----- I have loved Outdoor Worship! It has been a reminder that Worship is not the building; it is the people and the Message. I found it decidedly moving to be in the breeze, under the clouds with the sun on my face...I hope even when we don't have to, we continue to worship outdoors from time to time.

------ I enjoy the online Service as I can watch when I can, mornings have not been my best time of day. I can stop and start as I need to and I can sing as loud as I want! When I watch the online Service, I am doing so with my community and I imagine that they are right there with me.

----- being able to continue worship with our Good Shepherd family and be reminded by Pastor that the word of God is ever constant, especially during these upside down times, has been a much needed source of comfort, reassurance and relative "normalcy". Tuning in to YouTube for Sunday morning service those early months of isolation was a nourishing and uplifting way to end the week and start another. Then, with the opening of outdoor worship, another missing element was added to the depth of my experience, connection! How wonderful to feel the power of Matthew's verse, "Wherever 2 or more are gathered together in my name, there I am in the midst of them". Council Highlights October 19, 2020

Attendance: Meeting was held on Zoom beginning at 7:35 pm. Present: Pastor Doug, Donna Duessel, Barbara Abraham, Trudi Black, Tricia Bobowick, Thelma Cleland, Jeff Jackson, Brian Immel, Riley Immel, Renee Shoop and Karen Merrick. Absent: None

Reports

Finance: Barbara Abraham reported summary of year to date church finances is doing fine. Expenses are favorable to budget by \$706. Tim will be preparing and filing the Payroll Protection Program Loan forgiveness upon approval of council. Barbara moved to have the Finance Report approved; seconded by Jeff Jackson. All voted Aye to approve.

Council further discussed keeping June Mora in Church's payroll through October 2020, given the federal stimulus funds received; motion made to approve by Jeff Jackson, Brian Immel seconded it, all voted- Aye.

Council discussed Contributions were down for August, but better than previous Augusts. Church should be OK through 2020, but budget for next year may be challenging. Finance Committee asked Tim Carlson to assess whether Church can refinance mortgage to improve on budget for 2021. Tim will be working on that.

Pastor- Pastor Doug indicated that the sale of his house fell through and he has taken it off the market for the winter. Cost of rental properties were not convenient at this time and not much available. He thanks people from the church for helping him with cleaning the garage.

Pastor Doug also discussed what we as a church have created in view of the pandemic such as outdoor services, and what people want to keep doing. He mentioned issues with membership, including, that some members are afraid that the videotaping services will discontinue once we go back inside. He has reached out to other congregations and advised that some pastors feel that recorded services will not go away. He also mentioned that some people that were not currently attending are watching on video and have reached out to him.

Confirmation – A long discussion was had regarding confirmation – both confirming the students who attended confirmation during the past two years and the meaning of confirmation going forward. Pastor Doug is concerned that confirmation means graduation from church for whole families. Further discussion tabled for December meeting.

Worship and Music – Key discussions:

Drive-in church. Committee agreed to have Drive-in Church on Nov. 8. This will be the first experiment.

Property Committee has found a system that removes 99+% of influenza virus that should work for the corona virus; system costs about \$3,000 and an anonymous donor will fund the system, includes project to purchase and install. Donna Duessel indicated a Reme Halo system was selected upon recommendation from Rural Fuels in order to improve ventilation. The Church's existing ventilation system fans are not big enough to install HEPA filters. Property Committee believes it is a reasonable technology. System to be install in Sanctuary, and with the practice of social distancing, safety sanitation protocols, reservations for services; having multiple services, the church will be able to enjoy indoor services and Christmas. System will take about a month to install. REME Halo system must run with the fan system on. The REME Halo System reduces the risk of airborne viruses; it does not eliminate the risk. All other safety measure would continue: mask wearing, social distancing, no hymnal use. M/S made to approve REME Halo System installation. All Ayes. Installation to occur possibly in November, perhaps before Dec. 1.

Property – Council thanks Jeff Jackson, Bob McFarland, Dave Wang and Mickey Pellela for all facilities work.

Stewardship – Stewardship Drive Letter sent out.

Council of Churches - Donna Duessel delivered Quilts to Summerfield and Billie Flaherty brought dress shirt donations also. Pastor Gaston was very grateful

Old Business

Coronavirus Response - CARES Act - \$21,200 received—Council discussed that Tim Carlson will be preparing and filing the Payroll Protection Program Loan Forgiveness Form obtained from Newtown Savings Bank and upon approval from Council. Motion made and seconded, and Council approved (All Ayes) that Tim Carlson is authorized, on behalf of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, to file Form 3508S to seek forgiveness of our \$21,100 PPP Loan.

