




Good Shepherd Lutheran Church Weekly Update Wednesday, October 27, 2021

COMMUNITY SUPPER MINISTRY -



I am Peg Wesche and I'd like to take a few minutes to tell you about -

Community Suppers for those who are not aware of this ministry.

A number of years ago when Pastor Schwarz was with us we began serving suppers at First English Lutheran Church in Bridgeport. Not only did we serve but we also had to bring all the food, prepare the meal, serve and clean up afterwards. When First English lost their pastor and no longer were doing suppers we were retired for a while.

When we were informed that Golden Hill Methodist Church in Bridgeport was offering community suppers we once again became involved along with different civic organizations and churches. We did not have to bring the food as it was provided along with a menu to follow. We have to cook the main meal, slice and butter bread, mix salad and place servings of dessert on small paper plates. Sometimes there are other tasks needed to be done and if there is time we are more than willing to perform them. We serve the first Wednesday of every other month. Our job is to prepare the meal and another group comes to do the serving and clean up.

During the Pandemic our members from Good Shepard took a hiatus. Golden Hill no longer was serving the meals in the big dining hall. Instead meals were and still are packaged and placed in bags to be given to clients at the door as they no longer are able to enter the building. About the last 4 months Good Shepherd has returned to Golden Hill to prepare the meal, package it and clean up. There is no group to come after us at this time.

From time to time we do have students from Middle thru High School come to help, observe and perhaps earn some type of points towards their college resume.

We usually serve at Golden Hill beginning the first Wednesday in February, April, June, August, October and December. QUILTING MINISTRY -

I am Barbara Abraham and, on behalf of our leader Ellie Noll and the rest of the Shepherd's Flock quilters, I am here to talk about our quilting ministry and to thank you for the support we receive from all of you. Making quilts that go all over the world is just one of the many traditions of outreach that is in this congregation's DNA.

My first recollection of working on quilts is of me and Peggy Wesche laying squares of fabric on the floor to place blocks in a pleasant design. At that time, Ellie brought all the supplies in her van each time we met. She had the fabric, cut the squares, and after we designed the top, she sewed the top at home. She and her mother Sam sandwiched the top with the batting and backing fabric. The rest of us tied the quilts, then Ellie took them home, made binding, sewed it on one side and brought it back for us to sit around a table and sew the binding to the other side. We did not make many quilts in those years, but it was a start.

When we were able to have an area in the back of Gibiser Hall to keep the fabric and Ellie began teaching us how to sandwich and then trim the tied quilts, the pace picked up. Having the Thrivent grant to buy storage shelves and people put the shelves together, helped us get better organized.

Ellie and Vic's kids came one quilting day in May and brought 2 sewing machines for us to use. I think that was her Mother's Day gift. Jill Schmidt donated a Singer machine in a table. Having those machines meant that no one needed to take home the two pieces of fabric that need to be sewn together to make the quilt backing and people who did not have machines at home could work on sewing quilt tops during our quilting sessions.

When Sam passed away at the age of 102, we challenged ourselves to make 102 quilts. We did, and I believe that we have made at least 100 quilts every year since.

There are about 15 of us who are involved in making the quilts, but I have to tell you, we feel the great encouragement of the entire congregation and we feel responsibility to this ministry which sends quilts to people we will never know who are in circumstances where a quilt may be comfort, warmth, or something to carry their belongings in.

The pandemic affected our getting together two Saturdays a month for quilting, but Church Council allowed us to meet in groups of 3 with masks, windows open, fans on and with cleaning protocol so we could get back to quilting. We were grateful for the opportunity to meet and keep the quilting process going, but at a time when almost everything was being done by computer, having contact with real people was wonderful, especially for those of us who live alone. Working in small groups every week on Monday, Wednesday, and Saturday has enabled us to be as efficient as ever. Ellie's tradition of teaching others how to design, sew, sandwich, tie, and trim the quilts means that we can use what we have been taught to move the process along for the next group.

Eileen took up the job of sorting through material that goes together and taking it home to iron, cut into 10" squares and place 49-54 squares in a bag for designing. That makes it easy for people to use those bags of squares to design the tops. Five or six quilters take designed tops home to sew the squares together. Others sew tops in Gibiser. After they are sandwiched, tied, and trimmed, Nina takes every quilt - she folds over the binding and sews it down to finish the process. Inspired by the way Ellie would take scraps home and sew them into quilt tops, some of the quilters do that also. It is always so much fun to see bits and pieces of fabric we recognize in a quilt top we are tying.

This past July was the first time that we became an in-gathering location for the Lutheran World Relief truck to come to Good Shepherd. Other congregations brought their boxes of quilts and kits to be loaded onto the trucks with ours. Again, volunteers from the congregation came through to help load those trucks. Lutheran World Relief was not able to have the in-gatherings in 2020, so the warehouses badly needed inventory of quilts. If you visit the Lutheran World Relief Facebook group you will see that there are postings every week of the blessing of quilts in all parts of the country—all happy to see their quilts moving on to a Lutheran World Relief warehouse where they will be shipped all over the world.



We have been fortunate to have material donated by members of the congregation, from friends of Shepherd's Flock quilters and from families of people who were quilters that passed away and left a lot of fabric. And, because they became aware of us through the in-gathering, a church in Danbury shared a supply of batting that they had been given from a company who was going out of business. We do look for fabric everywhere. When the lounge was redone a few years ago, we took apart the old curtains and cut them into squares and put smaller pieces in scrap quilts.

For me, being part of the Shepherd's Flock Quilters has enabled me to form wonderful friendships and it has encouraged me to develop quilting skills. The most important thing is knowing that our quilts go as a blessing from Good Shepherd to touch others all over the world. Aside from Lutheran World Relief, over the years we have given some quilts to local families where there was a need, to Summerfield Methodist, sent some to California for those displaced by wildfires, etc. and this year, to our high school graduates.

Thanks to all of you who encourage us with your words, your smiles at our quilts, your contributions, and your help when we need it to build shelves, or to make boxes, fill them, and load them onto trucks. Together, we are all doing God's work.

But when Christ came as a high priest of the good things that have come, then through the greater and perfect tent (not made with hands, that is, not of this creation), he entered once for all into the Holy Place, not with the blood of goats and calves, but with his own blood, thus obtaining eternal redemption. For if the blood of goats and bulls, with the sprinkling of the ashes of a heifer, sanctifies those who have been defiled so that their flesh is purified, how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without blemish to God, purify our conscience from dead works to worship the living God!

Mark 12:28-34

One of the scribes came near and heard them disputing with one another, and seeing that he answered them well, he asked him, "Which commandment is the first of all?" Jesus answered, "The first is, 'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these." Then the scribe said to him, "You are right, Teacher; you have truly said that 'he is one, and besides him there is no other'; and 'to love him with all the heart, and with all the understanding, and with all the strength,' and 'to love one's neighbor as oneself,' —this is much more important than all whole burnt offerings and sacrifices." When Jesus saw that he answered wisely, he said to him, "You are not far from the kingdom of God." After that no one dared to ask him any question.
