### **Good Shepherd Lutheran Church Worship**


As the number of vaccinated people continues to rise and the rate of infection continues to fall, we are happy to have three options for you to worship with us:

**To join us for Indoor Worship at 8:30 am:** We are no longer requiring sign-ups. Our numbers have been small. Masks are required as is physical distancing. Inside, we cannot sing, but Vic sings the hymns so that it is a more meaningful experience of music. We have a plastic protector on the altar, adding to our safe practices. Pastor Doug distributes Communion carefully but if you prefer to bring your own bread for you or your group that is fine as well. **We are going to experiment with distributing wine as part of the Eucharist in a safe manner. We will prefill individual cups with wine. If you are more comfortable not taking wine, please don't. You certainly may greet and chat with others but please do so <b>once outside** the building.

To join us for Outdoor Worship at 10:00 am: The Service will be in the backyard of the church, chairs physically distanced. *Masks are no longer required for outdoor worship.*Bring a chair, sunglasses, and wear layers. *Pastor Doug will distribute bread at communion.*You may continue to bring your own bread to be consecrated during the celebration of the Eucharist. We are going to experiment with distributing wine as part of the Eucharist in a safe manner. We will prefill individual cups with wine. If you are more comfortable not taking wine, please don't. We will provide more information at the services. In the event of rain or storm, we will hold the 10:00 AM Service inside the church.

### Devotional for the week of May 2nd, 2021

To encourage flowering and fruit production in vines, trees, and shrubs, most of us know that pruning is necessary. This isn't the easiest of work, nor does it make the pruned plant look all that great for a while afterward. Yet often what results after pruning is a plant that is more abundant, beautiful, and healthy than it would have been otherwise.

In our reading today, Jesus makes it very clear that he is the vine, his Father is the vine grower, and we, his disciples, are the branches on which fruit grows. Without the vine and the vine grower, the branches do not exist. Yet, often in our spiritual lives it seems as though we get these roles mixed up. We are wooed by the sense of accomplishment and value that comes from producing results of one kind or another, and we fail to acknowledge the source that makes that "fruit" possible.

However, in today's gospel, Jesus reminds us that our job isn't to produce results; it's to stay connected. "Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing," Jesus says (John 15:5). Jesus is our source and strength; it is only by our connection to Jesus the vine that we the branches bear fruit that will last, such as love, compassion, forgiveness, hope, service, kindness, and patience.

To grow this kind of fruit, Jesus relates how necessary it is for us to be pruned occasionally. In other words, those things that are not of God in our lives have to be rooted out from time to time. The process of pruning isn't always the most enjoyable and can even include a good deal of pain, but it leads to lives that are whole and abundant. As we abide in Jesus, we are given the strength we need to endure the pruning process. We also experience the peace that comes from knowing that the fruit that will follow is for the glory of God.


### **Adult Learning Forum**



### Shepherd's Pantry

### The need is great!

The Monroe Food Pantry provides emergency food assistance for needy individuals and families in Monroe. Their clients receive one week's worth of food per month and they serve more than 100 households per month.

The Social Ministry and Community Outreach Committee invites you to contribute items to the Shepherd's Pantry located in the narthex. You may drop them off on Sunday mornings. The items are delivered to the Monroe Food Pantry once a month.

The Food Pantry is looking for following items to fill out their inventory:

- canned fruit apple sauce, mandarin oranges, peaches, pears, pineapple
- canned vegetables (regular AND low sodium) beets, creamed corn, French cut green beans, olives, potatoes, spinach, Sauerkraut, sweet potatoes
- canned beans (regular AND low sodium) cannellini, pinto
- baked beans regular, pork, vegetarian, chili with beans, vegetarian chili, refried beans, vegetarian refried beans
- broth/stock (regular and low sodium) chicken, beef, vegetable
- canned tomatoes (regular and low sodium) diced, crushed, whole, puree/sauce, paste
- jarred pasta sauce
- whole wheat egg noodles
- Ramen beef, shrimp
- baking supplies bread crumbs, brownie mix, cake mix, flour, sugar
- packaged foods Hamburger Helper, instant potatoes, Knorr pasta/rice sides, Pastaroni, Ricearoni
- salad dressing balsamic, ranch, Thousand Island, Italian, blue cheese
- condiments cooking oil, ketchup, mayo, yellow/brown mustard, pancake syrup, taco/hot sauce
- crunchy peanut butter
- beverages black tea (regular and decaf), ground coffee (regular and decaf), hot chocolate, low sodium V8, Ensure, shelf stable milk
- paper towels
- personal hygiene products deodorant, toothpaste, toothbrushes, shampoo, conditioner, menstrual pads, bar soap, facial wash, razors, handsoap
- household cleaning items

#### 1 JOHN 5:1-6

Everyone who believes that Jesus is the Christ has been born of God, and everyone who loves the parent loves the child. By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love God and obey his commandments. For the love of God is this, that we obey his commandments. And his commandments are not burdensome, for whatever is born of God conquers the world. And this is the victory that conquers the world, our faith. Who is it that conquers the world but the one who believes that Jesus is the Son of God?

This is the one who came by water and blood, Jesus Christ, not with the water only but with the water and the blood. And the Spirit is the one that testifies, for the Spirit is the truth.

#### JOHN 15:9-17

As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete. "This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you. I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.
