#### Module 3 – Missing Words

Diwali, also known as the Festival of Lights, is one of the most important **festivals** for millions of Hindus, Sikhs, Jains, and Buddhists around the world. It usually takes place in October or **November** and marks the victory of light over darkness and good over evil. In India, families clean their homes, **decorate** doorways with colourful rangoli patterns, and light rows of small oil lamps called diyas. Many people also exchange gifts and sweets with relatives and **friends** to **celebrate** the occasion.

In other parts of the world, Diwali is celebrated with just as much **excitement**. In the United Kingdom, cities such as Leicester and London host **spectacular** Diwali events. Streets are decorated with **bright** lights, and huge crowds gather to watch firework displays. Temples are filled with people offering prayers and sharing food. In Canada and the United States, communities come together to organise cultural programmes, music, and dance **performances** to mark the festival.

Although Diwali traditions can vary between regions and religions, the spirit of joy and togetherness remains the same. Whether lighting candles in a small village in India or attending a parade in a large city overseas, people celebrate Diwali to **honour** their heritage and spend time with loved ones. It is a festival that brings happiness and hope wherever it is observed.

Some plants have developed **extraordinary** ways to catch insects and small creatures to survive. These are called carnivorous **plants**. Unlike most plants, which get nutrients from the soil alone, carnivorous plants live in places where the soil is poor, such as bogs or swamps. To make up for the lack of **nutrients**, they trap insects and absorb the goodness from their bodies. One of the most famous examples is the Venus flytrap, which has leaves shaped like a jaw. When an insect touches tiny hairs inside the trap, the leaves snap shut in less than a **second**.

Another **remarkable** plant is the pitcher plant. Its leaves form a deep tube, or 'pitcher', filled with liquid. The inside of the pitcher is **slippery**, so when an insect crawls in, it cannot climb back out. Eventually, it falls into the fluid, where it is slowly broken down and digested. Different types of pitcher plants grow all over the **world**, including in North America and Southeast Asia. Some of them are so large that they can even catch small frogs or lizards.

Sundews are another clever group of insect-eating plants. They have long leaves **covered** in sticky droplets that look like glistening dew. When an insect lands on the leaf, it becomes **trapped** in the glue. The leaf then curls around the prey to digest it. Even though these plants may seem strange or **frightening**, they are a fascinating example of how living things adapt to their environment to survive.