How are we doing? What should we be doing? Council Members to continue Reach-out program to members on their list

Book Club request to meeting inside. Currently Club members have met outside or Zoom about 10-12 people. Donna Duessel asked if they can wait until new air system is installed. Members are concerned with attracting new members to attend.

Credit Card – Newtown Savings Bank has approved and issued a credit cards to GSL. Nina Furnes, Peg Wesche and Donna Duessel have cards.

Safe Church Policy – update, required by new insurance – Donna Duessel to work on draft this week. Kristen Baron, Tricia Bobowick and DD worked on it back in July

Videographer – in process of hiring Reed, Reed to deliver papers on Thursday 10/22/2020

Summerfield Partnership – Routine giving to provide protein – will kick-off in November Budget

Pastor Health Insurance – BA presented the need to select a plan by 10/31 to cover PD upon termination of his wife's coverage in first half of 2021. BA indicated Synod has three options, Gold, Platinum and Silver. Gold and platinum are prohibiting to our Church Budget. ELCA recommends Silver Plus plan of \$1,179/month, bronze is less and not suitable. Silver is \$13K per anum with HAS; one can contribute \$50 or \$75 contribution to IRS limit of about \$3900 for an individual plan, which includes dental. ELCA recommends 80:20 cost sharing with PD. Barbara made motion to approve recommendation; seconded - All Ayes, PD abstained.

Fall Planning

Sunday School – DD indicated that working with parents, kids send cards to veterans.

New Business:

Property:

RFG REME-Halo System for Sanctuary Air Handling \$2,891.20 – anonymous donation will cover the cost; installation in November. Rural Fuels would install. See above discussion in Worship & Music.

Window Replacement – Windows in Vic's office need to be replaced at a cost \$1,500. A proposal to use bathroom/sidewalk fund – Dave Wang spoke with the family associated with that memorial fund and they were okay with using the funds to replace the windows. M/S to approve. All Ayes

Audit Report - Paul Schwarz's letter attached. No adverse findings. M/S to approve. All Ayes

Annual Meeting December 13th – Council chose Dec. 13 enough room for 40 people, others by zoom, logistics to be worked on. Discussed gathering a Quorum. Need reservations for annual meeting. Donna Duessel to look in constitution to confirm if proxy vote and if meeting can be delayed.

There are several options for you to join us for online worship:

To join us for Worship in person: On November 1st, we will have the Outdoor Worship Service at 10:00 a.m. On November 8th, we will have Drive In Church (details will be coming soon). We are committed to our goal of having no spread of the contagion due to our gatherings. With this in mind, we ask you to observe these *updated* guidelines:

- 1) If you do not feel well or if you do not feel comfortable, please stay at home. The service is available online for those who do not join is in person.
- 2) Please put on your face covering before leaving your vehicle. You will be expected to wear it throughout your visit.
- 3) Please bring: a lawn chair, face covering, and portion of bread for communion for every person in your group.
- 4) Please plan to arrive between 9:30-9:45. There will be a table at the entrance where you may leave your offering.
- 5) Please choose a spot at least six feet from other family groups. Your chair should be positioned so that your feet are on the white line in front of you. Please stay seated until worship begins.
- 6) Please refrain from unnecessary movement through the worship space to allow everyone to get set up while maintaining social distancing.
- 7) Please understand that singing has been shown to be one of the riskiest activities at this time. We will NOT be singing during this service. Please hum softly or mouth the words without using your voice.
- 8) We will pass the Peace without physical contact.
- 9) For Holy Communion, you will be asked to get out the bread you brought with you. Pastor will consecrate it from the altar and signal you when you should eat it. No wine will be available. As Lutherans, we believe that Christ is present to us in, with, and under both the bread and wine, so in times such as this when it is not safe to share a common cup, the sacrament is fully available and complete in the consecrated bread.
- 10) When the service has ended, please do not linger to socialize; go directly to your vehicle and depart.
- 11) The church is now open if you need to use the bathroom. Please use the designated bathroom and sign in to help us ensure the bathroom is cleaned regularly.
- 12) In the event of inclement weather, the service will be cancelled. You may assume that if there are thunderstorms or torrential rain in the forecast, there will be no service. Check our Facebook page and Website for updates if the weather seems questionable.



As a reminder, Daylight Savings Time ends on Sunday, November 1st in the early morning, so be sure to set your clocks back on Saturday night.




