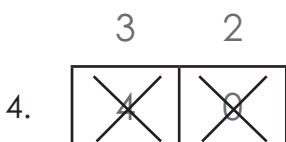
Some of the questions are **free response**. For these questions you will need to write your answer in special answer boxes. Be careful to make sure that you write clearly and inside the boxes.

Test Instructions

In the real test, the instructions before, during and after all parts of the test will be given via a voice recording. Before you begin, you will be asked to check that you can hear the voice recording clearly. Many of the instructions are also written on the question paper. You should raise your hand if you have any questions at any point.

When you are completing a section of the test, you **can**:

- Look back at instructions.
- Go back to any questions within that section.
- Change your answer on the answer sheet within the section you are working.
- Use any spare time to check your answers in the section you are working.

When you are completing a section, you **cannot**:

- Look at any other section.
- Go back to answer or correct answers from another section.
- Look at any future sections.

- **Listen carefully** – to any explanations or instructions you are given.
- **Work accurately** – you may have optional answers, so choose the most reasonable answer if you don't know for sure.
- **Move on if stuck** – if you are stuck on a question, move on. Remember, you need to complete enough questions to score well.

- **Work speedily** – often the biggest challenge in the exam is completing enough questions to gain top marks.

"Mother says he's been too busy," said Bobbie; "but he'll write soon, she says." "I say," Phyllis suggested, "let's all wave to the Green Dragon as it goes by. If it's a magic dragon, it'll understand and take our love to Father. And if it isn't, three waves aren't much. We shall never miss them."

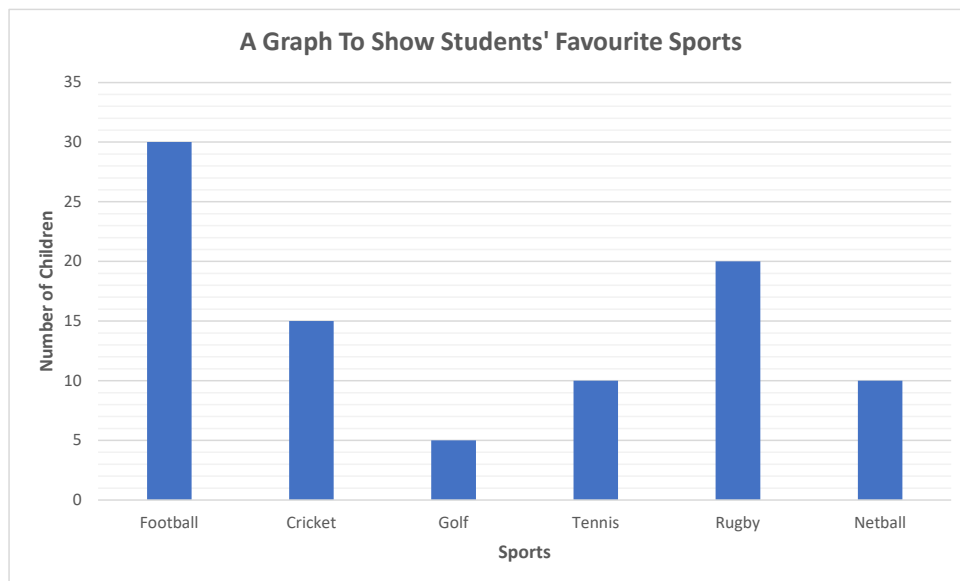

20 However, visitors to the fair were impressed by the size of the ride, as well as the mechanics of it. In 1893, anything that was not turned by hand was considered a sight to see. That is, it did not look like it could stand on its own. And yet it did and even rotated!

They Keep Reaching Higher and Higher

Ferris wheel technology has only improved since then. Most of today's Ferris wheels are much larger than that first one. The largest in the world is the Singapore Flyer, which stands slightly more than twice as tall as George Ferris's wheel.

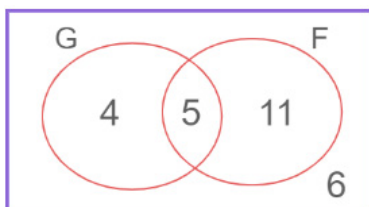
